MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT COMMISSION

Under Compact Rules, Chapter 800 State Coordination adopted on November 9, 2023, SEC. 8.101 State Coordination Between States and Commission, subsection (c) Annual Reporting by Commissioners requires:

#### Alabama MIC3 2023-24 End of the Year Report

#### Submitted by Dr. Douglas L. Ragland, Alabama Commissioner

There have been excellent accomplishments during the 2023-24 year in the state of Alabama in relation to MIC3 and Military Families in general, as well as other governmental issues in our state, and they are as follows:

- The Honorable Governor Kay Ivey approved a Military Proclamation for Month of the Military Child on April 29, 2024. I have attached the Proclamation to this email.
- We have made excellent strides in enhancing awareness of MIC3 in Alabama with our School Liaison Officers participation in Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC) 360 Summits in enhancing the knowledge of educators regarding MIC 3 and the roles of our School Liaison Officers in the transitional process of our Military Families in various school systems.
- I am currently a member of the Legislative Appointed Alabama Purple Star Schools Committee. This committee, along with the support of the Alabama State Superintendent of Education have increased the number of Purple Star Schools to 249 as it stands for 2024.
- A total of 76 schools were designated as Purple Schools Status in 2024.
- A total of 122 schools were designated Purple Star School Status in 2023.
- Major General Sheryl Gordon, Adjutant General for the Alabama National Guard, and Member of the Alabama Council Retired Effective January 1, 2024.
- Brigadier General David Pritchett was hired on January 1, 2024, as the next Adjutant General for the Alabama National Guard, and has accepted the role of serving on the Alabama Council.
- We have successfully resolved all cases pertaining to our Military Families in Alabama for 2022-23.

The following outstanding report from Maxwell Air Force for Robert Richert and Katherine Ganster, highlights excellent overall leadership and accomplishments pertaining to MIC Issues, Non-MIC3 Issues, Legislative Actions, Purple Star Schools and Community Events/ Partnerships:

#### MIC3 Issues

- Eligibility, SEC.6.101. a.2. (Eligibility for Enrollment) Helped divorced family, mother is deployed, children attended the DoDEA school on base (residents). Children moved off base to reside with dad while mom (active duty) is deployed. DoDEA school informed Dad, the children could no longer attend the DoDEA school (Jul 23).
- Eligibility, SEC.6.102. b. (Eligibility for Extracurricular Participation)- Parent requested assistance and information regarding tryouts for sports. A newly arrived military student was informed that Volleyball tryouts happened last spring before her

arrival summer team workouts are occurring and the team is full. The coach ultimately offered a date for a tryout but reiterated that the team is full and that they've been doing summer workouts giving the distinct impression the student doesn't have much of a chance of joining. SLPM shared the parents' frustrations with our District POC for situational awareness. UPDATE 1 - The student wanted to try out for the cross-country team. Again, she was informed the team tryouts already occurred the roster was set. The parent asked if the school was required to give her a look. I contacted the District POC for set. SEC.6.102 Eligibility for Extracurricular Participation. The student was offered a tryout on August 15, 2023 (Jul/Aug 23).

