2022-2023 Alabama MIC3 End of the Year Report

Submitted by Dr. Douglas L. Ragland, Alabama Commissioner

There have been excellent accomplishments during the 2022-23 year in the state of Alabama in relation to MIC3 and Military Families in general, as well as other governmental issues in our state and they are as follows:

- The Honorable Governor Kay Ivey approved a Military Proclamation for Month of the Military Child on April 15, 2023. I have attached the Proclamation to this email.**
- The Honorable Governor Kay Ivey approved a Commendation for the Alabama Council under the leadership of Dr. Douglas L. Ragland on June 22, 2023. I have attached the Proclamation to this email.**
- I am currently a member of the Legislative Appointed Alabama Purple Star Schools Committee. This committee, along with the support of the Alabama State Superintendent of Education have increased the number of Purple Star Schools to 175 as it stands for 2023. This is an increase of 122 additional schools that were designated Purple Star School status in 2023.**
- We have successfully resolved all cases pertaining to our Military Families in Alabama for 2022-23.**
- The River Region Summit was held in February and March 2023 in Phenix City and Huntsville Alabama. These summits are professional development opportunities for the local school systems on MIC3, S2S programs, and overall support for Purple Star School Program (PSSP).**

Erica Lewis, School Liaison Officer for Redstone Arsenal has displayed excellent leadership as a School Liaison Officer in her community for 2022-23 are as follows:

***SLO, along with the Redstone Arsenal Garrison Commander, COL Brian Cozine, participated in the Impact Aid kickoff with our 3 local school districts (Huntsville City Schools, Madison City Schools, and Madison County Schools). Throughout the campaign, information was shared with RSA workforce and residents on Impact Aid.**

***SLO partnered with Lindsay Dablow to facilitate a virtual Compact 101 training for educators and administrators in Madison County School System. The training was very informative, and the staff were very appreciative.**

***Successfully re-established the weekly RSA Home School Program.**

***SLO coordinated with local schools to have over 120 people from RSA organizations participate in Read Across America. Volunteer readers went to 12 different schools across 3 school districts to read to students on Dr. Seuss's birthday. They shared stories and the importance of reading. *SLO and RSA Garrison Commander, COL Brian Cozine shared opening remarks for the Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC) 360 Summit. The SLO talked with educators about the role of a School Liaison Officer and thanked them for the vital role teachers' play in easing the transition of military-connected students.**

***SLO served as a reviewer for the state's 2022 Purple Star Schools applications. All 3 school districts in Madison County are now Purple Star Districts.**

***SLO conducted a parent workshop titled "Kindergarten Here We Come" to help parents and their children prepare for the transition to kindergarten. Parents learned about developmentally appropriate tasks that are indicators of readiness for kindergarten as well as ways they can start preparing their child for kindergarten. At the end of the presentation, participants were given a copy of The Kissing Hand by Audrey Penn.**

*** SLO presented to teachers at Williams Elementary School on "Connecting Military Youth During Transition- Social and Emotional Considerations School Response and Support." The staff was very receptive of the information presented.**

***SLO held the annual Kindergarten Boot Camp for children in the Strong Beginnings program in May. 35 students were able to rotate through stations to help them see what a day of kindergarten will be like once they start school. Ms. Tenisha Cummings, principal of Williams Elementary School, came out to talk to the students about what to expect as a kindergarten student. It was a fun event for all.**

The following report from Maxwell Air Force for Robert Richert and Katherine Ganster, highlights MIC Issues, Non-MIC3 Issues, Legislative Actions, Purple Star Schools and Community Partnerships:

MIC3 Issues

- A Military student transferred to AL from TX (mid-year) with enough HS credits to graduate on time in TX but not in AL, thus AL school would not allow on-time graduation. The School Liaison office connected the two districts and requested to invoke Compact rule SEC.4.103 Transfers during Senior Year. The student completed TX coursework in AL and received a TX diploma in AL this past May (2023).**

- A Military student transferred to AL from CA with enough HS credits to graduate on time in CA but not in AL, thus AL school would not allow on-time graduation. The School Liaison office connected the two districts and requested to invoke Compact rule SEC.4.103 Transfers during Senior Year. The student completed CA coursework and Senior Project (Community Service) in AL and received a CA diploma in AL this past May (2023).
- Consultation with local Jr. High School Principal about MIC3 and additional excused absences for dependents of active duty departing for/returning from deployment, SEC.5.105, Absence as related to Deployment Activities.

Non MIC3 Issues

- Consultation with parents who received a truancy letter from the County Attendance Officer. The parent was under the impression that the child's absences were excused due to his active-duty status. Upon further discussion with the parent, it was determined that the absences were unexcused as they were not related to him departing for/returning from deployment (SEC.5.105, Absence as related to Deployment Activities). School Liaison advised the parent to contact the Case Officer and determine how to best resolve the issue.
- An incident was reported at a school board meeting regarding a drug search of a student's (not military) vehicle at a local HS. Concern was expressed to the Superintendent about who was responsible to search the vehicle (RSO, Principal vs responding police officer on scene). The district is working with local police to determine processes/protocols for future searches on school property.
- An incident was reported at a school board meeting regarding a student (not military) in possession of a handgun on the campus of a local HS. The incident was reported to school administrators by a fellow student. The school board/Superintendent established a "State of School" meeting to inform parents of the issue and how districts/schools are responding.
- The parent (not military) addressed the school board over her concerns regarding recent events (fighting, gun possession) at the local Jr. HS. She expressed concern for her child and other children's safety on campus. She also relayed her displeasure at how the school failed to notify parents of the issues on campus.
- The local school board discussed instituting a clear bag policy on school campuses as a result of recent incidents at local schools (gun/drug possession). Several parents raised concerns to the Superintendent/School Board about incidents of weapons, drug searches, and fights in HS/Jr. HS campuses.
- Bullying issue at local school. The parent contacted the school liaison seeking guidance on how to address the bullying issue which (in her opinion) was not being

handled properly by the school administration. School Liaison advised the parent of the school's bullying policy and provided the school's form to file an official complaint. The bullied child was provided with a safety plan for the remainder of the school year.

Legislation (we are following)

- **Alabama HB43 - To amend Section 16-28-4, Code of Alabama 1975, relating to the minimum age for attendance at public schools; to require a child to complete kindergarten or demonstrate first-grade readiness before entering the first grade; to provide for circumstances under which a child who is under five years of age on September 1 may be admitted to public kindergarten; to provide for circumstances under which a child who is under six years of age on December 31 may be admitted to public school first grade; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Section 111.05 of the Constitution of Alabama of 2022.**
- **Sponsor – Pebblin Warren**

Introduced (50% - Passed in the House) – February 23, 2023

- **Alabama HB90 - Relating to special education; add Section 16-39-3.1 to the Code of Alabama 1975, to provide that certain students with an intellectual disability are entitled to certain educational services up to the student's twenty-sixth birthday.**

Sponsor – John Rogers

Introduced (25%) – March 7, 2023

- **Alabama HB164 - Relating to public high schools; to require students to complete a personal financial literacy and money management course before graduation; to provide for the creation and administration of a financial literacy examination; and to require the reporting of a summary of examination results to the State Department of Education.**

Sponsor – Andy Whitt

Introduced (75% - Passed in the House and Senate) – March 21, 2023

- **Alabama HB218 - Relating to public K-12 education and the Alabama Accountability Act of 2013; to amend Sections 16-6D-3, 16-6D-4, 16-6D-6, 16-6D-8, and 16-6D-9, as amended by Act 2022-390, 2022 Regular Session, Code of Alabama 1975; to change the designation of a failing school to a fully supported school and the designation of a nonfailing school to a non-fully supported school; and to require the State Board of Education to reflect those changes in terminology when amending or adopting rules relating to the Alabama Accountability Act of 2013.**

Introduced (25%) – March 23, 2023

- **Alabama HB261/SB211 - Relating to two-year and four-year public institutions of higher education; to amend Section 16-1-52, Code of Alabama 1975, to prohibit a biological male from participating on an athletic team or sport designated for**

females; to prohibit a biological female from participating on an athletic team or sport designated for males; to prohibit adverse action against a public K-12 school or public two-year or four-year institution of higher education for complying with this act; to prohibit adverse action or retaliation against a student who reports a violation of this act; and to provide a remedy for any student who suffers harm as a result of a violation of this act.

Introduced (75% - Passed in the House and Senate) – April 5, 2023

- **Alabama HB269/SB181 - Relating to K-12 public education; to amend Section 16-1-14, Code of Alabama 1975; to provide legislative findings; to provide a uniform system of procedural due process protections for students facing suspension or expulsion for violating the student code of conduct or state law; and to require the State Board of Education to adopt rules to implement this act.**

Sponsor – Terri Collins/Rodger Smitherman

Introduced (25%) – April 5, 2023/Indefinitely Postponed – May 31, 2023

- **Alabama HB280 - Relating to the Military Family Jobs Opportunity Act; to amend Section 31-1-6, Code of Alabama 1975, as amended by Act 2022-92, 2022 Regular Session, to extend professional license reciprocity to spouses of United States Department of Defense civil servants; and to make nonsubstantive conforming changes to the law.**

Sponsor – Phillip Rigsby

Introduced (25%) – April 11, 2023/Indefinitely postponed – May 2, 2023

- **Alabama HB295/SB202 - Relating to education; to establish the Parental Rights in Children's Education (PRICE) Act relating to K-12 education; to secure the fundamental constitutional rights of parents to direct the education of their children; to create the PRICE Program; to establish a three-year phase-in period; to provide definitions; to establish the roles and responsibilities of the Parent Advisory Board, the Commissioner of Revenue, and the Department of Revenue; to create a process for granting education savings accounts; to establish funding mechanisms for the costs of education savings accounts and the administration of the program; to specify qualified expenses; to create requirements for education service providers; to establish an auditing, denial, and appeal mechanism for expenses, parents, participating students, and education service providers; to provide safeguards against any additional state control over or interference with nonpublic schools, their students, and their families; and to provide for legal remedies.**

Introduced (25%) – April 11, 2023

- **Alabama HB354 - Relating to education; to amend Section 2 of Act 2022-290, now appearing as Section 16-40A-5, Code of Alabama 1975; to prohibit classroom instruction related to gender identity or sexual orientation in public K-12 schools at certain grade levels and in any grade level in a manner that is not age or developmentally appropriate; to require parents to be notified if there is a change in services or monitoring relating to his or her child's mental, emotional, or physical health; to require parents to be notified of health care services available to students and to allow a parent to opt his or her child out; to require parental consent for certain health care screenings or questionnaires for K-12 students; to provide parents with procedures to express their concern with a local board of education's compliance with certain policies; and to provide a remedy in certain situations.**

Introduced (25%) – April 20, 2023

- **Alabama HB363 - Relating to the Alabama School Choice and Student Opportunity Act; to amend Sections 16-6F-5, 16-6F-6, and 16-6F-10, Code of Alabama 1975, to change the appointment process for the Alabama Public Charter School Commission; to authorize the commission to hire staff; to require commissioners to receive annual training; to provide additional guidelines for the authorizing and application review process; to provide further for the operational and categorical funding of public charter schools in their first year of operation; and to clarify the per pupil federal, state, and local funding of conversion public charter schools during their first year of operation.**

Sponsor – Terri Collins

Introduced (75% - Passed in the House and Senate) – June 1, 2023.

- **Alabama SB37 - Relating to the Military Family Jobs Opportunity Act; to amend Section 31-1-6, Code of Alabama 1975, as amended by Act 2022-92, 2022 Regular Session, to extend professional license reciprocity to spouses of United States Department of Defense civil servants.**

Sponsor – Sam Givhan

Introduced (75% - Passed in the House and Senate) – March 7, 2023

Purple Star Schools

- **122 additional schools were designated Purple Star School status in 2023. Bringing Alabama's total to 175 Purple Star Schools. 53 schools achieved Purple Star Status in 2022.**

Community Events/Partnerships

- **SL office coordinated guest speakers/service members to present at local schools for Veteran's Day.**

- **SL office coordinated the delivery of over 200+ thank you cards for Veterans at area Veterans Homes (Alex City) and Hospitals (Tuskegee/Montgomery)**
- **Coordinated three resiliency events with School Liaison Office, Military Family Life Counselor, and local high school students. More than 100 students served.**
- **SL office coordinated a base visit by the local HS Marching Band and Culinary Arts/Hospitality program for the Month of the Military Child. Opportunity to showcase activities/programs of local HS to base families and educate HS students about life behind the gates at Maxwell AFB.**
- **Partnered with MCEC Parent Support Programs and offered several "Tell Me a Story" programs for school-age children. Air Base Wing Vice Commander was our most recent featured guest reader.**
- **Along with Operation Homefront coordinated a base event featuring information booths from fifteen community partners and provided 260 backpacks filled with school supplies to students.**
- **SL office coordinated with Retirement Systems of Alabama (RSA) to light Montgomery's RSA tower in Purple to honor and recognize Purple UP! Day for Month of the Military Child. We also collaborated with the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce to light the downtown fountain purple and the Prattville Chamber of Commerce to celebrate Purple Up Prattville (a recognition event for military children and the month of the military child)**
- **SL Office in conjunction with Air University K-12 Working Group coordinated a Proclamation from Governor Kay Ivey, for April's Month of the Military Child**
- **SL Office collaborated with MCEC and conducted three MIC3 101 training sessions for school/district office personnel MCEC's 360 conferences during the winter/spring sessions. Trained 85 school personnel.**
- **Coordinated base visit by over 200+ students to participate in Operation Welcome Home (VW traveling memorial)**
- **Kim Kozel has been so successful in resolving cases for families stationed at Ft. Novosel, (Formerly Fort Rucker) in Alabama and has been very successful in showing leadership in the community for our Military Families, as well as making the community aware of MIC3. In Kim's community in Southeast Alabama Also in her Community in Southeast Alabama, all of Dale County Schools received the Purple Star School Distinction and two more school were awarded the distinction in Ozark City Schools, thus making all schools in the Ozark City School system Purple Star Designated Schools. Kim has also been very instrumental in Story Board**

Events in the schools in her community and I have attached those events to this report.

In closing, As the Alabama Commissioner for MIC3, I am very proud of my Military Education Family Liaison, Department of Defense Military Representative, and School Liaison Officers, for their excellent work and leadership in resolving all cases related to the Compact, assisting those individuals with concerns out of the jurisdiction of the Compact, serving their respective communities with a Spirit of Excellence in creating partnerships benefiting military families via schools, government, and community organizations, and helping to bring awareness to the Compact, and other Military Interests.

Executive Summary

Pursuant to the Arkansas Code Annotated (ACA) Section 6-28-204(f), the Arkansas Council for Military Children (hereinafter the Council) hereby submits this report to the Governor of Arkansas and to the Education Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives of the Arkansas General Assembly.

This report covers the period from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. Because this Council is concerned with the support of children of military families enrolled in Arkansas public schools, that time period is referenced in this report as Academic Year 2022-2023, or AY 2022-2023.

ACA 6-28-204 requires this Council to report on the following areas (excerpted verbatim from ACA 6-28-204(h)):

- (1) Information regarding the achievements of the State Council and public school districts regarding the support provided to military families under this chapter;
- (2) Details of the reports provided to the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3);
- (3) The number of children of military families in each public school district transferring to or from another state or federal education agency in the previous year;
- (4) Summaries of cases elevated to the chair for counsel and assistance in resolving cases involving the transition of children of military families that were elevated by military families, United States Department of Defense officials; or Public school districts.
- (5) Information regarding training that is provided to public school district personnel with respect to this chapter
- (6) Details regarding plans for future engagement efforts with uniformed services families under this chapter; and
- (7) Any other information deemed relevant by the Council.

The Council has also decided to submit this report to the Secretary of Education and the State Board of Education and will submit this report to the MIC3 national office to satisfy the requirements of MIC3 Rule 2.102.

The Council has enjoyed significant successes during the 2022-23 Academic Year, most notably in advancing its recognition programs. Educating military families about their rights under Arkansas law has continued to be a challenge; the Council has recently implemented an e-newsletter for military families, which should help to ameliorate the problem. The most significant challenge the Council faces at this point is lack of funding to continue to advance recognition programs for schools and for military families.

I. Achievements of the State Council and Public School Districts.

During the last academic year the Council has focused its efforts on five areas: increasing the number of persons attending the statutory military family forum; increasing its recognition programs; enhancing the educational environment for children of military families through expansion of the Arkansas Purple Star School program; raising awareness of the obstacles faced by and special needs of children of military families in obtaining an education through a vigorous outreach and training program; and surveying military families in Arkansas to determine the knowledge among military families of their statutory rights and the resources available to them.

A. Military Family Forum.

The Council conducted an online forum on May 5, 2023 from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. No families addressed the Council.

The Council conducted an in-person forum at the Little Rock Air Force Base on June 14, 2023, from 4:30 PM to 6:30 PM. Fifteen families participated. None expressed dissatisfaction with support for military under Arkansas law.

B. Recognition Programs.

The Outstanding Service to Military Families Award was presented to three individuals.

The award to recognize Outstanding District Military Education Coordinators was presented to two individuals.

The Council has continued its work to develop an award to recognize one outstanding high school student who is a child of a military family statewide. The Awards Committee of the Council is currently developing the concept to present to the Council for approval or amendment. The Council hopes to present the first award under this program in May 2024.

The success of the various recognition programs operated by the Council is proximately due to the superior work of Awards Committee Chair Dr. Janice Walker.

C. Purple Star Schools.

The number of schools qualifying for Purple Star School status has increased from 93 on June 30, 2022 to 114 as of June 30, 2023. A sortable list of Arkansas Purple Star Schools is available at this link [at this link](#) on the Council web site. The number of school districts qualifying for recognition as Purple Star School Districts has risen from nine on June 30, 2022 to 13 on June 30, 2023. Two charter school districts and two private schools have achieved Purple Star status. A sortable list of Arkansas Purple Star School Districts is available at this link [at this link](#) on the Council web site. A chart depicting the increase in Purple Star Schools for the first half of 2023 is at **Appendix A**.

The most significant hindrance to expanding the Purple Star School program is lack of funds to provide recognition banners to qualifying schools. Over the past four years banners have been provided by the Arkansas Activities Association, the Child and Youth Education Service Office of the Little Rock Air

Force Base, and Camp Alliance. In order to continue the program, the Council requires a consistent source of funding. The Council has voted to suspend temporarily presenting banners for this reason.

D. Outreach and Training.

The Council has expanded its public awareness through increasing its social media following as well as through presentations in online town halls, television interviews, and in-person events. In conjunction with the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education, the Council has conducted fifteen training events during this academic year.

The Council has also created a free monthly e-newsletter to provide information more directly to military families and the educators who work with them. Any person may subscribe to the newsletter [at this link](#). Members may unsubscribe at any time. The first edition of the newsletter was published on June 1, 2023.

- E. Survey. The survey of military families was opened publicized on January 31, 2023 via Commissioner's Memo COM-23-079. Responses were accepted through March 31, 2023. 370 responses were received. Results of the survey are presented in **Appendix B**.

II. **Reports to the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission.**

The Council submitted the annual report to MIC3 required by the MIC3 Rule 2.102.

III. **Children of Military Families Transferring Into and Out of Arkansas Public School Districts During AY 2022-2023**

VI. **Plans for Future Engagement.**

During AY 2023-2024 the Council will:

- A) Conduct at least one Military Family Forum, pursuant to ACA 6-28-204(f).
- B) Hold its regularly scheduled council meetings in various communities in order to facilitate in-person attendance by members of the public. Each Council meeting will feature a web-based option for persons who wish to attend virtually.
- C) Continue to conduct training statewide. Training activities will include information on the LEARNS Act and other legislative action relevant to children of military families.
- D) Use the results of the survey of military families to refine and focus the Council's outreach efforts.
- E) Increase the number of Purple Star Schools from 114 to 200.
- F) Revise criteria to qualify as a Purple Star School to include building-level plans to engage military families.
- G) Implement a statewide award to recognize an Outstanding Military Scholar.
- H) Implement a program to recognize cities and counties as Purple Star Communities.
- I) Conduct a follow-up survey of military families.

C. District Military Education Coordinators.

Currently 59 school districts in Arkansas are required to appoint a district military education coordinator under ACA § 6-28-116. All school districts required to appoint a district military education coordinator are in compliance with the statute.

D. Training for School Liaison Program Managers.

On September 14, 2022 Col. (Ret.) Kaminar, Ms. Williams, and Ms. Saum assisted with training school liaison program managers for the Air Force in San Antonio, Texas. The members of the Council were asked to assist because of the exceptionally strong relationship between the Council and the school liaison office at the Little Rock Air Force Base.

E. Recognition of Arkansas “Best Practices”.

The Military Interstate Children’s Compact Commission (MIC3) held its national Annual Business Meeting in Baton Rouge, Louisiana October 19 and 20, 2022. Col. (Ret.) Kaminar and Ms. Williams represented Arkansas at the meeting. During her keynote address, Ms. Sherene Brown (spouse of Air Force Chief of Staff General Charles Q. Brown) cited a number of “best practices” of the Arkansas Council for Military Children as examples for other state councils to follow. The summary document she used, which was

prepared for her by representatives of the Air Force’s “Five and Thrive” Program to support military families, is at **Appendix G**.

F. Recognition of Arkansas Legislative Action.

During the MIC3 Annual Business Meeting Arkansas was recognized for its legislative action to extend the protections of the Interstate Compact to the children of Reserve Component service members. The MIC3 general counsel recommend Arkansas as an example for other states to follow in the memorandum at **Appendix H**.

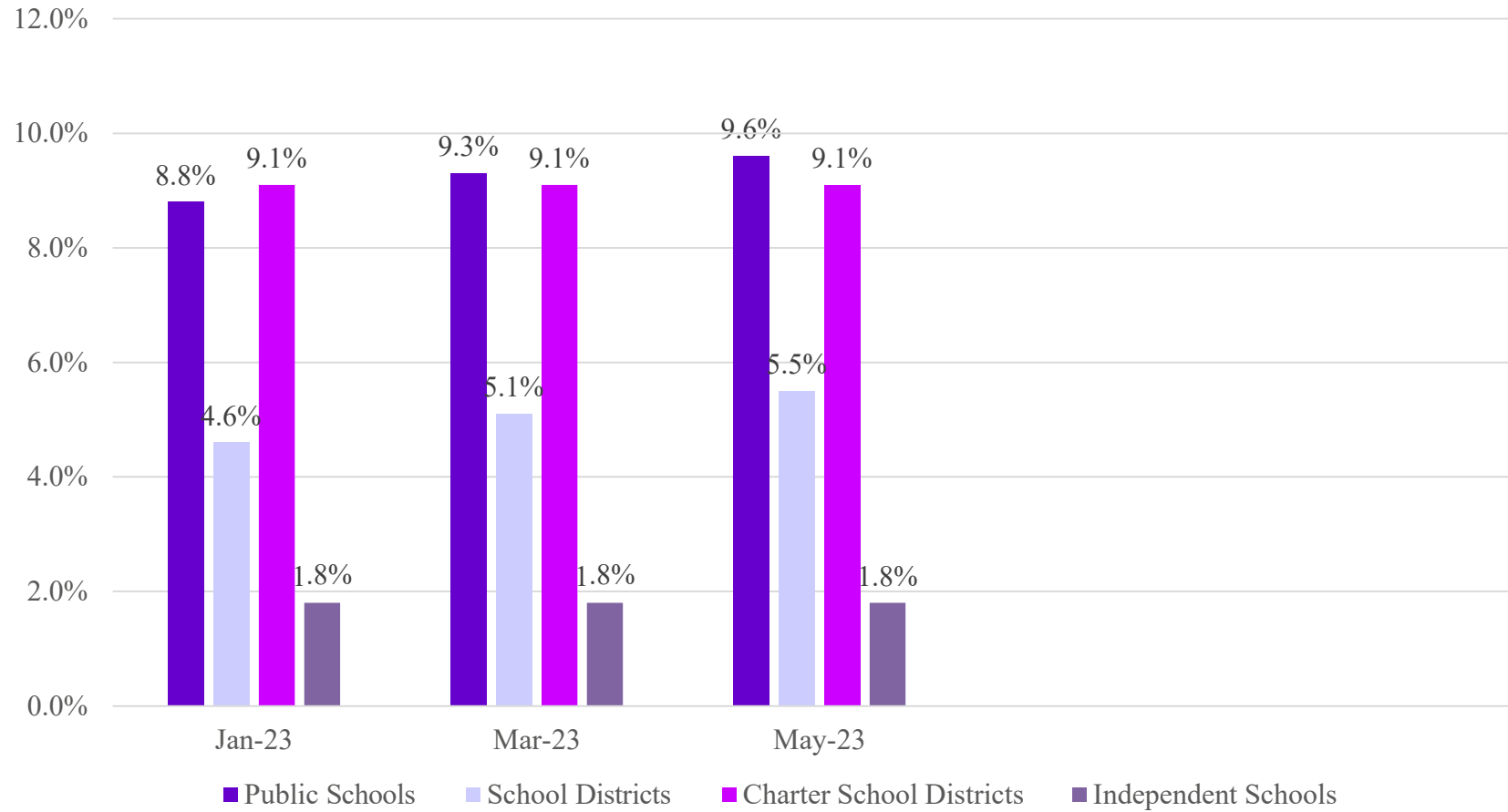

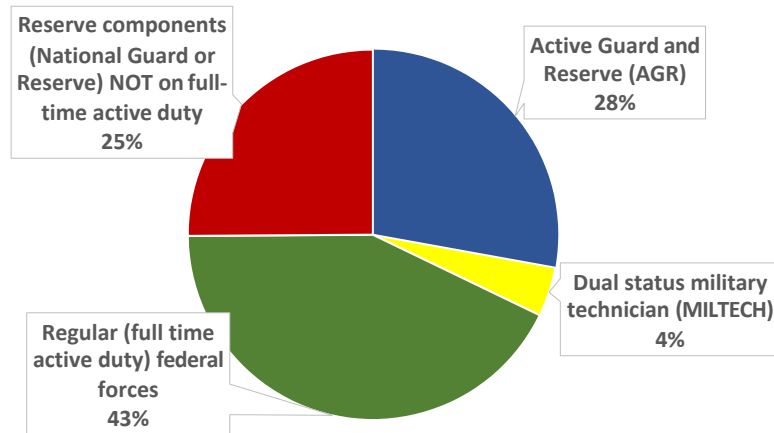

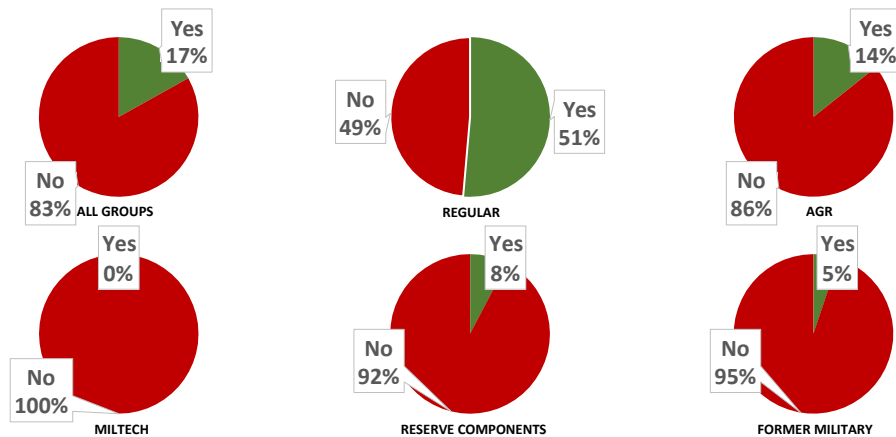

1. Which of the following best identifies your family's current military status?



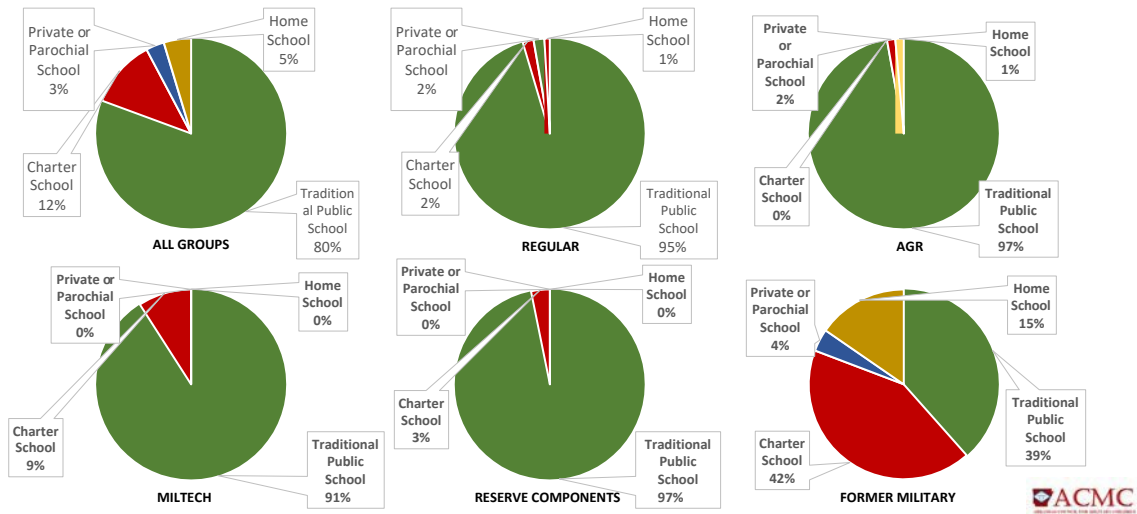

2. Has your family relocated to Arkansas from another state since June 30, 2020, FOR MILITARY SERVICE?



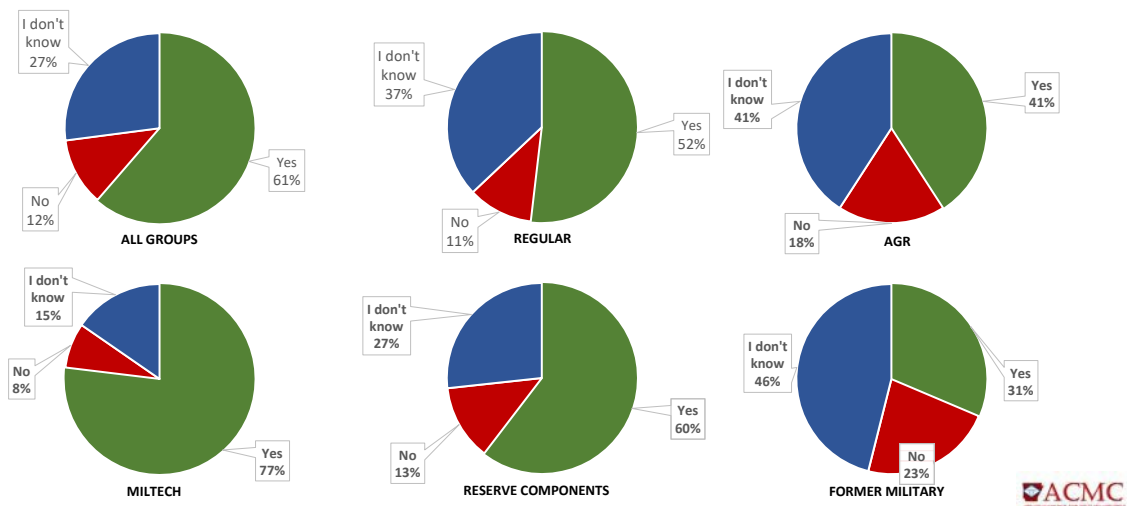

3. Which of the following best describes the type of school in which your child is currently enrolled?



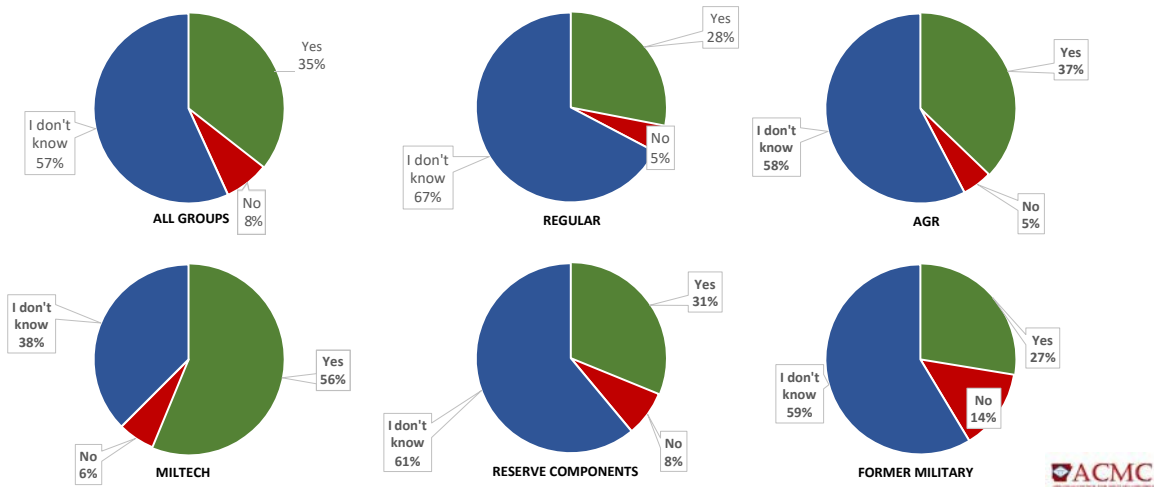

4. Is your child currently attending school in a Purple Star School?



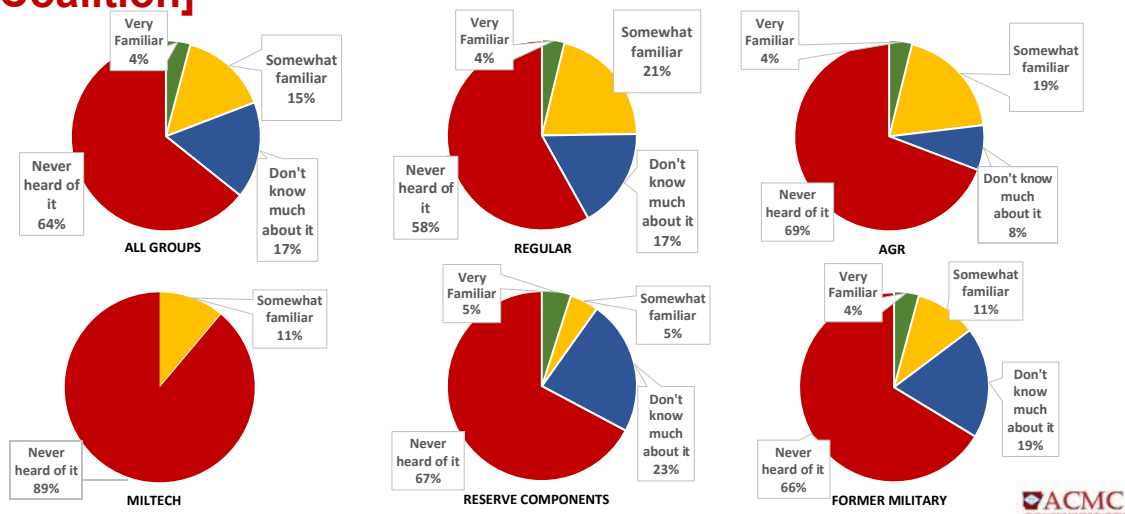

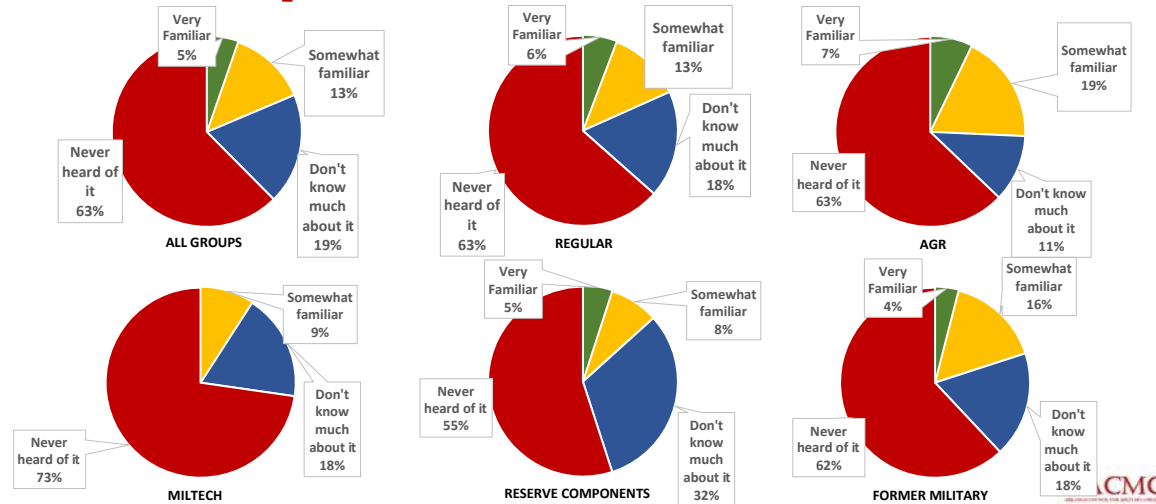

6a. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [Military Child Education Coalition]



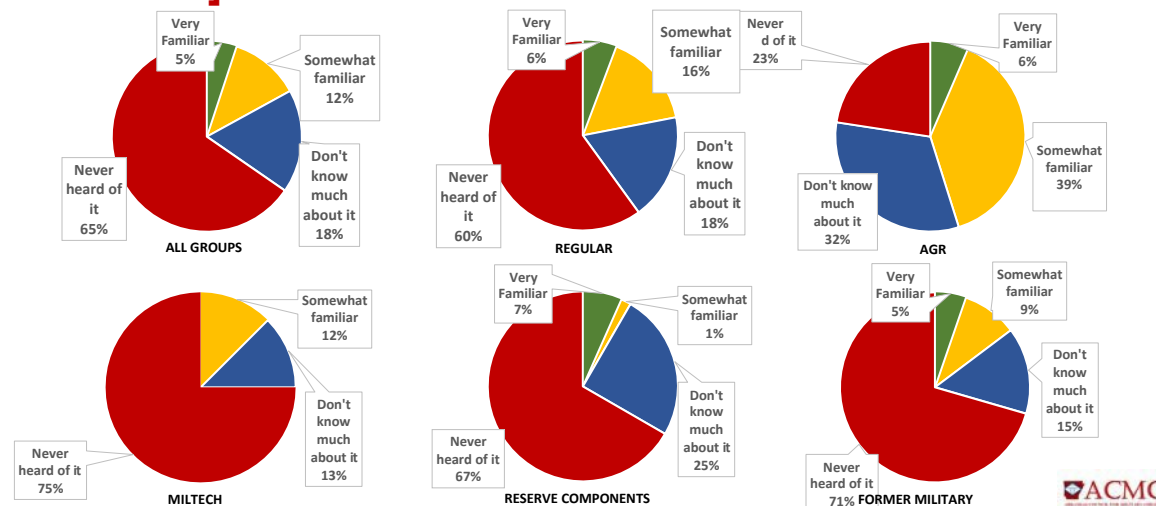

6b. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [National Military Family Association]



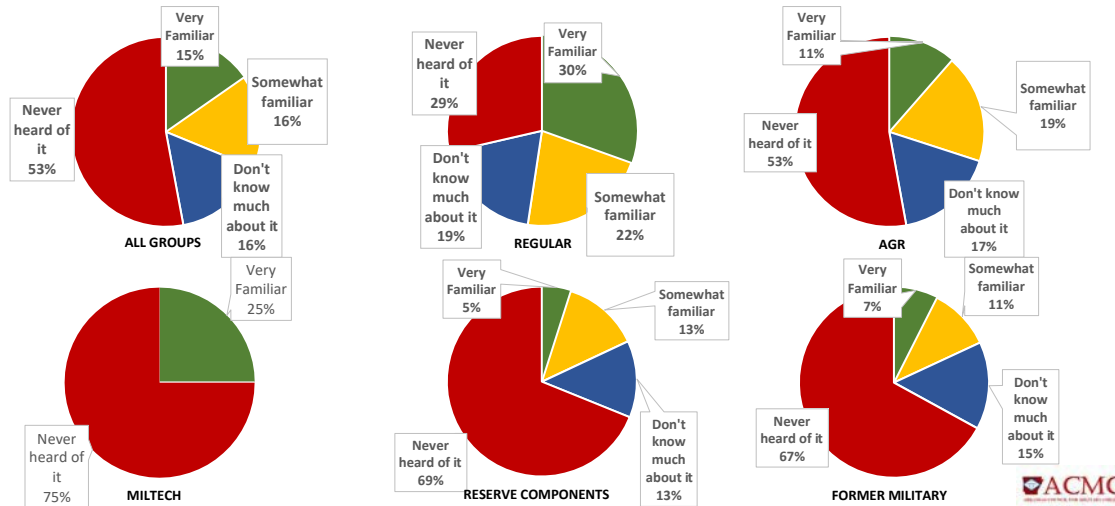

6c. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [Military Family Advisory Network]