- Eligibility, SEC.4.101. a. (Waiver Requirements) Received a phone call from a Coast Guard family needing assistance with the transfer of credits from DoDEA Guam HS to a school in Alabama (Orange Beach HS). Asked the parent to send me a copy of the student's transcript and course description of the classwork in question. I educated the parent about the MIC3 and let her know SLPM would contact the school counselor and Principal. UPDATE1 SLPM contacted Orange Beach HS Guidance Counselor and Principal requesting their assistance to resolve the transfer of credits at the lowest level invoking MIC3, waiver of credits. Currently awaiting a response. UPDATE 2 After several attempts, I was able to connect the parent and school. The school reviewed the student's transcript and accepted/credited two courses previously taken towards HS graduation. The school enrolled the student in virtual access to complete the remaining needed course for graduation (Jul 23).
- Eligibility, SEC.5.102. a. (Educational Program Placement) Received a phone call from a parent regarding gifted placement in Pike Road schools. We connected with the school, and they are looking into the concerns. Students have assessments from their sending school and the receiving school did not place the students as the parents thought they should be placed. Connected with Pike Road schools regarding two families having students that they feel are not being placed correctly in gifted programs. Provided the schools with the MIC3 rules. Called the parent to check on the situation with Pike Road and the gifted placement of a child in 4th grade. They said the school had been in contact with them (Aug 23).
- Eligibility, SEC.5.101. a. (Course Placement) Provided information to a family with a child at Park Crossing HS regarding course schedule changes and MIC3. The child has been placed into classes they have already taken. Asked the parent to communicate with a counselor and provided the parent the Alabama HS graduation requirements to see what the child would need or do we need to look for a reciprocal diploma (Aug 23).
- Eligibility, SEC.4.103. a. (Transfers During Senior Year) Received a phone call from a military family seeking assistance for the high school senior. The sponsor recently retired from active-duty service and relocated his family to Alabama from California. Due to the varying graduation requirements between LEAs the student's workload has increased. Parents want to explore the option for the student to receive a reciprocal diploma from his previous school (CA). Contacted school guidance counselor in Mobile, AL. SLPM seeking assistance on behalf of a family who recently moved to the area from California needing assistance to navigate a reciprocal diploma. Awaiting a response from the counselor. UPDATE - Connected all parties. After further review/discussion, it was

determined the student will be credited with coursework from California and can complete the remaining course requirements toward graduation in Alabama (Nov 23).

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- Eligibility, SEC.4.103. a. (Transfers During Senior Year) Informational e-mail to • parents relocating in the upcoming PCS cycle (summer 24). The student has attended the local HS for the past 3 years and wants to explore the option of fulfilling his course work at the new school receiving credit at his current HS and walking in 2025 commencement. SLPM has connected with gaining installation SLPM to begin the engagement. Also, guided the parent about the process and recommended she contact the current school's guidance counselor to inform them of the student's desire. Awaiting a response from the parent and counselor to determine the next steps. UPDATE -Follow-up e-mail to the parent of a local student transitioning to Dover AFB in the summer. Initially tracking as a potential MIC3, SEC4.103 (Transfer during Senior year). After discussion with the local district, MIC3, and Dover SLPM it was determined it does not meet MIC3 SEC4.103. The parent redressed with the district superintendent to provide a reciprocal diploma even though it did not meet the MIC3 requirement to provide. The request was denied. Lawyers who reviewed the issue indicated it would be "fraud" for the Alabama school to award the diploma. Dover Secretary of Ed. wants rationales from Alabama and possibly raises the issue with Alabama's Superintendent of Education (Dec 23 – Apr 24).

### Non MIC3 Issues

- Application deadlines for Magnet Schools Military families who received PCS orders later in the year (spring/summer) miss the opportunity to apply for Magnet schools due to closed application windows (Jan 2024).
- Application deadlines for Pre-K enrollment Military families who received PCS orders later in the year (spring/summer) miss the opportunity to apply for Pre-K enrollment due to closed application windows (Mar 2024).
- Purple Star Schools It appears the standards for achieving Purple Star School designation have been relaxed for SY2024. Our office would like the ALSDE to require the approving panel to utilize a rubric to verify schools are following through with required activities.
- Legislation (we are following)
- Alabama HB22 Relating to public K-12 schools; to amend Section 16-28A-3, Code of Alabama 1975; to provide legislative findings; to define the role of the assistant principal as assisting the principal with certain duties, including student discipline; to require each public K-12 school to have an assistant principal, if funding is available; and to provide procedures for dividing the responsibility if a public K-12 school employs more than one assistant principal.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 9, 2024
- Alabama HB113 To amend Section 16-28-4, Code of Alabama 1975, relating to the minimum age for attendance at public schools; to require a child to complete kindergarten or demonstrate first-grade readiness before entering the first grade; to provide for circumstances under which a child who is under five years of age on

September 1 may be admitted to public kindergarten; to provide for circumstances under which a child who is under six years of age on December 31 may be admitted to public school first grade; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Section 111.05 of the Constitution of Alabama of 2022.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 8, 2024.
- Alabama HB129 Relating to education; to enact the CHOOSE Act; to establish a refundable income tax credit to offset the cost of qualifying educational expenses; to direct the Department of Revenue to establish education savings accounts through which parents can access funds to direct the education of participating students through education service providers and participating schools; to establish CHOOSE Act program requirements for parents of participating students, education service providers, and participating schools; to specify powers and duties of the Department of Revenue in administering the CHOOSE Act program; to prevent fraud or other misuse of CHOOSE Act program funds; to establish the CHOOSE Act fund.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) March 8, 2024.
- Alabama HB188 –to K-12 public education; to amend Section 16-1-14, Code of Alabama 1975; to provide a uniform system of procedural due process protections for students facing long-term suspension or expulsion for violating the student code of conduct or state law.
- Sponsor Terri Collins
- Introduced (100% Passed in the House/Senate) May 8, 2024.
- Alabama HB251/SB206 To prohibit public K-12 schools from taking certain actions regarding dependent children of active-duty military parents; and to prohibit public K-12 schools from membership in athletic associations that take these same actions. No public K-12 school may deny a dependent child of a full-time active-duty military parent immediate eligibility to participate in an interscholastic athletic contest on the basis of the child enrolling in a new school due to the child and his or her parent making a bona fide move pursuant to permanent change of station (PCS) orders received by the parent, regardless of the date upon which the child enrolls in the new school within the school attendance of the bona fide move. A public school and an athletic association may require a parent to provide his or her PCS orders to substantiate a bona fide move that necessitates a child's enrollment in a new school. This act shall become effective on October 1, 2024.

- Alabama HB280 to public K-12 education; to amend Section 16-40A-3, Code of Alabama 1975, to require research-based instruction on fentanyl prevention and drug poisoning awareness in grades six through 12.

- Introduced (100% Passed in the House/Senate) May 7, 2024.
- Alabama HB290 Public and nonpublic schools, sudden cardiac arrest, required to develop and implement cardiac emergency response plan.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 9, 2024.
- Alabama HB439 Public K-12 education; to rename the position of technology coordinator to technology director; to provide for the minimum qualifications of technology directors for each school system; to provide a waiver process for certain school systems; and to require each individual serving in the role of technology director to complete a training program and continuing education instruction by the Alabama Leaders in Educational Technology.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 8, 2024.
- Alabama HB450 To propose a local constitutional amendment relating to Autauga County to provide for the levy and collection of an ad valorem tax in addition to any ad valorem tax currently levied; and to provide for the use of the proceeds for public school purposes in the county.
- Sponsor Jerry Starnes
- Introduced (100% Passed in the House/Senate) May 7, 2024.
- Alabama SB48 Relating to public Pre K-12 education; to require the posting of classroom curricula on the website of the school; to permit parents or guardians of enrolled students, upon request, to request information on instructional and supplemental materials used in the classroom; to provide a complaint process; and to provide for the reporting of the number of complaints to the State Superintendent of Education and the Legislature.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) March 21, 2024.
- Alabama SB98 Public K-12 school security; School Security Program, established to require school security inspections and grading; School Security and Fire Safety Fund, established to provide grants; School Mapping Data Program, established to provide criteria for school maps; Department of Education and ALEA, authorized to adopt rules.
- Sponsor Arthur Orr
- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 8, 2024.
- Alabama SB157 to public education employees; to authorize a teacher to exclude students from the classroom in certain circumstances; to authorize the placement of an excluded student under the control of a principal; to provide procedures relating to the return of an excluded student to the classroom; to authorize a school principal to suspend or recommend for alternative school a student who is excluded from the classroom three times in one month in certain circumstances; to require each local board of education to adopt a process for a teacher to appeal a principal's decision relating to a student's return to the classroom; to provide immunity to education employees for civil and criminal actions related to the performance of their duties; to authorize, and in certain circumstances, require, the Educators' Liability Trust Fund reimburse certain expenses for certain legal fees incurred by education employees; to require the Educators' Liability Trust Fund to provide an annual report; to create a rebuttable presumption that teachers take necessary actions relating to classroom maintenance; and to require the State Board of Education to adopt a model policy and each local board of education to adopt a policy.