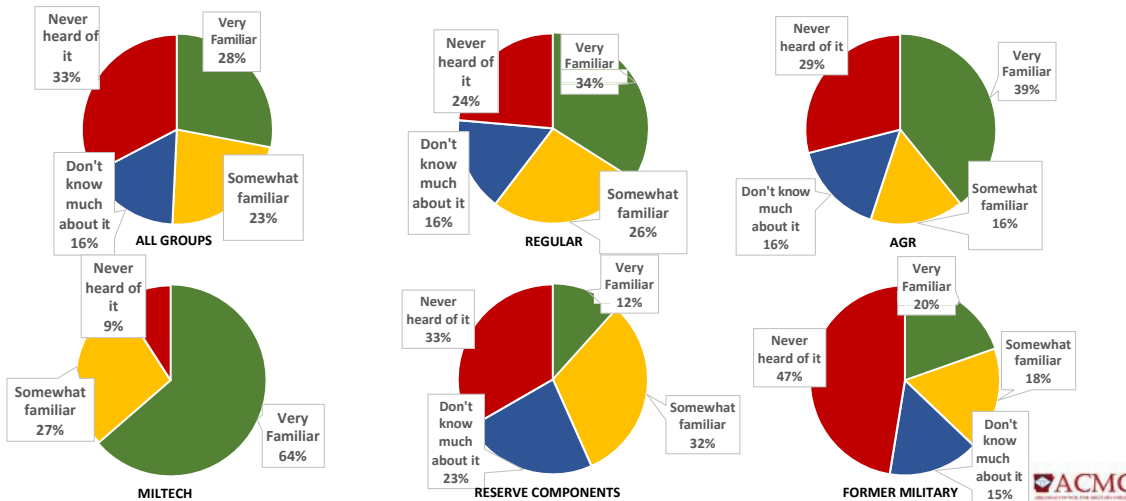

6d. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [School Liaison Program]



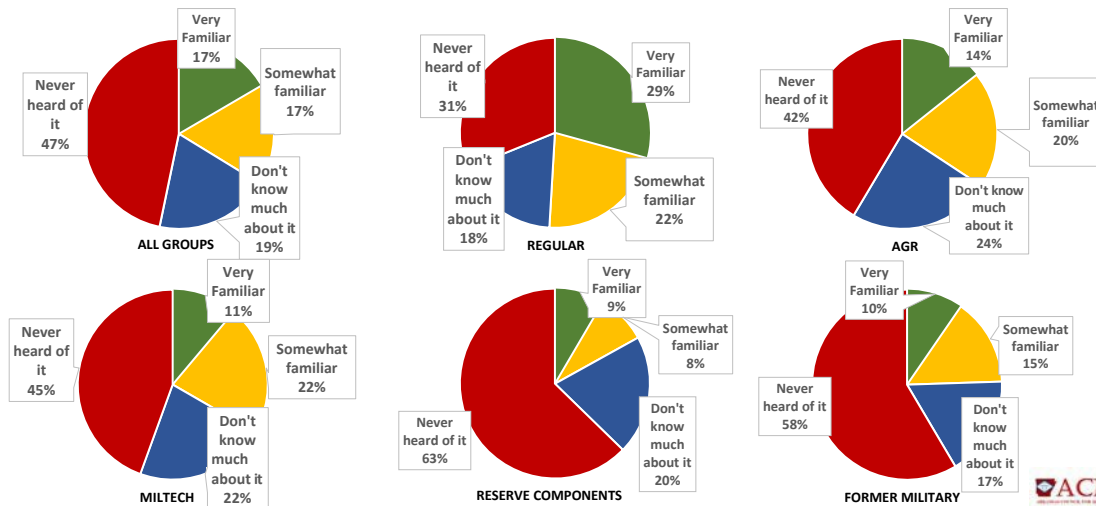

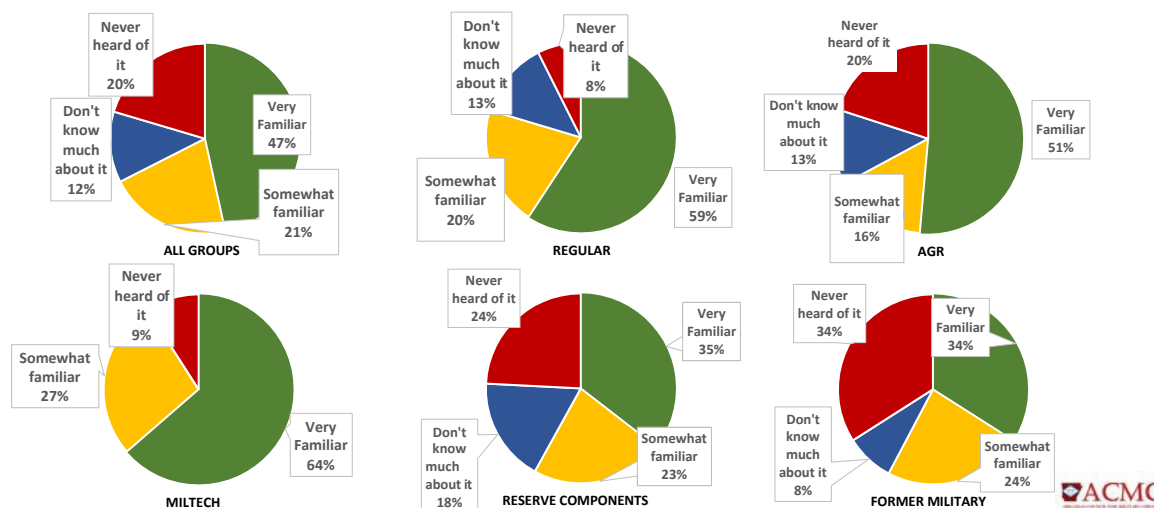

6f. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [Military Family Life Counselor]



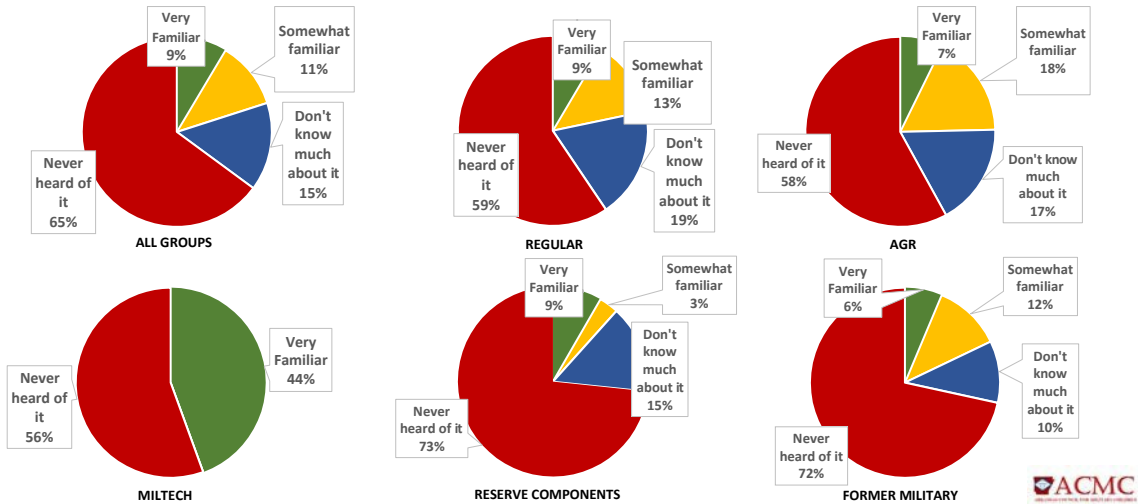

6g. Which of the following organizations or resources for military families are you familiar with? Please mark all that apply. [Military OneSource]



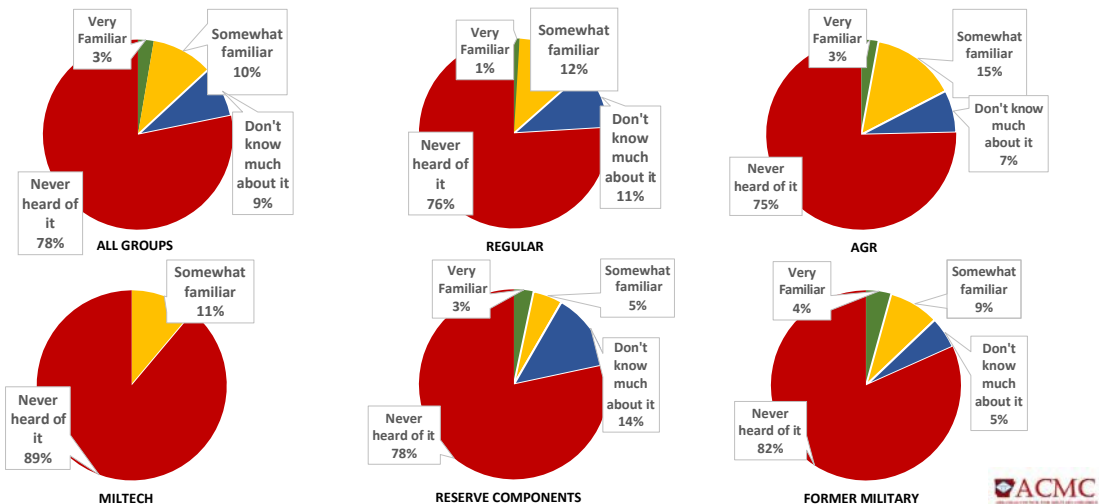

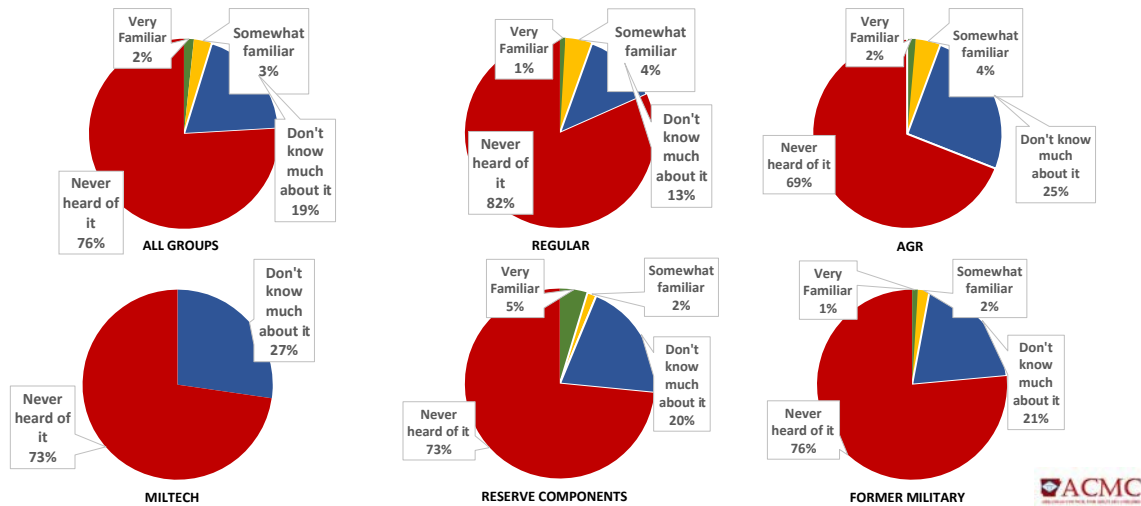

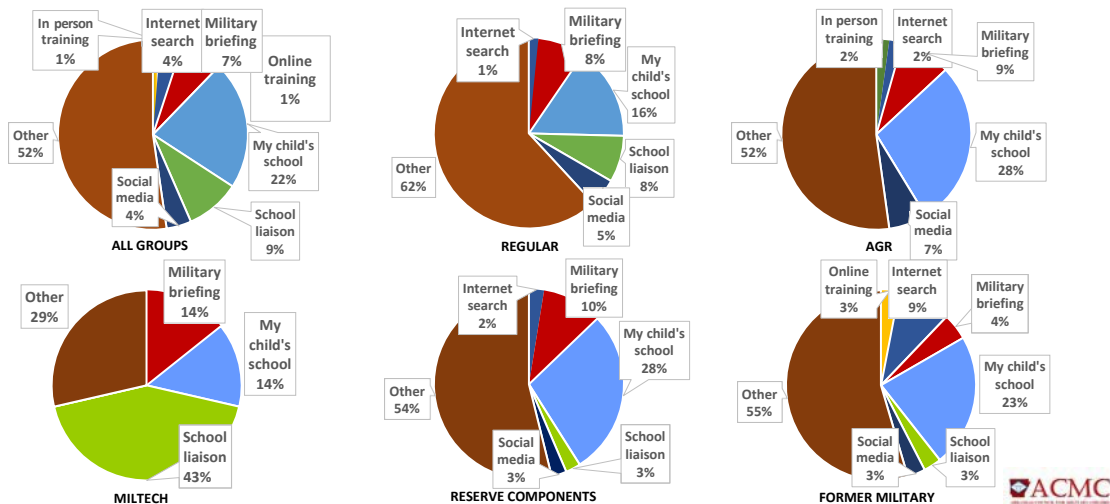

7. How familiar are you with the Arkansas Council for Military Children?



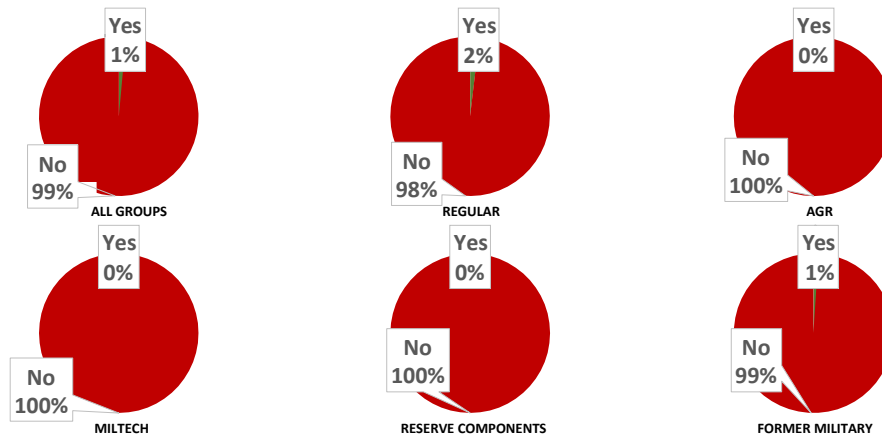

8. How have you received information on the Arkansas Council for Military Children? Please mark all that apply.



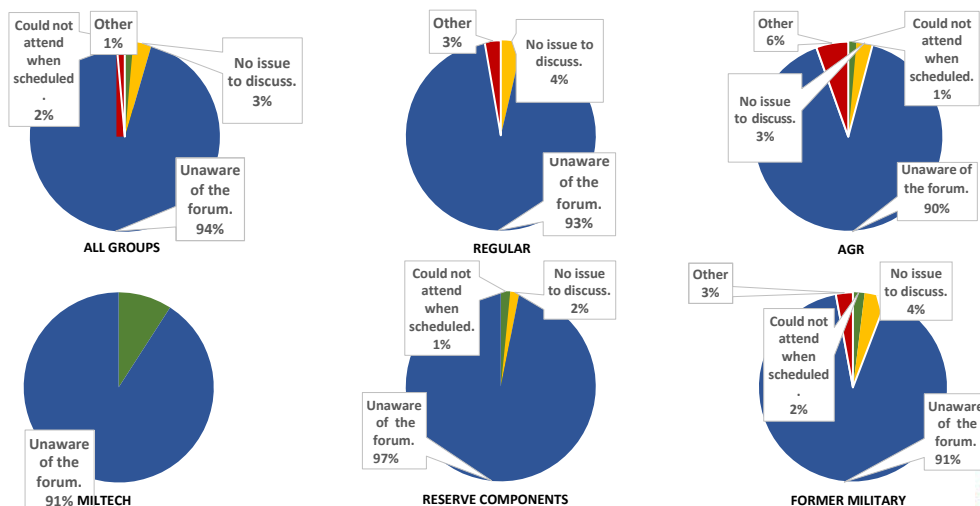

9. Have you ever attended a military family forum conducted by the Arkansas Council for Military Children?



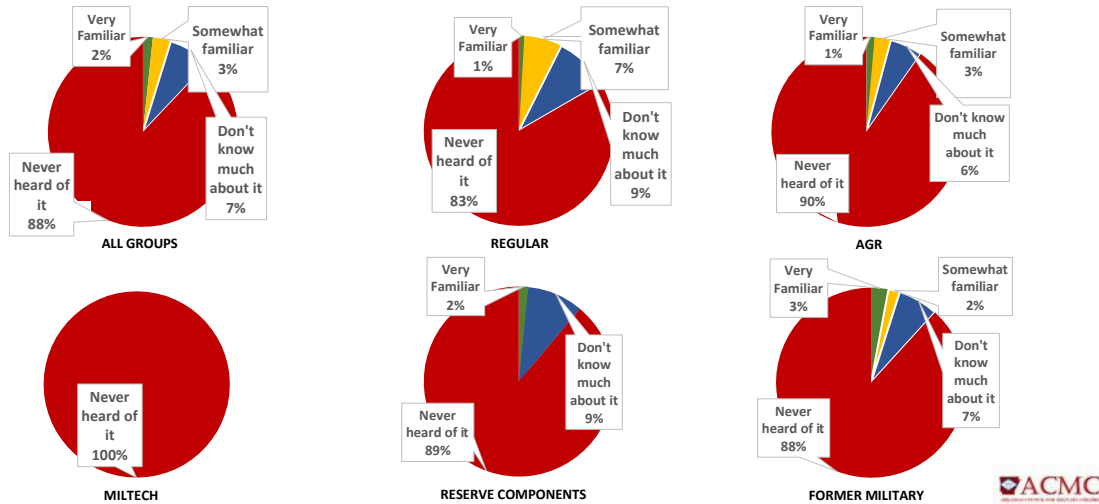

10. Please select the reason below that has kept you from attending a military family forum conducted by the Arkansas Council for Military Children.



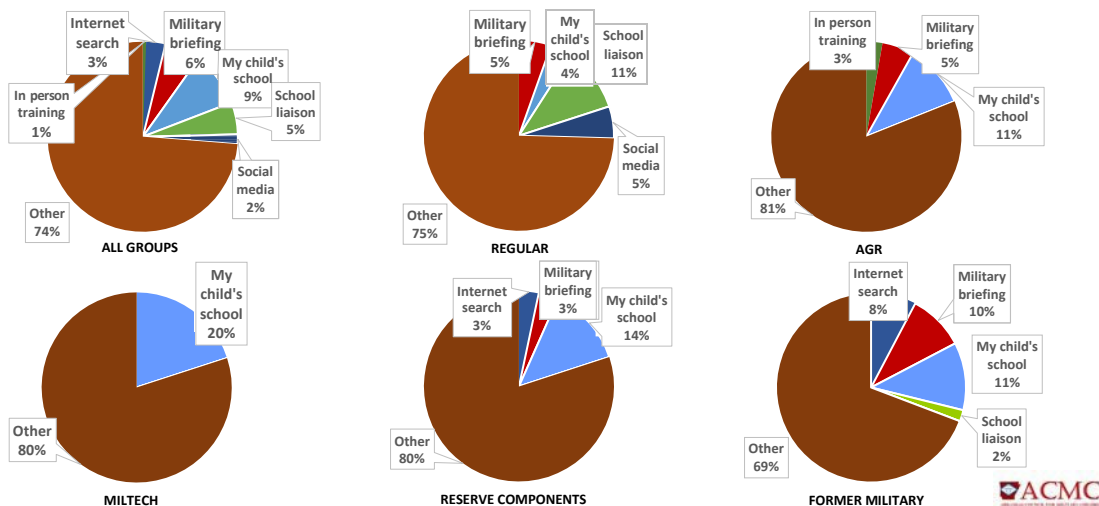

11. How familiar are you with the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission ?



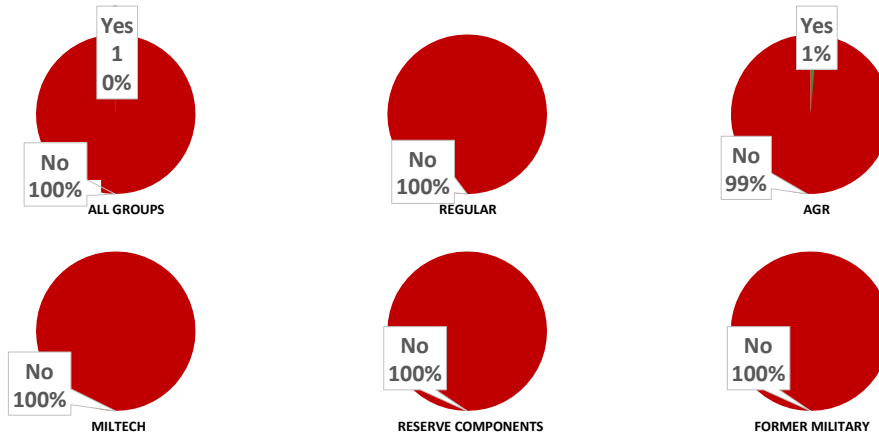

12. How have you received information on the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission? Please mark all that apply.



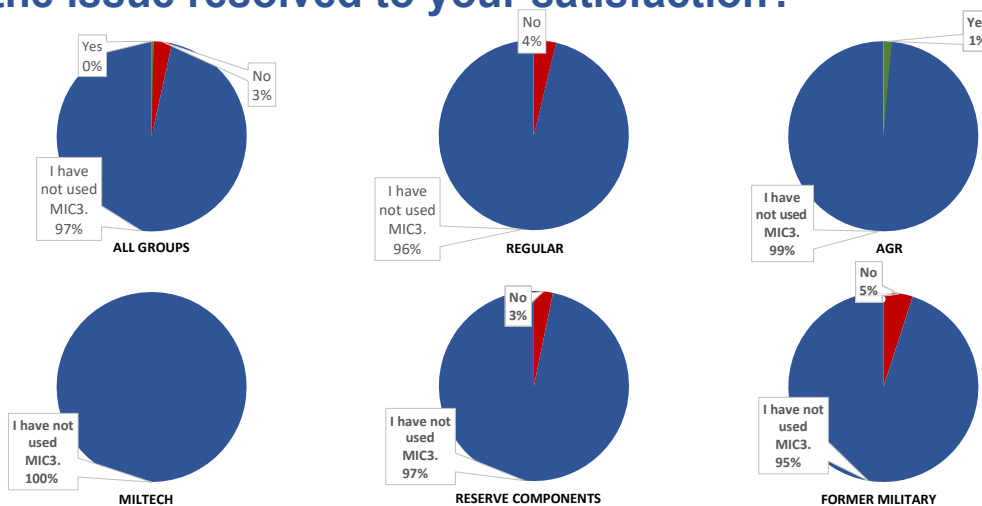

13. Have you used the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission to address an education-related issue for your child since June 30, 2020?



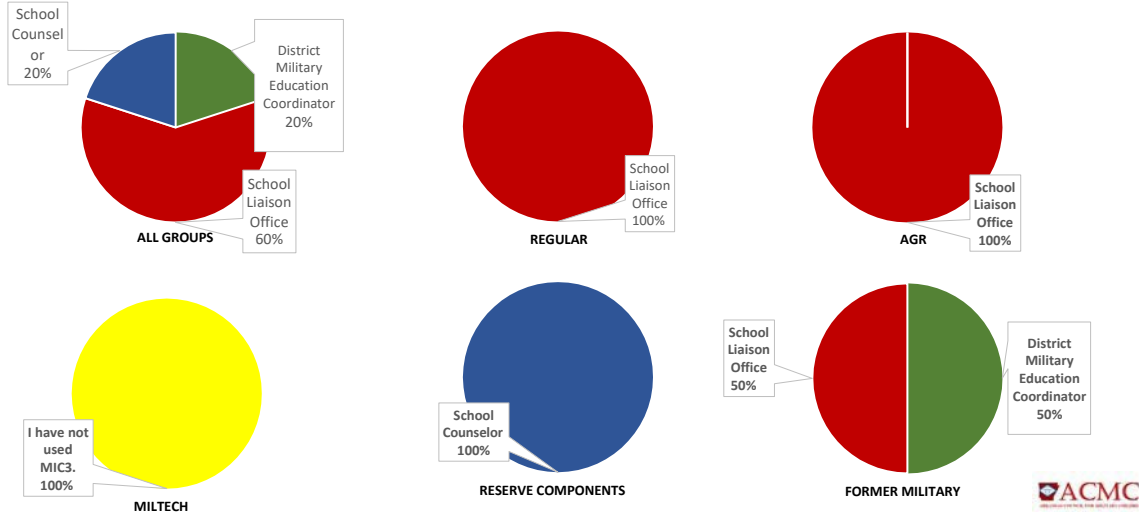

14. If you have used the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission to address an education-related issue for your child since June 30, 2020, was the issue resolved to your satisfaction?



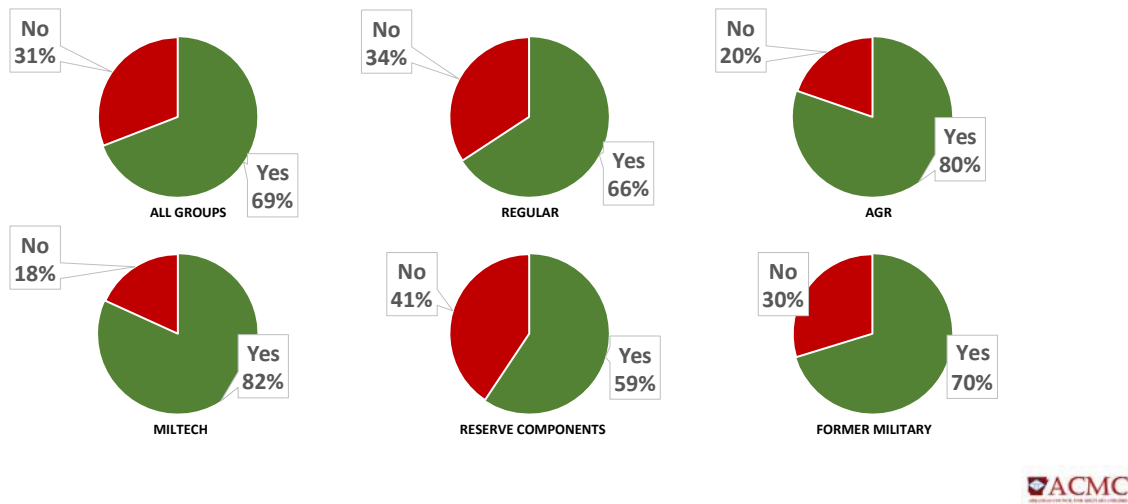

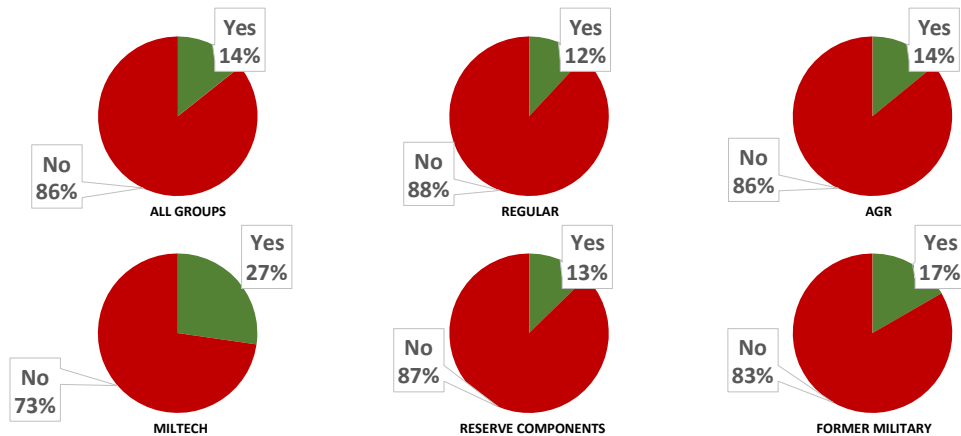

16. Before now, were you aware that Arkansas has a public school choice option?



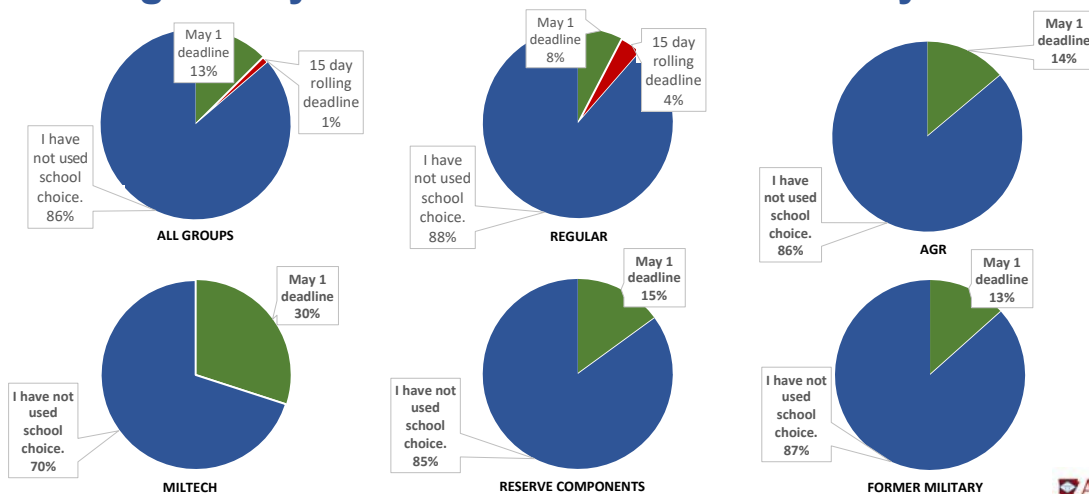

17. Have you exercised your school choice option at any time since June 30, 2020?



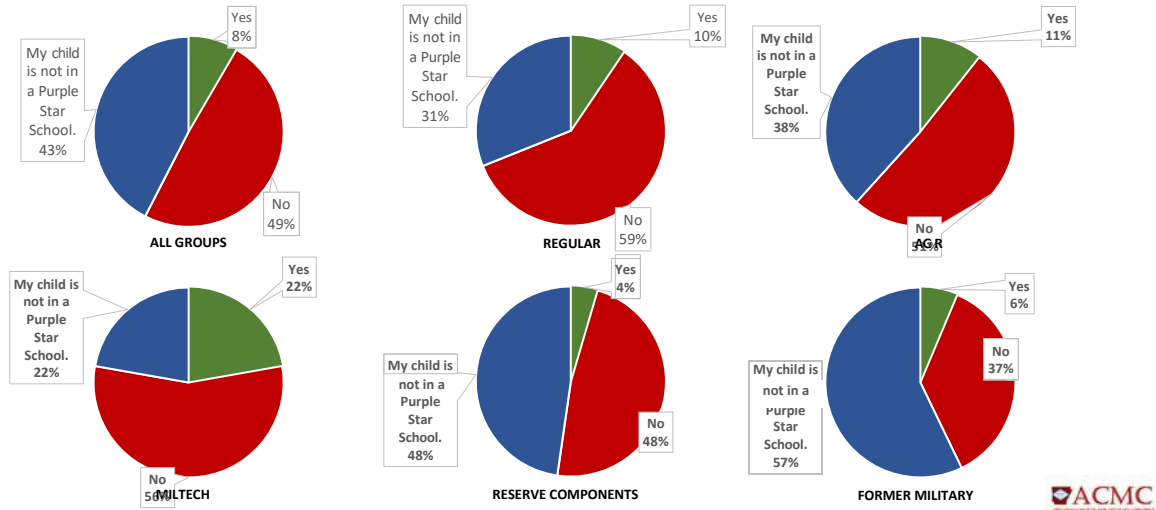

18. If you have used your school choice option, did you submit your application by the statutory deadline of May 1, or did you submit your application by the rolling 15-day deadline available for military families?



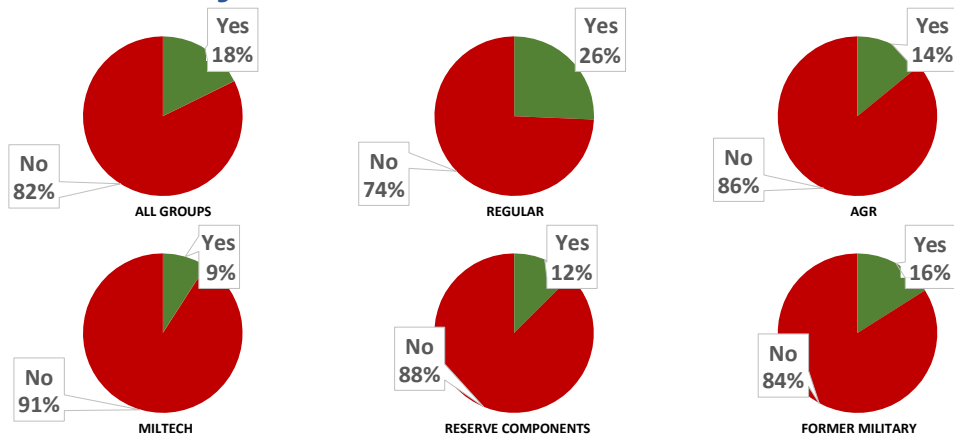

19. If you used your school choice option, was the Purple Star School status a factor?



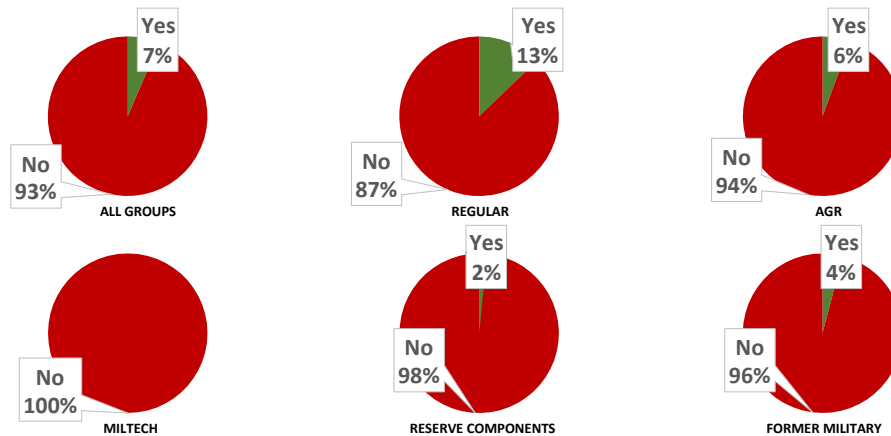

20. Before now, were you aware that Arkansas allows children of military families transferring into Arkansas for military service to enroll in school prior to the family's actual arrival in Arkansas?



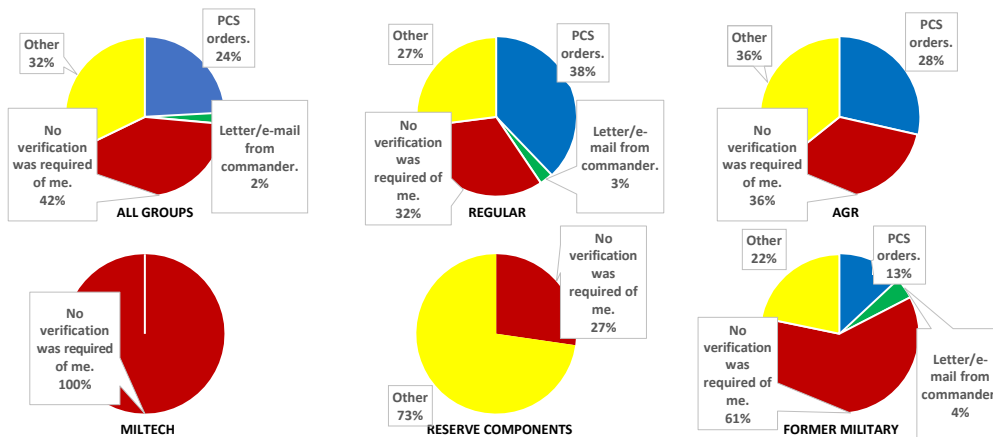

21. Have you used the advance enrollment opportunity for children of in-bound military families?



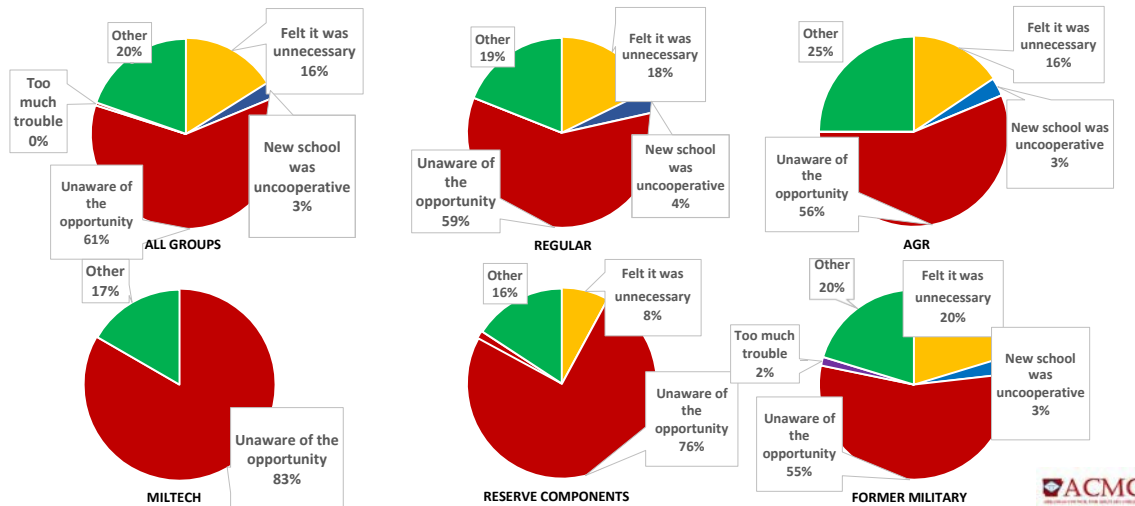

22. If you have used the advance enrollment opportunity for children of military families, what verification of your move did you provide your new school district?



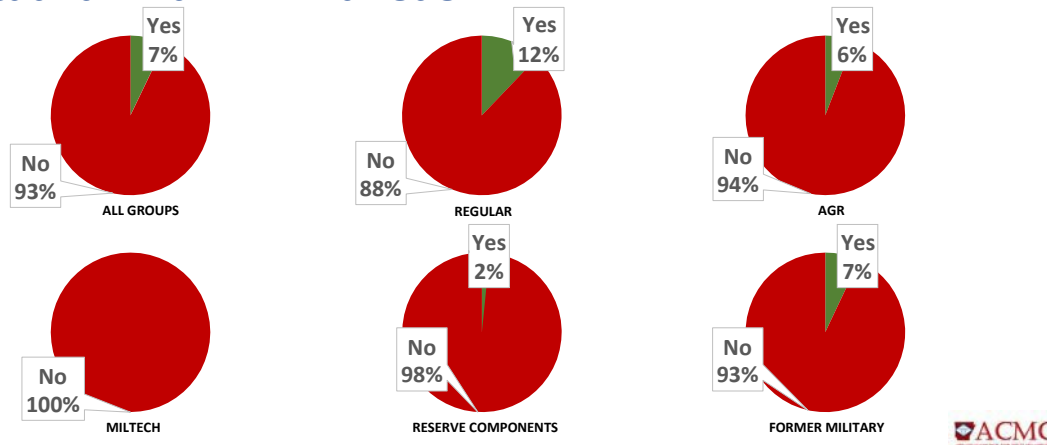

23. If you have not used the opportunity to enroll your child prior to your family's actual arrival in Arkansas, please check all the reasons that apply.



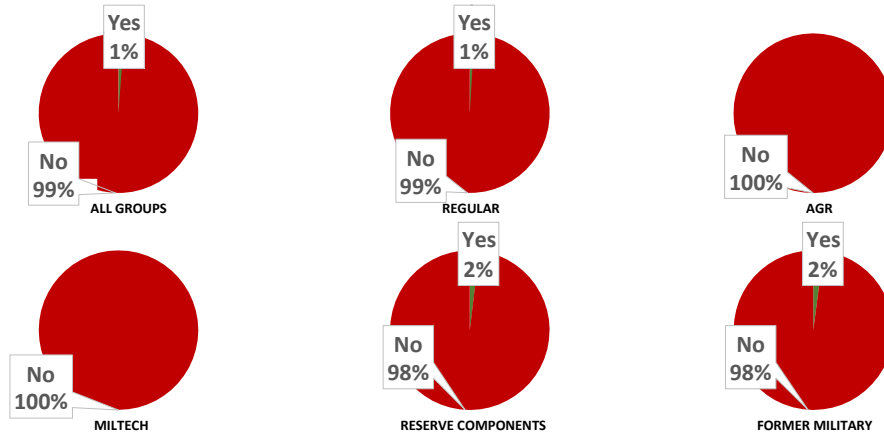

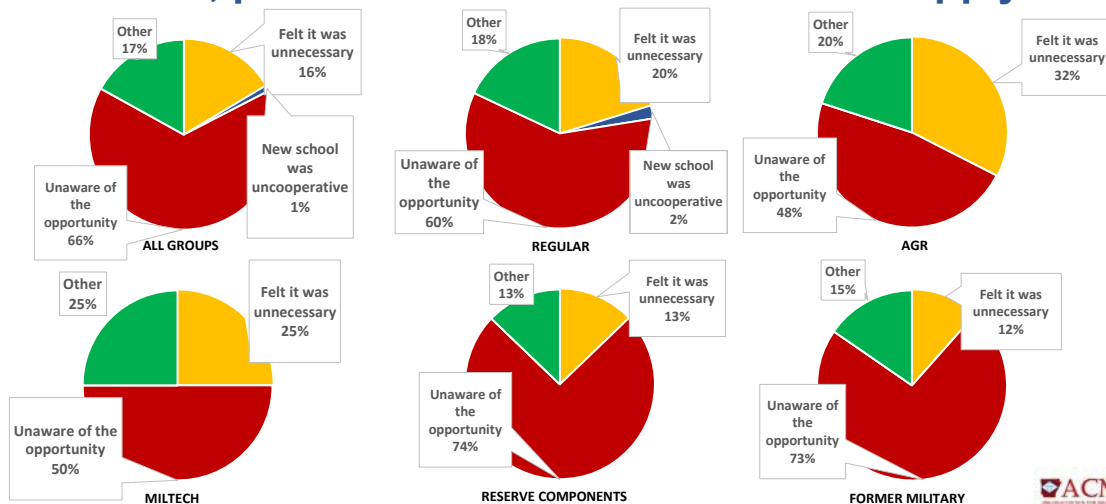

25. Have you used your child's opportunity to enroll in virtual distance-learning or digital coursework prior to your family's actual arrival in Arkansas?



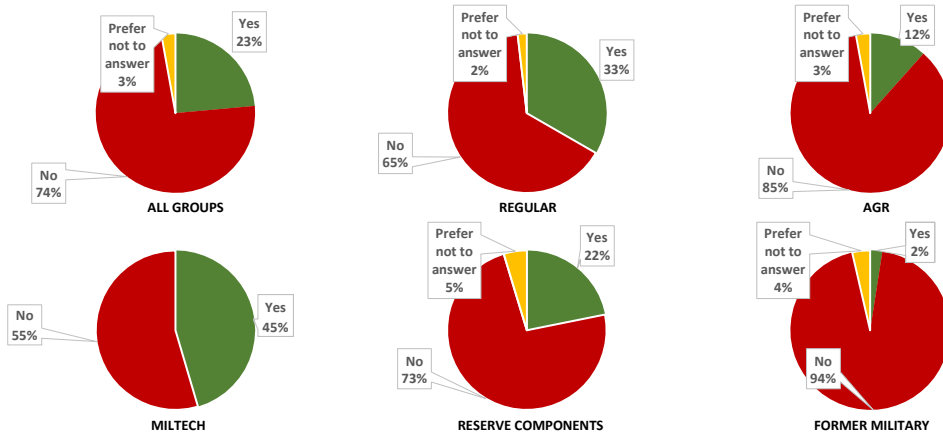

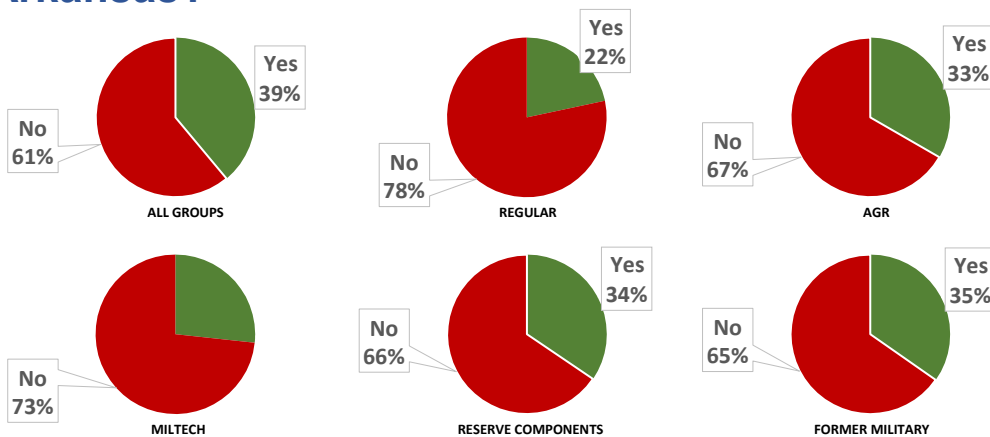

Appendix G: Arkansas Council for Military Children “Best Practices”

The document on the next two pages was developed by representatives of the “Five and Thrive” initiative, a program implemented by the Air Force to improve the quality of life for its families. This document was used by Ms. Sherene Brown as her talking points on best practices for state council of the Military Interstate Children’s Compact Commission during her keynote address at the Commission’s Annual Business Meeting in October 2022.

Partnerships in Education= Thriving Military-Connected Children

PRESENTED BY THE ARKANSAS COUNCIL FOR MILITARY CHILDREN (THE STATE COUNCIL FOR MIC3)

KEYS TO A SUCCESSFUL PARTNERSHIP & BEST PRACTICES

KEYS TO A SUCCESSFUL PARTNERSHIP

- Make sure the School Liaison (SL) is embedded in the state MIC3 Council. Give the SL a seat on the council if possible; if not, appoint the SL as an advisor to the council and make sure the SL can speak at all council meetings.
- Facilitate a relationship between the SL and the state department of education. Make sure the SL knows what is happening in the education community in the state, and make sure the state department and board of education know what's happening in the military community.
- Create conditions for the SL to stay engaged in what is happening in the military community statewide – all branches and services, all installations and outliers (ROTC detachments, recruiting offices). Ensure the SL has constant communication with installation Military & Family Readiness staff.
- Ensure there is a point of contact for military issues in schools with a significant enrollment of children of military families. In Arkansas, state law requires that school districts with at least 20 children of military families must appoint a staff member to serve as District Military Education Coordinator (DMEC) and requires the state department of education to provide training and resources for them. The SL has access to the entire network of DMECs and therefore has a "go-to" staff member in each of those districts.
- Do not settle for "keeping lines of communication open". That's passive. Instead, ensure that communication is happening regularly. That's active!

BEST PRACTICES

- Hold frequent state council meetings. Once a year is fine for reporting, but not sufficient to accomplish goals. AR currently holds bi-monthly in person or virtually for those that cannot attend in person to encourage participation.
- Organize the state council to oversee particular efforts. Involve the SL in any of these that support the SL's mission or in which the SL can help.
- Designate a military family engagement advisor at the state department of education. Ensure that staff member works closely with the SL.
- Hold regular training sessions for District Military Education Coordinators (DMECs). Involve the SL whenever possible. Training can be held in different school districts, at a central or regional location, or online.
- Look for every opportunity to educate stakeholders – use school board meetings, family nights, Key Spouse meetings, Purple Star School training, etc.
- Hold a military family forum so that military families can share concerns to your state MIC3 council. Make sure the SL participates and can engage with the families.

COLLECTIVE STRATEGY TO HELP MILITARY FAMILIES

- Collect information on the needs of the military community. Review reports from organizations like the Military Child Education Coalition, National Military Family Association, Military Family Advisory Network, and BLOOM. Gather anecdotal information from families and from school officials.
- Develop goals that are designed to meet any needs that the SL and others in the network (state council, department of education staff, family readiness staff, DMECs) can accomplish. Set milestone dates and completion target dates. Define what success looks like.

SCHOOL LIAISON PROGRAM MANAGER PERSPECTIVE

KEYS TO A SUCCESSFUL PARTNERSHIP

- Host educator events at installation for various positions (Superintendents, Admin, Counselors, Teachers) across local school districts to include base agencies showing joint team of family support services as a collaborative effort. LRAFB hosted 3 this year!!
- Partner and collaborate with other base agencies hosting events in the community to support local education efforts such as Red Ribbon Week, literacy events, Into the Darkness Walks, Purple Up events, etc. Other base agencies support local schools too!
- Involve Installation Leadership with scholar events such as Keynote for SHE Can STEM events, Veteran's Day school events, BX celebrations and scholar achievements. Col Ochoa flew a C130 to pin 30 cadets for the Smithsonian Aviation SHE Can AR STEM Camp and was Keynote speaker!!
- Include base agency activities into SL give aways to encourage partnership and family engagement at installation, use SL marketing materials at installation agencies! Utilize Facetime Live while there! During Purple Up month hold contest all over base for prizes at ODR, bowling, library and so forth! Do the same outside the gate!

BEST PRACTICES

- SL sits in Welcome Center to ensure a smooth transition for all inbound families; full immersion to First Sergeant and above to include all Commanders and Command Staff, knowledge of program is KEY! They remember you when assistance is needed!
- Display outside of office for easy access of key materials for parents to have access to when not in office is a must! Posters and brochures of districts, MIC3 materials and resource materials for EFMP, MFLC, deployment, etc. Access to materials highlights programs and conversation starters!
- Briefing to the quarterly Key Spouse meeting, spouse's day and spouse immersions hits all key aspects of program to the key members that spread the word! Spouses are your word of mouth!
- Utilize Lifestyle Fair opportunities to spread the word to new Airmen and families, ALS graduates and BX customers. You are the life of the Air force...
- Working partnerships with all aspects of installation units regardless of MIC3 status. Our schools honor our Foreign Nationals "in the spirit of MIC3" even though they do not qualify for services due to our partnerships. This is how you can tell you are making the difference!

COLLECTIVE STRATEGY TO HELP MILITARY FAMILIES

- Assist State Council with additional sub committees with awards, training and outreach to community members, scholars and families. First state to create Outstanding DMEC Award, and Outstanding Military Scholar Award!! The military scholar award will kick off April of 2023!
- Work with EFMP, Teacher of the Year and local districts to create Spec Education enrollment opportunities for first time scholars. Open Q&A session style! You don't know what you don't know until you know!
- State Council Family Forum virtual events during evenings, lunch and learns and during events for families to learn of MIC3 program and state statue. Survey forms passed out throughout the year during parent car lines, at sporting events and to varied schools to collect data. Go where the parents are, do not expect them to come to you at events!
- Use marketing materials for particular trends, not just random swag. Make the point count! Families will not throw it away that way, your impact will STICK!
- Master Resiliency Trainer for BOUNCE program assisting families with Resiliency programs for scholars enhancing mental health strategies during stressful situations such as transitions and deployments.

Appendix H: MIC3 Legislative Toolkit

In 2018 the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission undertook an initiative to determine the best course of action to extend the protections of the Compact to the children of Reserve Component service members. In October 2022 at its Annual Business Meeting the Commission voted to recommend that states undertake legislative action outside of the Compact to include Reserve Component families. The Commission offered Arkansas' legislative action in 2021 as an example for other states to follow. That recommendation is indicated in the memorandum next under.

National Guard and Reserve (NGR) Legislative Toolkit

Purpose:

At the 2022 Annual Business Meeting (ABM), the Commission voted in favor of providing resources and guidance to member states who wish to enact new legislation outside the Compact to provide identical benefits to a wider population of NGR members.

Pursuant to this direction, the Commission developed this toolkit. While this guidance is specific to the NGR population, it may be modified and applied to other highly mobile populations within member states.

Compact Background Related to the National Guard and Reserve (NGR)

The *Interstate Commission on Educational Opportunity for Military Children* (the Compact), whose administrative body is known as the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3), is an interstate compact that supports successful educational transitions for military-connected students. It was drafted in 2006 by the Council of State Governments' National Center for Interstate Compacts in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Defense, national associations, federal and state officials, State Departments of Education, and school administrators. Interstate compacts are contractual agreements between states, written into statute, that allow state governments to work collaboratively when addressing issues or concerns across boundaries. The Compact provides for the uniform treatment of military children transferring between public and Department of Defense Education Activity school districts and states and addresses key educational transitions issues such as: eligibility for academic programs, course enrollment, academic placement, and graduation.

While compacts are effective mechanisms for solving interstate problems without resorting to federal legislation, they are limited by the scope of their statutes. The current language of the Compact applies to the children of National Guard and Reserve (NGR) Service Members serving under Title 10 status, also referred to as active-duty orders. In 2019, MIC3's Executive Committee established the National Guard and Reserve Task Force (NGRTF), to examine whether the scope of the Compact should be expanded to include additional NGR members.

The NGRTF presented its final report to the Commission on October 2, 2020, during the 2020 Annual Business Meeting (ABM). In summary, the NGRTF recommended supporting expansion of the Compact to cover all members of the Selected Reserve but did not recommend how this could be accomplished. During the 2021 ABM, the issue was tabled until the 2022 ABM for Commissioners to consult with their respective State Councils.

General Counsel previously endorsed the adoption of stand-alone statutes in a legal memorandum on February 16, 2022, [Application of MIC3 to National Guard & Reserve Members](#), stating, “Based on current information, new state legislation enacted outside the Compact in interested member states providing identical benefits to NGR members is likely to be the most efficient way forward as this solution is scalable, legally sound, and would have a uniform impact.”

Assistance from the National Office and General Counsel

The National Office stands ready to assist member states interested in developing stand-alone statutes in their state to provide Compact-like benefits to NGR families or other highly mobile populations. It is highly recommended that states submit their draft language to the National Office for review by General Counsel to ensure the new statutory language does not conflict with their current Interstate Compact statute.

General Counsel Guidance

In collaboration with the Executive Committee and National Office, General Counsel has provided the following list of “Do’s and Don’ts” that should be followed when developing external legislative language.

Do:

- Identify specific populations to be covered by the new stand-alone statute.
- Identify specific benefits to be provided to this population.
- Identify education and enforcement systems to support the provision of these new benefits; identify funding sources where additional funding will be needed.
- Review draft legislation with attorneys on your MIC3 State Counsel and/or legal counsel for your state’s legislative branch prior to submission to the National Office.
- After an internal state-level review, submit the proposed bill language to the National Office for vetting by General Counsel to ensure it does not conflict with the Interstate Compact statute.
- After approval by General Counsel, work with the legislative member(s) of your MIC3 State Council to identify the appropriate process for submitting bill proposals within your state legislature.
- Submit the approved bill to your state legislature and track the proposed bill as it moves through the legislative process in your state.

Don't:

- **Do not** draft language which would impose requirements on other states or federal agencies.
- **Do not** amend or open the current Compact statute in your state.
- **Do not** attempt to supersede or override the Compact statute; avoid language such as “notwithstanding any other statutes to the contrary”, or similar provisions.
- **Do not** alter statutory language after approval by General Counsel.

Adopted External Legislation

Arkansas (Adopted)

On April 2, 2019, Arkansas ***Senate Bill 638, “Concerning the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Children of Military Families; And to Amend Aspects of the Arkansas Code with Respect to Children of Military Families Who Are Enrolled in A Public School”***, passed Arkansas’ General Assembly and was signed into law by Governor Asa Hutchinson on April 17, 2019. Referred to as Act 939, it provides Compact-like benefits to children of National Guard members, provides for advanced enrollment of students, and expands the pre-deployment activities window. Act 939 also requires school districts with at least 20 military-connected student or 3,000 students overall to appoint a Military Education Coordinator to support military-connected students in transition.

The Connecticut State Council (Council) met in a joint meeting with the Military School Liaison Committee (MSLC) on September 22, 2022. The Council discussed the MIC3 training webinars. Several MSLC members expressed interest in receiving notification of these training sessions. The group was advised that the Commission would be voting on the NGR issue at the Annual Business Meeting. The groups were advised of the need for an amendment to Connecticut General Statutes Section 10-15f to correct a citation error. It also reviewed the proposed amendment to MIC3 Rule 6.102 Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities. The Council and the MSLC provided local school district and service updates to the group.

The Council's second joint meeting with the MSLC of this fiscal year was held in person on May 11, 2023. The group was advised of the Commission's decision on the NGR issue, the progress

of the bill to amend the Connecticut Compact language, the Commission's discussion of data collection, and the Penn State Study (SPEAK Military Children.) The group also discussed the need to define "deployment" for the purpose of clarifying when a family may ask for the 10-day excused absence (which is required under state law.) The progress on the documentation of military enlistment for the purpose of reporting post-secondary outcomes was also discussed.

The Commissioner's Designee attended the MCEC Conference and the NAFIS September 2022 Conference as the MIC3 representative. Also, the Commissioner's Designee and the School Liaison Officer for the Submarine Base conducted a join MIC3/SLO training session for Groton Public Schools counselors on November 8, 2022.

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Background

Iowa is the temporary home to approximately 1,333 active duty military service members and 2,017 active duty military dependents residing in the state. Iowa is also the long-term home for 15,887-plus military Guard and Reserve personnel and their families. Iowa also has over 9,943 military dependent school-aged children who are family members of those serving in the Iowa National Guard, the U.S. Army Reserves, the Iowa Air National Guard, the Marines, the Marine Reserves, the Navy, the Navy Reserves and the U.S. Army. Iowa has military installations located in Des Moines (Fort Des Moines) and Johnston (Camp Dodge). There are many Guard, Reserves and Armed Forces Reserve Centers across the state.



The Iowa Compact Commission for Educational Opportunity for Military Dependents (known in short form as the Iowa Compact) is designed to assist military families with their transition to Iowa and to the public school system. The Iowa Compact addresses key educational transition issues encountered by military families, including enrollment, placement, attendance, eligibility and graduation. Children of active duty members of the uniformed services,

National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders and members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year, are eligible for assistance under the Iowa Compact. The Iowa Compact uses a comprehensive approach to provide a consistent policy in every school district that military dependents choose to enter. The Iowa Compact has no funds to support an annual meeting, pay dues, etc. Finally, it should be noted that the Iowa Compact applies only to interstate transfers, not in-state transfers.

Statutory Requirements



Iowa was the 14th state to sign on to the Interstate Compact in 2009. Since then, all 50 states and territories have signed on to the Interstate Compact. Each state pays dues as a member of the Interstate Compact. The dues are used to cover the cost of the operations and activities of the interstate compact and its staff.

Pursuant to Iowa Code section 256H, the Iowa Compact is a Governor-appointed council that has been established for the purpose of removing barriers to educational success imposed on the children of military families because of frequent deployment of their parents (Iowa Code section 256H.1.1). The seven-member commission consists of a school superintendent or designee; the Iowa Department of Education Director or designee; two gubernatorial appointments, one who is appointed as the Iowa Compact chairperson, and another is the military families' education liaison, and a joint appointment made by the Iowa Legislature (Iowa Code section 256H.2.2).

The Department-appointed members were chosen because of their affiliation to having children of military personnel (including the National Guard) within their school districts, being connected to school-related issues for such children, or having a long-standing relationship to the military or the National Guard.

The Iowa Compact is required to meet at least once each calendar year for the purpose of addressing issues involving the dependents of military families seeking resolution such as:

1. Official, unofficial, or hand-carried education records or transcripts;
2. Continued enrollment at the same grade level when transferring between states;
3. Course and program placements, including special education services, in all subject areas;
4. Waiving of course and program prerequisites and other pre-conditions; and,
5. The granting of additional absences due to situations related to deployments.

A full description of the issues is detailed in Iowa Code sections 256H.1.4, 256H.1.5, 256H.1.6, and 256H.1.7.

Current Status/Activities

- No student issues were brought before the Iowa Compact during the 2022-2023 academic year.
- The annual board meeting of the Iowa Military Interstate Compact Commission was held on May 15, 2023.
- Laura Kacer was appointed Commissioner of the Iowa Compact on February 3, 2023.

Activities of the State Council

MIC3 Annual Conference (October 19-20, 2022)

Kentucky State Council Commissioner Bullard attended the 2022 Annual Business Meeting (ABM) held in October in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. This was the first MIC3 ABM to be held in person since October 2019 due to COVID restrictions. Key topics addressed at the ABM included a resolution of the National Guard and Reserve inclusion proposal. Commissioners voted not to attempt to open the base MIC3 legislative due to the associated complexities; however, they endorsed the concept of states adopting their own state-specific legislation to do so, similar to existing legislation covering Guard and Reserve personnel in Arkansas and a similar best-practice legislation (KRS 156.735) in Kentucky providing compact protection to DOD civilian employees and their families. MIC3 has developed a legislative tool kit for interested states. Kentucky already has draft legislation in place – House Bill 63 in the 2023 General Assembly, which passed the House and passed through Senate committee but did not get a vote on the floor of the Senate due to time constraints. The legislation will be filed again in the 2024 Kentucky General Assembly. MIC3 staff will also assist states in crafting a citation correction to the compact, in which the base federal law was inadvertently cited as a section instead of chapter. This correction was included in House Bill 63.

State Council Annual Meeting (January 24, 2023; virtual)

The State Council conducted its annual meeting on January 24, 2023 through Zoom video teleconference. In Kentucky, per direction of the governor, the KCMA executive director serves as the state commissioner for this national program, with a Kentucky Department of Education representative. Brian Perry succeeded Tracy Goff-Herman in the KDE role after Goff-Herman left state government service late summer 2022. Those present included Commissioner Bullard, Military MIC3 Representative Colonel Lance O'Bryan (Fort Knox Garrison Commander), Hardin County Schools Superintendent Teresa Morgan, Tracy Leath representing Christian County Public Schools Superintendent Chris Bentzel, State Senator Mike Wilson, Fort Knox School

Liaison Officer Brenda Weatherington, and Stacey Shane (KCMA). David Wickersham of the Kentucky Department of Education's Office of Special Education and Early Learning planned to attend representing Commissioner of Education Jason Glass; however, before the meeting began he was pulled away for a federal government call and was unable to join. Mr. Perry and Rep. Dossett were unable to attend due to scheduling conflicts.

Commissioner Bullard said that MIC3, which ensures smooth transfer to new school districts, is very effective here in Kentucky. We have a great partnership with Kentucky Department of Education and our DODEA school liaisons at Fort Knox and Fort Campbell. All elements continue to go well, he briefed. Our MIC3 State Council membership is full, and cases are at a minimum, with one case reaching the state level thus far this current fiscal year.

National MIC3 Executive Director Cherise Imai praised the MIC3 team's outstanding relationship with the Kentucky council and school liaison officers. She also outlined the implementation of the new 3-year MIC3 strategic plan, focusing on education, outreach and training. Commissioners adopted a new rule for extra-curricular activities that originated from an Elizabethtown, Kentucky case from February 2022 in which a military student was unable to make his high school baseball team. The new rule clarifies the intent associated with the availability of tryout information to help ensure all new students receive important information on extra-curricular activities available to them. MIC3 has produced several new training videos and continues to do monthly on-line training, with the potential for in-person training – an excellent option for nearby states, especially Kentucky, which hosts the MIC3 staff with the Council of State Governments in Lexington.

State Training Activities

MIC3 national staff conducted in-person training with Elizabethtown Independent Schools staff in early January 2023, joined by Fort Knox School Liaison Officer Brenda Weatherington. Commissioner Bullard had a conflict that day, so he filmed an introduction for the event with the assistance of Lindsay Dablow of the national MIC3 team. The filmed introduction is not time-sensitive and may be reused as needed. In addition, Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer Laquvia Garrett did an outstanding job hosting multiple training events in the counties around her installation through the first quarter of 2023, and also assisted in hosting local area Kentucky Purple Star induction ceremonies as a guest speaker.

Additional Duties

Commissioner Bullard continues to serve as national Compliance Committee chair, which also places him on the national MIC3 Executive Committee. He was appointed to this role in January 2022. The Compliance Committee meets bi-monthly and the Executive Committee meets quarterly.

Supporting Legislation

As noted earlier in this report, the Kentucky MIC3 Council worked with council member Rep. Myron Dossett to file omnibus military legislation in the form of House Bill 63, which includes the MIC3 Compact Statute Correction for KRS 156.730 and the addition of the National Guard and Reserve to the protections of KRS 156.735. House Bill 63 passed the House unanimously in late February 2023, with a sponsor change to freshman Representative Steve Bratcher, then languished for nearly a month in Senate committee as legislative action stalled in general due to the highly charged general politics of the session. House Bill 63 passed Senate committee the second to last week of the session in March; however, time ran out on the session before it could be heard on the floor the final day. We will bring this legislation back for consideration in the 2024 General Assembly, which is a longer session and is expected to pass easily. The General Assembly did pass two Defense State Liaison Office priority occupational licensing compact bills, one entering Kentucky into the new Interstate Teacher Mobility Compact (House Bill 319) and the other entering Kentucky into the

new Cosmetology compact (Senate Bill 57). Kentucky is a leader in occupational compacts and is a member of eight of the 13 current DOD priority compacts (five being new this year). We were hoping to add the Emergency Medical Services Compact this year; however, the national compact is conducting a legal review on state concerns, so we elected to postpone consideration until the 2024 session. The remaining DOD-priority compacts pending potential sponsorship entering the 2024 session are the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse Compact (this one's been a challenge, as well, with employer concerns about APRNs seeking higher paying contracts elsewhere), the Dental and Dental Hygienist Compact, the Interstate Massage Therapy Compact and the Physician Associates Compact. The 2024 session will also see legislation to incorporate the Kentucky Purple Star Schools program.

Month of the Military Child

In 2021, a major highlight of our year was the completion of two videos and a Governor's proclamation honoring April's Month of the Military Child. The Governor and First Lady teamed up to film a follow-on video on their social media for 2022. At our invitation, First Lady Brittainy Beshear visited Fort Knox DODEA schools on April 21, 2023 to promote the Month of the Military Child, meet installation leaders, and promote military family readiness.

Annual State Dues Assessment

Kentucky received its Fiscal Year 2024 dues assessment for membership in the MIC3 on May 1, 2023, in the amount of \$10,355, invoice number FY24-001KY, and submitted it for payment, per Governor-directed memo, to the Kentucky Department of Military Affairs. The current dues formula for FY24 is outlined in the Compact Rules, Chapter 200, Sec. 2.103 (<http://www.mic3.net/assets/rules-book-edits-20190905.pdf>). Payments are due by September 30, 2023. Payment in full was immediately processed by the Department of Military Affairs and was received by MIC3 on May 11, 2023.

Administrative Requirements

Commissioner Bullard completed and submitted to MIC3 his mandatory Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest statements at the MIC3 Annual Business Meeting in October 2022. All Kentucky administrative requirements for the fiscal year are complete with the filing of this year's Annual Report on June 30, 2023.

FY23 Kentucky MIC3 Cases (one)

- Army family assigned to Fort Knox; successfully resolved
 - Bullitt County Schools informed the soldier his children cannot attend school next year unless he gets a Kentucky driver's license
 - This is in violation of KRS 186.430, with this exemption adopted into Kentucky law during the 2021 Kentucky General Assembly (House Bill 277)
 - Military personnel assigned to Kentucky are allowed to maintain their official home of record outside Kentucky, as many soldiers do (including this soldier), and may retain a valid driver's license from that state versus obtaining a Kentucky license
 - The school official was simply unaware of this legislation, understandable as it was recently passed, and promptly complied with its intent
 - No further issues are anticipated

Military Student Identifier Update

As part of Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requirements, the U.S. Department of Education requires school districts to identify students who are armed forces family members. This information is a voluntary submission by parents and guardians. Kentucky’s Student Information System (KSIS) includes a “Military Connections” tab to track guardian data for those who are active duty military personnel. A student is considered military connected if a parent or guardian is a member of the armed forces on active duty or serves on full-time National Guard duty. KDE continues to promote the importance of this data collection to public schools and districts.

Dear Governor Moore, President Ferguson, and Speaker Jones:

Pursuant to §7-1303 of the Education Article (MSAR #7598) and Executive Order 01.01.2010.09 (MSAR #8880), the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) shall report annually to the Governor, the Maryland General Assembly, Judiciary, and State Council of the member states concerning the activities of the Interstate Commission on Educational Opportunity for Military Children during the preceding year. Such reports shall also include any recommendations that may have been adopted by the Interstate Commission. Maryland adopted the Compact in 2009 when the Maryland General Assembly added the Compact provisions to the Maryland Code.

The Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) is the national organization leading the work on educational opportunities for military children. MIC3 is proud that all 50 states and the District of Columbia are members of the Interstate Compact. The Interstate Compact ensures the uniform treatment of military children transferring between states. It was developed by the Council of State Governments' National Center for Interstate Compacts, the U.S. Department of Defense, national associations, federal and state officials, the Department of Education of each State, school administrators, and military families.

Military children face many challenges as the military family transfers from one assignment to the next. The average military student faces transition more than twice during high school and most military children will attend six to nine different schools from kindergarten to 12th grade. The Compact seeks to make the transition easier for children of military families to ensure that they are afforded the same opportunities for educational success as other children and are not penalized or delayed in achieving their educational goals.

In accordance with the requirement of the Education Article to report on the work of the Interstate Compact, please find attached the following:

Maryland was represented at the Annual Business Meeting and the Executive Committee Meetings by Mary L. Gable, Assistant State Superintendent, Division of Student Support, Academic Enrichment, and Educational Policy, Maryland State Department of Education. Ms. Gable is the Maryland State Commissioner and the Chairperson of the MIC3 Rules Committee. As Commissioner, Ms. Gable annually shares information on the Interstate Compact with the Directors of Student Services, Coordinators of School Counselors across the 24 local education agencies (LEAs), and other groups. Ms. Gable assists families and the LEAs when there are challenges in a student's transition.

Dr. Cheryl Dyson, Superintendent, Frederick County Public Schools, represented the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland (PSSAM) at the State Council on June 8, 2023, and plans to share the information on the Compact with all local Superintendents.

Information on the accomplishments of the Military Interstate Compact Commission can be found in the attached 2022 Annual Report. Also attached are copies of the agenda and minutes of the June 8, 2023, meeting of Maryland's State Council for the Interstate Compact. Each state must have a State Council that meets annually.

The Interstate Compact operates under rules that were adopted by the Compact and each state. In order to make these rules available, a Compact Rules Desk Reference is available for each Commissioner. A copy of the rules can be found at: <https://mic3.net/publications/>. The Compact Rules document was thoroughly reviewed and updated as needed by the MIC3 Rules Committee and presented at the Annual Business Meeting in October, 2022.

The Chairperson of the Commission continues to communicate through a monthly newsletter with each State Commissioner and Ex-Officio member of MIC3. A question considered by every State Council this year was the addition to the Compact of National Guard and reserve dependents beyond those under Title


10 active-duty status. Also discussed was a technical correction needed for every state's Compact language. The need for the technical correction is being discussed by every State Council.

2023 Annual MIC3 Report

New Hampshire

Dear Executive Director Cherise Imai,

I am honored to submit the 2023 annual Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission report on behalf of the New Hampshire State Council, supporting students whose parents/guardians are on active duty or serving in the National Guard or the Reserves.

Throughout the year the New Hampshire MIC3 State Council has remained active in its support of the Compact under Title VIII as defined in New Hampshire's RSA's (Revised Statutes Annotated).

The Council met their obligation to hold a state council meeting on May 23rd via an online meeting to accommodate the members' busy schedules. Council members were provided updates on the annual business meeting held in the Fall of 2022. The Council was provided highlights on the inclusion of the National Guard and Reserves. The discussion focused on the challenges faced during deployment including mental health counseling for adults and children, access to affordable childcare, spousal employment, and health care. The members were also updated on House Bill 1653 signed into law by Governor Sununu and key issues for the US DOD.

The Council heard reports regarding the MIC3 National Strategic Plan 2023-2025 and the work of the Training Committee to provide resources for the states as well as training for essential staff in schools.

One activity that has been well received by the council members was the case studies of situations facing military families. This provided the attendees with real life situations and solutions to support the students and families.

New Hampshire is very fortunate to have the Commander of the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard as part of the Council. This year, Commander Smith has kept the council up to date on the growth occurring at the shipyard with the construction of 2 additional dry docks as well as the significant increase in personnel for both temporary and permanent sailors and families.

In addition to Commander Smith's update on the activities at the naval shipyard, David Madden 157th Airman and Family Readiness Coordinator for Pease Air Force Base shared with the council the arrival of 159 Airmen. He discussed the challenges faced with housing availability and costs.

This year the council wanted to hold a "Tri State Council meeting (NH, VT, and Maine) given that we share some of the same challenges. We were unable to schedule this event, but the council has every intention to move forward with this initiative. The Commander of the Navy Shipyard has graciously offered his facility for the meeting as well as a tour of the shipyard.

This winter the student liaison (SLO) for the Navy, Kristen Ferullo presented an overview of the MIC3 work in the state to school superintendents at their monthly meeting held in Concord. Kristen's presentation was well received and generated many additional questions and requests for information.

Many resources are available to schools including Purple Star School Toolbox, Deployment Kits, Tutor. Com and apprenticeships available at the shipyard.

For the past several years as Commissioner, I have served on the national MIC3 Training Committee. The committee meets monthly and is responsible for supporting new Commissioner's via a Mentorship program and a variety of webinars. In addition, the committee supports the development of training tools to be used by groups supporting students and families as well as for families learning about the support offered by the Compact.

The Council affirmed the following recommendation for the upcoming year.

- Organize and hold a Tri State meeting of MIC3 leadership from Maine, Vermont, and New Hampshire.
- Broaden the reach of the School Liaison Kristen Ferullo via various organizations throughout the state such as School Principals, School Counselors, Social Workers, and Superintendents.
- Work with the NHED (New Hampshire Education Department) to improve the military identifier data.
- The state council recommended a targeted effort to add voices to the council. This includes a legislative representative, Governor's Office, School Counselors Association and Principal's association.
- The Title VIII language requires a correction based on a scrivener's error. The technical amendment will amend the wording "Section" to "Chapter."

In New Hampshire we continue to have a close-knit educational community resulting in our ability to be responsive to students and families in transition.

I am grateful to have the opportunity to work with Kristen Ferullo, the Student Liaison Officer for the Navy. Her wealth of experience and knowledge of military families has been of incredible valuable to leaders across the state of New Hampshire. She offers guidance and support throughout the transition process and always keeps the needs of students as her priority.

I continue to be honored to serve as the New Hampshire Commissioner for the Military Interstate Compact Commission for Children. I hope in some small way I can find solutions to support our students and families.

Meeting Schedule:

- a. The New York State Council met for the school year 2022/2023 on **October 12, 2022**, and on **March 29, 2023**. The meetings were held at the New York State Museum, Cultural Education Center, 222 Madison Avenue Albany, NY. Meetings are open to the public in compliance with open meeting law. Agendas and Minutes are posted on the MIC-3 website <https://mic3.net>.
- b. A calendar for the 2023-2024 New York State Interstate Compact Meetings has been established.

Notable Activities:

- a. April as the Month of the Military Child was highlighted on the NYSED website. School district personnel received access to information and resources thanks to the work of the NYSED Office of Curriculum and Instruction. The New York State Education Department highlighted local *Month of the Military Child* and *Purple Up! Day* celebrations by including stories and *Purple Up!* celebrations on the [Month of the Military Child webpage](#). Melissa Montague, who is an active member, led this work.
- b. Military student “stories” continue to be included in the NYS edition of Staying Connected and in the P20 weekly/content area notification to districts. In working toward stronger communication about the NYS Interstate Compact these newsletters are a vehicle for outreach to NYS educators. The NYSED communications office distributes this newsletter.
- c. Dr. Debra Jackson, in her role as NYS Compact Commissioner, serves on the MIC-3 Finance committee, the MIC-3 Leadership committee as vice chair, and as facilitator of the MIC-3 Tier 2 meetings.
- d. The Governor’s Office of Appointments vetted and approved Sonia Draught, Chief Specialist Plans, Analysis & Integration, US Army Garrison Fort Drum to the position of “a representative from a military installation appointed by the governor”. She will begin participating as a voting member in 2023. The Draught appointment was signed in October 2023 by Governor Hochul.
- e. The Commissioner for the State Education Department, Dr. Betty A. Rosa, appointed Troy Decker, Superintendent of the Indian River Central School District, to serve as “a superintendent of a school district with a high concentration of military children appointed by the commissioner” replacing Dr. Frank Sheboy who retired as Superintendent of the Highland Falls -Fort Montgomery School District. The Decker appointment was effective August 2022.

- f. West Point designated the Garrison Commander as the DoD Mil Rep for New York. This is a “by position” appointment so it will continue to be filled by the current Garrison Commander. COL Anthony Bianchi, Commander, US Army Garrison, West Point, United States Army joined the Council in 2023. COL Michael Yankovich, Academy Professor, USMA, West Point, United States Army served as the MIL Rep through 2022.

g.

The Governor’s Office of Appointments has not yet approved the following: “a representative appointed by the governor”.

- h. The Council acknowledged the work by Marybeth Casey, Frank Sheboy, and Michael Yankovich, who retired in 2022, and Michi Carl who retired as a SLO in 2023. Their active participation during our formation enabled our New York State Council to initiate the work with efficacy.
- i. Student placement/graduation requirements/enrollment matters continue to be resolved on a case-by-case examination. Resolutions are reviewed at the meetings as an after-action conversation. Between meetings, emails and phone conversations assist with student transitions as families enter and exit New York State public schools. Most concerns during the 2022-2023 year were immediately resolved with a single communication to the school or district leadership. The council commented that the willingness of council members to facilitate these conversations made a difference statewide for military impacted students.

A special thanks to the Director and Assistant Director of the New York State Public High School Athletic Association for their assistance with the athletic matters on mid-year transfers.

Of note, with districts citing local control, the Council is exploring the need to create new regulations regarding end-of-course completion when a student exits prior to the Regents exam yet the student completes the course work. Practices currently vary statewide. This topic is under study as it affects military students who transfer in late May or June.

Also of note are the difficulties in receiving end-of-course sign offs for military educational transfers. The current “Attestation Letter Template” is more rigid than the Compact language, therefore the Council members are working to amend the current template, opening it up to reflect alternative measures of proficiency/mastery.

- j. The Council members reviewed their response to the proposal by MIC-3 to expand Compact coverage to the National Guard and Reserve beyond service members in Title 10 status. Currently the Council is not recommending a change in law for New York State.

- k. The Commissioner and Council members took the lead to initiate a citation correction following up on the MIC-3 request to address the technical amendment. Upon learning a change in the law resides with the Education Department, the Council made a formal request for the change to NYSED. This technical amendment (one word change, changing the word “sections” to “chapters” correlates to the definition of “active duty”). NYSED responded adversely to the request, stating “the legal team does not want to act at this time”. Explaining that this is considered a non-issue as it is likely understood what this is referring to and if it is not causing any confusion or issues in the field, the NYSED leadership recommendation is to leave law as exists.
- l. The Liverpool CSD identified new military enrollments in their area, specifically due to changes at the Hancock ANG. 26 districts are within the Base Housing Allowance zones, one of those being Liverpool Central School District. The Liverpool CSD reached out to MIC3 for a Compact 101 Training Presentation, for their regional Professional Development Day. Lindsey Dablow of MIC3 conducted the presentation in March 2023.
- m. All voting members appointed to the council are updated in JCOPE as New York State policymakers.

2023 Annual Report – State of Ohio MIC3

The Thomas D Rutan MIC3 **State Council of Ohio** convened to conduct formal business meetings – both hybrid and in-person; on 9 August 2022, 5 December 2022, and 31 March 2023.

In accordance with By-Laws, we proposed **Chip Merkle**, Education Specialist of the Ohio Army and Air National Guard as the Council Co-Chair; **Ashley Twedt**, Chief Administrator of the Ohio MIC3 site as the Council Vice-Chair; **Michelle Lewis** of the Ohio Association of Purple Star Schools as the Council Historian; and **Jason Scragg** from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) as the Council Secretary. In the Fall of 2022, ODE hired Scragg as an Education Consultant and in this role, he supports Purple Star Schools and state-wide MIC3 Operations. Scragg issues monthly editions of the Bulletin Update for Military Families in Ohio.

OhioCares is an expert team of professionals from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (**Adreana Tartt**), the Ohio Department of Veterans Services (**Danny Eakins**), Ohio Army and Air National Guard (**Chip Merkle**), and led by the Executive Office (**Tammy Puff**) of the Governor – the **Honorable Mike DeWine**. These MIC3 Council members have partnered with local and regional professionals to connect all military personnel, veterans, military retirees and their families to crucial behavioral health services.

Education and Military **Roundtables** were hosted in early August of 2022 by the Ohio Army and Air National Guard. The Ohio Department of Education presented Military Professional Development **Webinars** throughout March of 2023 to support PreK-12 educators.

The first annual **National Convening of Local Purple Star Schools and Communities** was hosted in late October of 2022. This first ever gathering of educators and leaders from Fourteen Purple Star States was led by teams from Kentucky and Ohio. At that point in time, it was believed that the nation included approximately 2,100 Purple Star Schools across some 40 states. The event was honored to have military-connected students in these sessions as well as Former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Honorable Admiral Michael G Mullen (United States Navy, Retired) as the Keynote Speaker. The entire Convening was recorded and hosted in Zoom by **Ashland University** in northern Ohio. Ashland has served to support Purple Star Schools from planning to launch in 2015-17. Ashland applied for and was subsequently honored in the Inaugural Class of Collegiate Purple Star in Month of Military Appreciation, May of 2022.

Joining Forces is a White House initiative to support military families, which includes families of service-members and veterans, caregivers, and survivors. This work is driven by the experiences of the “American military family” comprised of service-members, spouses, and their families. In support of the program, the **First Lady of the United States of America, Dr. Jill Biden**, visited Ohio in late March of 2023 – ahead of Month of the Military Child, April. Accompanied by the **First Lady of Ohio – Mrs. Fran DeWine**, Dr Biden visited one of Ohio’s very

first Purple Star Schools; **Beverly Gardens Elementary** with **Principal Cristi Fields** of the Mad River District near Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in greater Dayton.

Dr Biden received a briefing on the **Purple Star** program, which is designed to help schools respond to the educational and social-emotional challenges military-connected children face when navigating the challenges of military life. Pete LuPiba shared the history and goals of the initiative, while **Amber Farkas**, a Beverly Gardens third-grade teacher, shared how the program is implemented at a school where approximately 76 percent of students are military-connected. Dr Biden then visited a second-grade classroom where she spoke with students and helped with a mathematics exercise.

During the Month of the Military Child in April 2023, **U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona** graced Ohio with a visit to an elementary school. Paying tribute to the hardworking Ohio education system, Secretary Cardona engaged in intimate meetings with service members, their supportive spouses, and the resilient children of the military community. In a ceremonial gesture of appreciation, he was awarded the distinguished Ohio MIC3 Challenge Coin, a significant mark of his understanding and solidarity with our military's educational

cause. Esteemed MIC3 Council member, First Lieutenant **Jason Durell**, had the honor of briefing Secretary Cardona on the vital Purple Star School initiatives, elucidating its transformative role within the Ohio military-connected community.

The first annual **School Liaison Janet R. Wynn Memorial MIC3 Award** was presented in the summer of 2022. It was created in 2021 to honor a military kid, as they transitioned with their

military family. This award aims to highlight and celebrate the remarkable achievements of an Ohio military family or school-aged youth who displayed exceptional perseverance, grit, and determination throughout a Permanent Change of Station (PCS) move, transitioned between school districts. In addition, nominees had to be currently serving members of the armed forces with school-aged children who encountered a move between schools and communities.

The **Ohio Department of Education** proudly announced that in **April 2023, 165 Ohio schools received the Purple Star designation** as members of the Purple Star Class of 2023. This marks the largest class of awardees to date, with 88 schools receiving the esteemed award for the first time and 77 schools earning a renewal after three years as dedicated Purple

Star schools. Ohio is home to 511 active Purple Star schools, demonstrating their significant commitment to serving students and families connected to the nation's armed forces. These schools provide unique support and address the wellness and academic needs of Ohio's military-connected youth.

In January 2023, the new General Assembly commenced its legislative session, welcoming several esteemed MIC3 council members to its ranks. Notable members of the new General Assembly include **Senator Terry Johnson, Senator Vernon Sykes, Representative Brian Lampton,** and The Ohio House Minority **Leader Allison Russo.** These individuals bring their expertise and dedication to serve the state of Ohio, ensuring the continued support and progress of the MIC3 statute, its implementation.

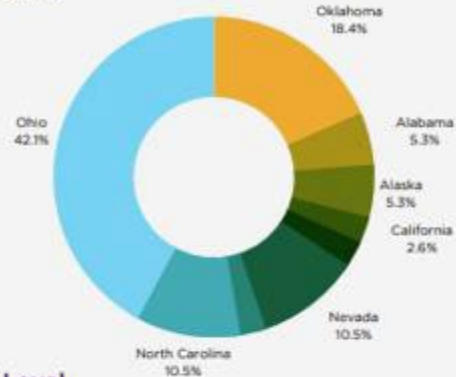
Building upon the collaborative efforts between the **Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC)** and the **Center for Public Research and Leadership at Columbia University,** the second edition of the Columbia University

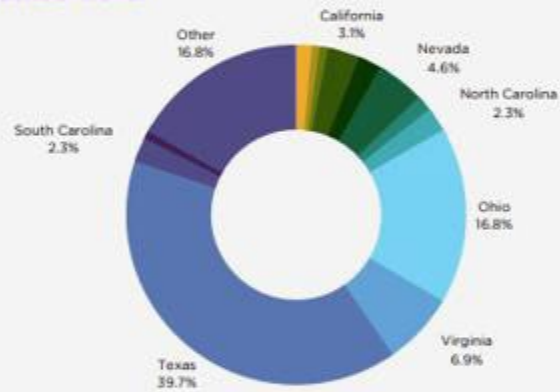
Appendix D: Demographic Breakdown of Survey Data

State Representation Across Surveys

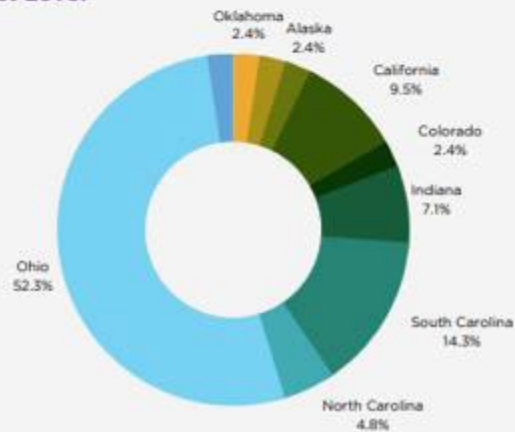
Graph 1: Family Level

Throughout the fall of 2022, the State Council of Ohio MIC3 provided professional development briefings to state-wide professional educators' associations, including the **Ohio School Board Association (OSBA)**, **Ohio School Counselors Association (OSCA)**, and **Ohio Educational Service Centers Association (OESCA)**. These briefings aimed to enhance educators' understanding of the MIC3 statute and its implications, ensuring they are well-equipped to support military-connected students and their families within their respective roles.

As Ohio completed the first iteration of its **state MIC3 strategic plan**, the State Council has initiated discussions regarding the second. This comprehensive plan,

developed from 2020 to 2023, has positioned Ohio as a national leader in supporting military-connected students. The proposed second iteration, scheduled for fall of 2023, will continue to raise awareness, provide training, and implement the MIC3 statute to improve educational outcomes for military-connected youth across the state. This new plan is being led by **Matt Cox** (Big Walnut), **Hayley Young** (National Guard), **Julie Gray** (Kent), **Chad Marzec** (Liberty-Benton).

On March 8, 2022, the Chancellor of the **Ohio Department of Higher Education, Randy Gardner**, introduced the Collegiate Purple Star designation for Ohio colleges and universities. The Ohio MIC3 Team and Council Members actively supported these state-wide efforts, collaborating with the Ohio Department of Higher Education to encourage colleges and universities to apply for this prestigious designation. As a result, a total of **46 Ohio institutions** have been designated as **Collegiate Purple Star** campuses since 2022, solidifying Ohio's commitment to supporting students with military backgrounds throughout their education.

On March 7, 2023, the Ohio Department of Education, alongside Ohio Second Lady Tina Husted, hosted a momentous celebration honoring high school students from across the state who have made a **commitment to serve in the U.S. Armed Forces**. This special event, held at the prestigious National Veterans Memorial and Museum in Columbus, brought together high school seniors and juniors who have chosen to enter service academies or embark on active duty, Reserve, or National Guard service. Their dedication and willingness to serve our nation were commended, highlighting their

OVERVIEW

The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children was developed jointly by The Council of State Government's National Center for Interstate Compacts and the Department of Defense, with input from policy experts, and stakeholders from 18 different organizations and national associations, including representatives of parents, teachers, school administrators, military families, and federal, state, and local officials. The Interstate Compact eases education transition issues faced by the children of active-duty service members transferring between school districts and states. Most military children will attend six to nine different school systems during their education from kindergarten to 12th grade. The Compact allows for uniform treatment of military children when dealing with issues of enrollment, eligibility, placement, and graduation when transferring schools.

Initial discussions about the Compact began in 2006 and drafting of the Compact began early in 2007. The Compact was first available for legislative consideration in 2008. The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children was adopted by all 50 states and the District of Columbia in just six legislative sessions.

HISTORY

Pennsylvania adopted the Interstate Compact, placing it in statute in February 2012. The language of the Interstate Compact adopted was almost verbatim. The dues are paid by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

- MIC3 information is disseminated to the Portsmouth, Newport, and Jamestown school systems.

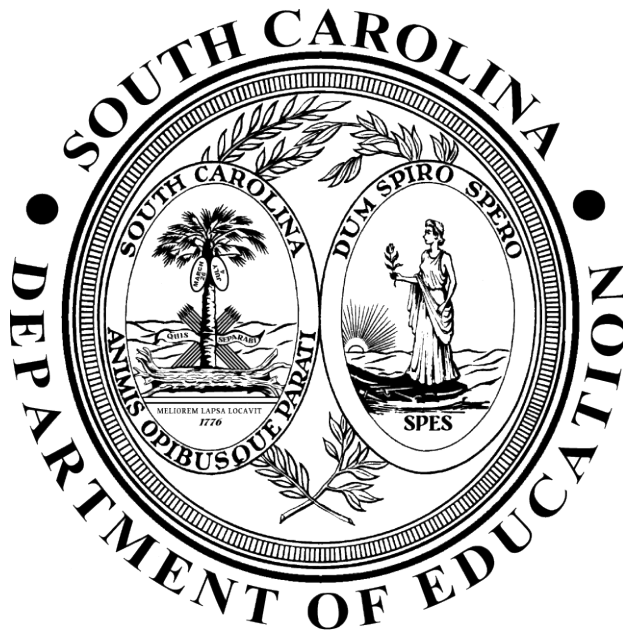

- A. Facilitating the timely enrollment of children of military families and ensuring that they are not placed at a disadvantage due to difficulty in the transfer of education records from the previous school districts or variations in entrance/age requirements.
- B. Facilitating the student placement process through which children of military families are not disadvantaged by variations in attendance requirements, scheduling, sequencing, grading, course content, or assessment.
- C. Facilitating the qualification and eligibility for enrollment, educational programs, and participation in extracurricular academic, athletic, and social activities. D. Facilitating the on-time graduation of children of military families.
- E. Providing for the promulgation and enforcement of administrative rules implementing the provisions of this compact.
- F. Providing for the uniform collection and sharing of information between and among member states, schools, and military families under this compact.
- G. Promoting coordination between this compact and other compacts affecting military children.
- H. Promoting flexibility and cooperation between the educational system, parents, and the student in order to achieve educational success for the student.

SC MIC3 Council Summary

- South Carolina State Council Meetings was held May 25, 2023. This was our first in-person meeting since COVID.
- The purpose was to inform council members of possible courses of actions for input/vote by the commissioner, and bring awareness to members, as well as discuss the council's desire to pursue adding NGR support to the SC state compact without violating language changes to the compact. SC council will use Arkansas as a sample moving forward, along with other states who have completed this process.
- During the May 25, 2023 meeting, Dr. Priester provided updates to the council members from the MIC3 Annual Business meeting held in November 2022 in Baton Rouge. Dr. Priester also provided an update on the social, emotional, and academic supports being provided to military families in collaboration with district military liaisons. Dr. Priester announced that currently SC has 11 Purple Star designated districts. It is understood that Purple Star is not an entity of MIC3 on the national level, SC utilizes the training of the compact as a requirement for becoming a Purple Star designated district in SC.
- The South Carolina Department of Education sponsored the *2023 Military Honor Cord Ceremony* for high school seniors who had enlisted into the uniformed services. The ceremony was held in-person on May 17, 2023 at the Columbia Metropolitan Convention Center. Students were provided red, white, and blue military cords to wear during their respective high school graduation ceremonies.
- On April 5, 2023, Governor Henry McMaster proclaimed April as South Carolina's Month of the Military Child. After the proclamation, Dr. Kim Priester identified a total of 11 Purple Star districts in South Carolina: Charleston County School District, Berkeley County School District, Beaufort County School District, Richland County School District One, Edgefield County School District, Richland County School District 2, Anderson 1 School District, Sumter County School District, Aiken County Public School District, and Kershaw County School District, and Dorchester 2.
- Dr. Priester was honored to be awarded the military proclamation for SC on April 5, 2023 from Gov. McMaster.
- Dr. Priester then provided an overview and 2023 updates of Veterans Affairs Education Benefits for veteran survivors and informed the Council that the SC Commission on Higher Education was notified about requests for assistance from students from military families who were planning to attend college. To assist families further, the Council agreed that a presentation related to educational benefits and resources available for students from military families should be developed in collaboration with the Veterans Affairs Education Department.
- Various council members, district military liaisons, military school officers, military families and students, and other individuals participated in Month of the Military Child and Purple UP Day celebrations. Each district designated a day for Purple UP Day, during which several appreciation activities were held for students and families.

- Dr. Priester is the state contact for districts seeking information and training on how to achieve the Purple Star designation.
- Dr. Priester, in collaboration with the base installation student liaison officers and district military liaisons, and MIC3 national team will be planning fall and spring trainings for 101 and 201 sessions on installations for soldiers and military families.
- SC council will be working to create a state MIC3 brochure for use along with the information the national MIC3 office provides.

Areas of Focus for the State Council

- Increase awareness of SC's newly passed and signed bill H3797 Military Temporary Enrollment <https://scdva.sc.gov/news/2023-06/military-families-now-benefitting-remote-school-enrollment-law-signed-governor>
- Provide on-going training on the compact rules for the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in collaboration with district military liaisons/school officers. The purpose of the continuous training is to ensure that policies related to transitioning military students in the state's public school system are clearly understood and implemented effectively in all school districts statewide.
- Raise awareness of the Month of the Military Child proclamation and Purple Up Day in districts and schools statewide.
- Raise awareness of the South Carolina Department of Education's Purple Star program, which provides information and resources to districts to assist them in helping students from military families have a seamless transition into the state's public education system.
- Continue to increase the designation of Purple Star programs in district statewide for the purpose of increasing and highlighting military connectedness and support for military student and families in South Carolina.

AN ACT to amend Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 49, relative to military children.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 49, Chapter 6, Part 3, is amended by adding the following as a new section:

This state, and each school district and public school of this state, shall remove barriers to educational success imposed on children of military families because of frequent moves of their parents by extending the benefits and opportunities provided to children of active duty members of the uniformed services in the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children, codified in § 49-12-301, to school-aged children in the household of a member of any reserve component of the armed forces of the United States, including members of the Tennessee army and air national guard, who are enrolled in any of the grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12).

SECTION 2. This act takes effect upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it.

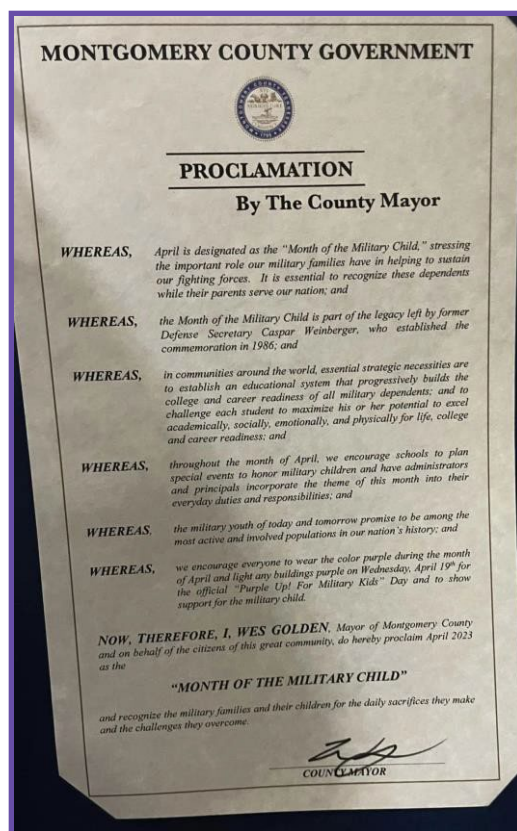

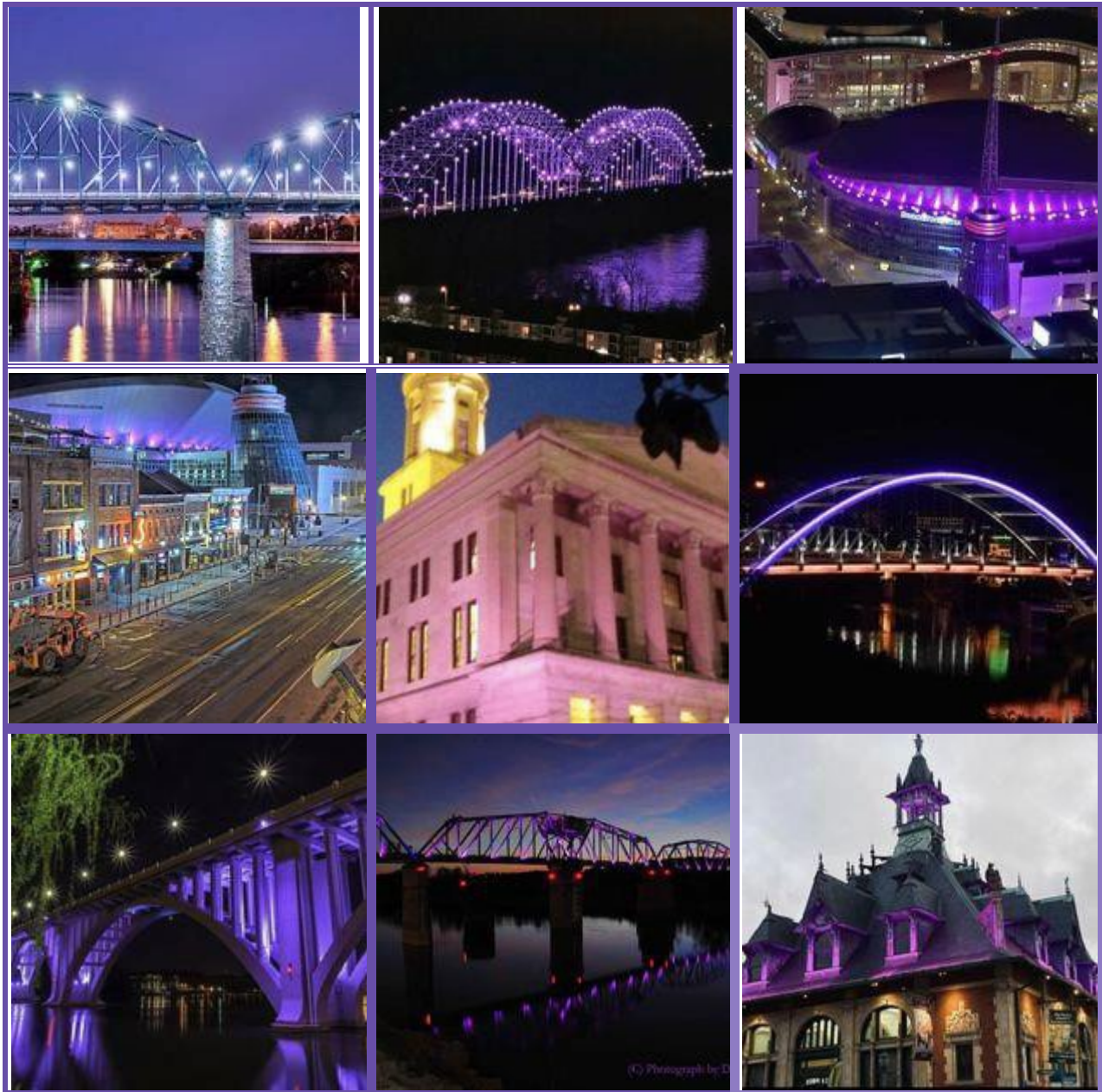

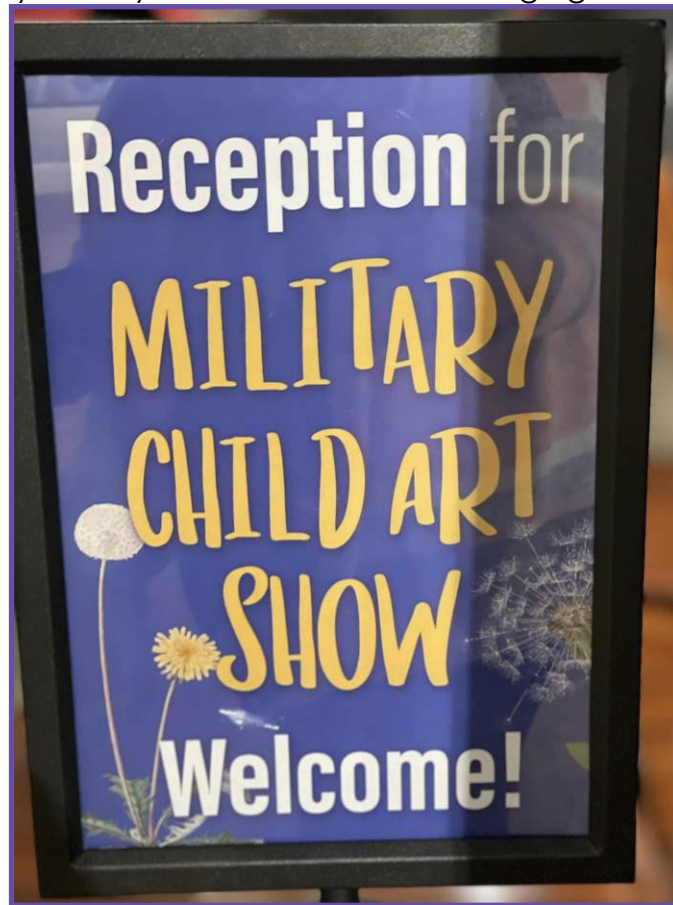

Accomplishments: The Virginia Council on the Interstate Compact for the Educational
Opportunities of Military Children did not hold a meeting during 2023.
The change in State administration and challenges that occurred with
the Governor appointments prevented our meeting to occur. That
said the Virginia Department of Education and the State
Commissioner Designee, Mr. Dan Dunham was able to stay the course

in providing support to military parents, schools and military school liaison officers and exceptional family member program coordinators.

Activities:

The VDOE Military Student and Families Specialist is in regular communication with the SLOs and EFMPs via email, phone, and at trainings. These regular communications serve as opportunities to discuss issues with implementation of the Interstate Compact, share updated resources, and link families to local and state supports that often times fall outside the scope of the Compact.

The VDOE, on behalf of the Virginia Council, has developed and maintains webpages dedicated to the Military Compact (<https://www.doe.virginia.gov/programs-services/student-services/military-families>), with resources for military families and educators. The site features guidance documents to help school divisions interpret key provisions of the Compact, including printable brochures and guides. The resource pages contain links to pertinent Virginia laws related to the education of military children, as well as contact information for military school liaisons officers. The website highlights best practices of school divisions to assist military-connected children, provides training materials, and contains links to numerous military-affiliated support organizations. The Department has also maintained a webpage dedicated to the Virginia Council that includes the Council's meeting schedule, agendas, and minutes from previous meetings and presentations given at Council meetings.

With resources provided by the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3), VDOE, on behalf of the Virginia Council, has distributed guidance documents to school liaison officers and school divisions that can be used in trainings for school division staff and in meetings with military families. The resources include:

Guidance for Military Families with Students in Special Education, a 16-page document provides information and answers to questions that military families with school-aged children might have about special education programs in Virginia public schools. Topics include enrollment, special education services, parental consent in Virginia, Section 504, dispute resolution, and procedural safeguards. This document was updated in March 2020.

Desk Reference for the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children: Compact Rules, is shared with

school liaison officers as they work with educators in implementing the provisions of the Interstate Compact; and

Guide for Parents, School Officials and Public Administrators, provides information to families, military leaders, and educators about the Interstate Compact

VDOE Modules:

Supporting Our Military–Connected Children in School Settings: Moving them from Risk to Resilience Module 1 and Module 2, provides school staff online professional development on the unique needs of military connected students and their families

New in 2022, Building Awareness of the Social Emotional Impacts of Military Family Transitions, provides school staff online professional development on the stressors that military families face routinely and provides clarity on how best to support these families during periods of heightened stress.

In November, VDOE announced that one hundred and eighty-nine schools across Virginia were honored with Purple Star Designation. To qualify for a Purple Star in Virginia, schools must have a staff point of contact (POC) for military students and families. The POC serves as the primary link between the military family and the school. In addition, schools must meet four measures that help to build awareness within the school community and foster peer transition support.

One hundred and one of the one hundred and eighty-nine schools honored this year were second time recipients of the distinction. This is the fifth year the VDOE has designated Purple Star schools. Since 2018, the VDOE and The Council on the Interstate Compact on the Educational Opportunity of Military Children have selected three hundred twenty-eight schools across Virginia for the award of which one hundred and ninety-two have been twice honored.

According to the Military Identifier End of year Count SY 2021-2022 there were military 81,224 connected students in 132 of the 134 school divisions. The Virginia Council and the Virginia Department of Education will continue encouraging school divisions to identify and reach out to the military-connected students in their schools.

The VDOE Military Student and Families Specialist as Commissioner Designee attended the 2022 Annual Business Meeting (ABM) of the

Interstate Commission on Educational Opportunities for Military Children as Virginia's Commissioner's designee. The ABM provided valuable opportunities for the VDOE Military Student and Families Specialist to dialogue with other state commissioners / designees about the implementation of the Interstate Compact and on best practices for navigating challenging issues. During the meeting, Commissioners learned of the need to revise the Compact language. Currently, there is an incorrect citation in the model language of the Compact in Article II(A) and in Article III(A)(1), both of which refer to "members of the National Guard and Reserve on active-duty orders pursuant to 10 U.S.C. Section 1209 and 1211." (emphasis added). These provisions should both cite instead to 10 U.S.C. Chapter 1209 and 1211. This is a scrivener's (i.e. technical) error in a section of the Compact which controls its coverage area, and as such it is best practice that the citation error should be corrected in each impacted state. VDOE included the need to correct this technical error in Virginia Code in their submission of the Governor's working papers.

Conclusion

The VDOE and Virginia Military Families Specialist continued to provide support and technical assistance to both individual families and schools during 2022.

The network that encompasses the Military Student Support Process Action Team (MSSPAT), SLO's and EFMP's continue to be impactful. These partners routinely help to review Purple Star applications, conducting trainings and providing expertise for support improvements to students, parents and schools.

In nearly every community in Virginia, there are children with parents or guardians on active duty, Reserves, National Guard, NOAA or USPHS. While their parents honorably serve our nation and our Commonwealth, we should recognize the contributions of military-connect students and celebrate their spirit. To this end, the VDOE is honored to support the transitional needs of military connected students and their families.

Trainings

The VDOE, on behalf of the Virginia Council, has provided training on the Compact and the Virginia Council to thousands of educators, military families, and other interested stakeholders since its creation in 2009. The SLOs throughout Virginia frequently provide training on

the Interstate Compact to educators in their region as well. In 2022, The Virginia Military Student and Families Specialist attended and presented at number of these training endeavors. These included:

Prince George County Public Schools: Interstate Compact Overview and State Laws supporting military connected students May 4, 2022

PEATC MILCON: VDOE Staff presented on the Unique needs of Military Connected Children and Purple star School programming. May 8-9, 2022

VDOE's Department of Special Education's Office of Family Engagement continued its work to provide exceptional trainings to school personnel and military families. In May this office and VDOE Military Student and Families Specialist partnered to provide a Military Families Symposium for military families with students in special education. This in person symposium provided attendees with an opportunity to learn more about state level support, self-advocacy, Due Process, the I'm Determined program, Parent Educational Advocacy Training Center (PEATC) and Virginia Commonwealth University's Center for Parent Involvement.

A number of SLO's and EFMP's attended the Connect for Success Conference in September. The VDOE's office of Family Engagement provides this professional development opportunity to those who work in Parent Resource Centers. This opportunity helped to foster collaboration between the school divisions and military partners.

The Family Engagement Network formed a military student and family sub-committee in 2022. This body will investigate the building of resources and programs aimed at strengthening support for military families in the care of students with special needs.

The Military Student and Families Specialist was a panelist at the Military Child Education Coalition Conference held in Washington D.C. in July. He was and others leading the way for Purple Star programming in Ohio, Texas and South Carolina spoke to the value that Purple Star has had on student wellbeing and school climate.

Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission HAWAII — FY2023 End of Year Report



Hawaii's Compact Membership and Influence

The State of Hawaii became a member of the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in 2009, in the second year of its operation. The Hawaii State Legislature enacted the requisite Compact law in July of that year, and in October the Hawaii State Board of Education appointed as Hawaii's State Commissioner retired Brigadier General Kathleen Berg, whose mission was to oversee the Hawaii State Council and facilitate the Compact between Hawaii and other member states. It would take until 2014 for all 50 states and the District of Columbia to become members. Berg and a delegation from Hawaii that included then State Representative K. Mark Takai, one of the sponsors of Hawaii's Compact legislation, attended the second annual business meeting of the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) held in the fall of 2009 in California. Berg was elected vice chair of the commission and represented Hawaii in leadership positions as the vice chair, then chair, and past chair from 2009 through 2016 and still serves as the Hawaii's state commissioner. Also part of that 2009 delegation was Hawaii Department of Education (HIDOE) Military Liaison Cherise Imai, who added to her HIDOE job responsibilities the administrative support for the State Commissioner and the Hawaii State Council. In 2016, Imai was selected by the Compact Commission to be the third MIC3 Executive Director, and she moved from Hawaii to Kentucky where she still leads the MIC3 National Office. Current HIDOE Military Liaison Cherry Okahara was hired as Imai's replacement.

The military is an important component of the population and economy of Hawaii. The state is home to all branches of the U.S. armed forces. There are twelve key military installations and bases across the state. With nearly 43,000 active duty military members assigned here, Hawaii is ranked eighth among the fifty states, and the state has the highest number of military-dependent children per capita in the nation. The number of school-age military dependents in the state was 17,444, according to the Department of Defense data used to calculate Hawaii's FY23 Compact dues. Not all of those students were enrolled in Hawaii's public schools; schooling options in the state also include public charter schools, private and parochial schools, and homeschooling. It is estimated that military-dependent students make up at least 8% of the total public school enrollment in Hawaii, which numbered 168,634 in FY23.

The Hawaii Department of Education (HIDOE) is a statewide school district of 258 schools in 15 Complex Areas. Each Complex Area consists of two to four school complexes. A school complex is a high school and the elementary and middle schools that feed into it. Each Complex Area has its own Complex Area Superintendent (CAS) and support staff. There are 56 public schools listed on the HIDOE Military Families website [<https://www.hawaiipublicschools.org/ParentsAndStudents/MilitaryFamilies/Pages/Home.aspx>] as having significant populations of military-dependent students. All are located on Oahu. The largest concentration of military students is in the Central District on Oahu.

Hawaii State Council

From its first meeting in April 2010, the Hawaii State Council has met regularly and complements a number of other organizations created in the state to support military students in Hawaii public schools, including the Military Youth Advisory Council (MYAC), Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF), Military Impacted Principals Council (MIPC), and the Hawaii Education Liaison Officers Council (HELOC).

Hawaii State Council Members

Specific guidance for the composition and the operation of the State Council can be found in HRS 311D - 2. The Council is to be composed of the following:

[§311D-2] State council. There is established within the board of education for administrative purposes the state council on educational opportunity for military children. The board of education shall establish the state council, as required by article VIII of the compact. The membership of the state council shall include, at a minimum:

- (1) The superintendent of education or the superintendent's designee;*
- (2) The complex area superintendents of the administrative districts that contain the Leilehua, Radford/Moanalua, and Kalaheo school complexes;*
- (3) A complex area superintendent from the Leeward district;*
- (4) The military liaison from the department of education;*
- (5) A uniformed military representative from the United States Pacific Command;*
- (6) One installation-level uniformed military representative from each branch of service of the Air Force, Army, Marine Corps, Navy, and Coast Guard;*
- (7) The governor or the governor's designee;*
- (8) The chairperson of the senate education committee or the chairperson's designee;*
- (9) The chairperson of the house education committee or the chairperson's designee; and*
- (10) Other offices and stakeholder groups the state council deems necessary.*

Members of the state council may delegate voting authority to another person for a specified meeting or meetings. The state council shall appoint or designate a military family education liaison to assist military families and the state in facilitating the implementation of this compact. The compact commissioner and the military family education liaison designated herein shall be ex-officio members of the state council, unless either is already a full voting member of the state council. The council shall establish policies and procedures governing its operations but subject to the open meeting requirements of chapter 92. [L 2009, c 152, pt of §1; am L 2011, c 82, pt of §1]

Summary of Achievements, Activities and Presentations in FY2023 (July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023)

After a challenging previous year in the emergency response phase of the pandemic, Hawaii public schools began school year 2022–23 fully opened and prepared to exist with COVID-19. The previous year’s interim superintendent was selected for the position and continued his leadership of Hawaii’s public schools as Superintendent Hayashi. Hawaii State Commissioner Berg and HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara continued to advise HIDOE personnel on issues involving the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children and assist them in applying Compact rules where appropriate, working closely with the military services’ school liaison officers (SLOs) to resolve any Compact issues. They regularly attended meetings—virtual during 2022 and in-person in 2023—of the Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF) and the Hawaii Education Liaison Officers Council (HELOC), interacting with members of the military, education, and business communities, as well as meetings with new uniformed military liaisons to the Hawaii State Council. They also hosted a visit by MIC3 Executive Director Cherise Imai to Hawaii, March 28 and 29, 2023, facilitating multiple office calls and training events.

Cooperation/Coordination with Other Organizations

Brig Gen (Ret) Berg, as Hawaii State Commissioner, is a Liaison Member of the Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF), a formal partnership between the HIDOE and the United States Indo-Pacific Command (USINDOPACOM) with membership and involvement of other community organizations. JVEF was formed in 1999 with a mission to facilitate discussion of the educational concerns and attend to the unique needs of military children and their families, such as transitions to the Islands, and to support Hawaii’s public school students. A key element of JVEF over the years has been the military-school partnerships, which matched most of the public schools on Oahu with a military unit whose members volunteered their time to help with various school projects throughout the school year. Most of the uniformed military members of the Hawaii State Council for the Interstate Compact are also Liaison Members of JVEF. JVEF meets regularly throughout the year, alternating monthly between meetings of the Liaison Members and of the various Focus Groups, and — up until the pandemic interruption—including one annual event. In FY23, meetings were both virtual and in-person, and the meeting agendas for three of the Liaison Member meetings in FY23 included an update from the State Commissioner. HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara, along with a member of the J1 Directorate at USINDOPACOM, serve as the administrative support team for JVEF.

The Military Youth Advisory Council (MYAC), originally involving Radford High School and the base commanders of nearby Army, Air Force, and Navy installations dates back to 1994 and was the model for JVEF. MYAC’s main focus was transitioning new students. It now serves the Radford Complex as a primary community group, meeting once a month at the Radford campus. Radford High School had one of the first Transition Centers in Hawaii schools. Its student-to-student transition program has served as a model for many of the other Hawaii public schools’ transition programs, many of which have received funding from HIDOE and community partners as part of the K. Mark Takai Transition Center Network. MIC3 has regularly been part of the now annual Transition Centers Best Practices Conference, put on by HIDOE, Hawaii Business Roundtable, and the K. Mark Takai Foundation. For the 2023 conference, MIC3 Executive Director Imai attended and presented along with Commissioner Berg a Compact 101 Training session. The training fulfilled a requirement for schools that seek to earn the Purple Star Norbert Hawaii Award that distinguishes them as a military-friendly school. The current award program marries the previous Norbert Award, originally developed

in the early years of JVEF, with the more recently promoted nationwide Purple Star Schools program. Training of school faculty on provisions of the Interstate Compact is now part of the list of requirements developed by the Military Impacted Principals Council (MIPC) for the award. MIPC was an outgrowth of JVEF and provides for sharing of experiences and ideas and helps new principals come up to speed on the Compact and other military student issues.

There are many groups operating in Hawaii that serve military-dependent students in the public schools. People and organizations overlap, cooperate, and coordinate activities in support of military students. The Interstate Compact is just part of that effort and benefits from those organizations and events. Since the early 2000s, the HIDOE has funded as a full-time position the HIDOE Military Liaison as part of its administration. The position responsibilities include support for Compact activities and requirements and staffing for the State Commissioner and State Council functions. The organization of Hawaii's school system as a single school district facilitates communication and compliance. And the several military services' school liaison officers (SLOs) are very competent and have many years of experience. Several years ago, the Hawaii Education Liaison Officers Council (HELOC) was formed, which includes representatives from USINDOPACOM Quality of Life and Education section, other military branches' youth services folks, and the HIDOE.

Only two cases in FY23 rose to the attention of the State Commissioner; one involved placement of a home-schooled military child at the appropriate elementary grade level and the other a request to waive a world history course requirement for a diploma from HIDOE. Both cases were essentially resolved by the time the Commissioner got involved, but each provided an opportunity for discussion of new issues and spawned an idea to provide for school registrars to meet and talk about Compact issues together so that Hawaii schools could be more aligned in how they handle common requests. The lack of problems and complaints that come up through school channels or via direct calls to HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara or to State Commissioner Berg indicate that school level administrators, complex area superintendents, and SLOs are doing an effective job of implementing Compact rules for transitioning military students. The large forums that JVEF and MYAC provide are also sources of feedback from military members and parents, so that any issues that exist gain visibility and can be resolved. The HIDOE Military Liaison has maintained a database of cases over the years so they can be shared with the State Council and the MIC3 National Office when appropriate.

The following information is provided in accordance with MIC3 Policy 01-2017, state coordination, for the period of July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. The Kansas Military Child Education Council (Council) held its annual meeting by ZOOM on February 24, 2023. The agenda and minutes for that meeting are being submitted with this letter and are posted on the Kansas Military Families [website](#).

The Council reviewed basic and historical information concerning MIC3 in Kansas. The dues for FY24 were quickly reviewed, but most of the meeting was spent preparing for the Purple Star Program Kickoff and Recognition during the Kansas State Board of Education's April meeting. Members discussed the importance and purpose of the Purple Star School Program, as well as the presentation formats for the State Board meeting. Additionally, the team developed the key points to bring to the attention of the State Board of Education. The team agreed to do their best to bring in military children, their parents, as well as others in uniform to represent all the military-connected students in Kansas and present to the Board of Education the importance of this program to this special group of students in Kansas.

Process to establish the Kansas Purple Star School Program:

At the Kansas State Board of Education meeting on October 11, 2022, Craig Neuenswander (on behalf of the Council) and Reggie Eggleston, Geary County Superintendent, presented an overview of this program highlighting its importance and how military-connected students and families would benefit.

A Purple Star School designation will be awarded to military-friendly schools that apply to KSDE, complete specific activities and meet all criteria and requirements. The Board voted unanimously 10-0 to approve the program.

To receive this designation, an application was developed by members of the Council for schools to complete and submit to KSDE. It outlined criteria and requirements that must be met to be designated as a Kansas Purple Star School. Applications were accepted Oct 15, 2022, until Feb 1, 2023. In early February, the Council met to review the applications submitted and approve schools and districts meeting the criteria to receive this designation in April.

At the April 11, 2023, Kansas State Board of Education meeting, each of the four Purple Star School districts were recognized and presented a slide show with photos from each school supporting military families. Addressing the board were superintendents, students, garrison commanders and school liaison officers representing three military bases. The speakers provided narratives from several perspectives, each supporting the importance of the Purple Star School Program. They exemplified the impact of welcoming new students to make the military transition as smooth as possible. Additionally, members of the State Board of Education were thanked by all for establishing this program for Kansas schools.

The Purple Star School Recognition Program is a partnership between the Kansas State Department of Education and the Kansas Military Children Education Council. 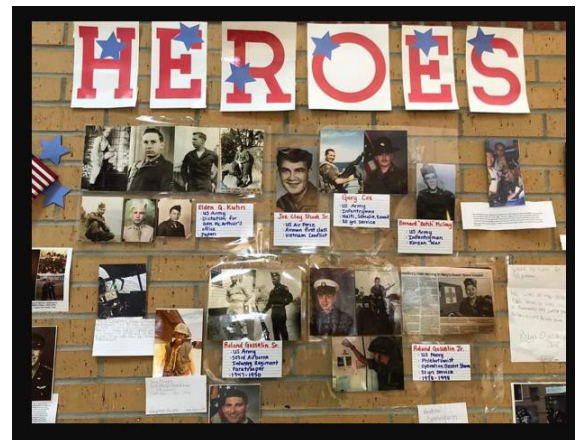

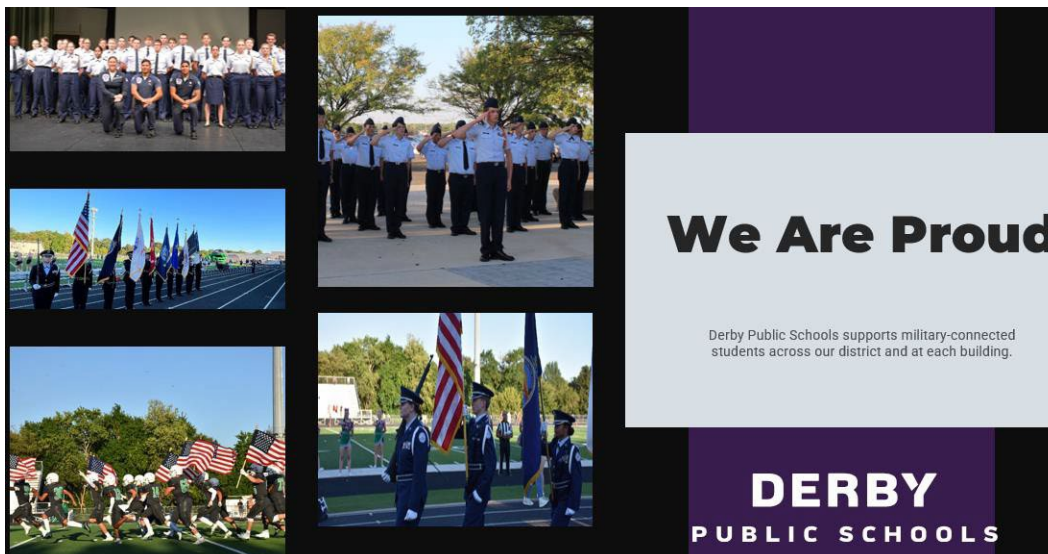