- Alabama SB211/HB292 To amend Section 16-28-60, relating to the remote enrollment of children of active-duty military personnel in public K-12 schools; to include the remote enrollment of special needs children of active-duty military personnel; to provide for the transfer of records relating to the child; and to require informed parental consent prior to the reevaluation of the special needs student.

- Introduced (75% Passed in the House/Senate) May 2, 2024.

#### **Purple Star Schools**

• 76 new schools were designated Purple Star School status in April 2024. Bringing Alabama's total to 249 Purple Star Schools. 122 schools achieved Purple Star Status in 2023.

#### **Community Events/Partnerships**

- In partnership with Operation Homefront coordinated a base event featuring information booths from fifteen school/community partners and provided 250 backpacks filled with school supplies to military-connected students (Jul 23).
- Conducted multiple MIC3 briefings to educators at MCEC 360 Summits throughout the state (Orange Beach Aug 23, Montgomery Nov 23, Huntsville Dec 23, Phenix City Feb/Apr 24). Briefed approximately 200 educators about the MIC3 and how it supports military-connected students.
- Coordinated three resiliency events with the School Liaison Office, Military Family Life Counselor, and local high school students. More than 100 students served (Sept 23, Dec 23 & Mar 24).
- Coordinated with multiple on-base organizations to arrange school visits for several local high schools and 250 students to participate in Air University (Maxwell AFB)/19th AF Fly-in/High School Career Expo (Oct 23).
- Arranged AF Band of the West to visit/perform at several (3) local schools (Nov 23). 500+ students attended.
- Instituted Military Family Life Counselor (MFLC) support at 4 new local schools (Nov 23).
- Served as a panelist (speaker) and hosted a booth at the Association of Defense Communities (ADC) Installation Innovation Forum in Orlando, FL (Nov 23).
- SLPM attended the MIC3 Annual Business Meeting (Nov 23).
- SLPM coordinated with on/off base agencies to conduct a Teen Dating Violence Awareness presentation at a local high school (Feb 24).
- SLPM office hosted multiple virtual chats with inbound military personnel PCSing to Alabama (Jan/Apr 24). More than 50 participants.
- SLPM coordinated an Air Show STEM Day for 58 schools and 3000+ students from Central Alabama. Students were exposed to more than 40 exhibitors showcasing Augmented Reality (AR), Virtual Reality (VR), Robotics, Drones, Planetarium, programs, and jobs related to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. (Apr 24)

• SL office coordinated with Retirement Systems of Alabama (RSA) to light Montgomery & Mobile's RSA tower Purple to honor and recognize Purple UP! Day for Month of the Military Child. We also collaborated with the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce to light the downtown fountain purple.








2024 Beyond the Horizon Air Show and STEM Day Event









Erica Lewis, School Liaison Officer for Redstone Arsenal, has displayed excellent leadership as a School Liaison Officer in her community for 2023-24, which is as follows:

- \*SLO, along with the Redstone Arsenal Garrison Commander, COL Brian Cozine, participated in the Impact Aid kickoff with our 3 local school districts (Huntsville City Schools, Madison City Schools, and Madison County Schools) on October 12, 2023. Throughout the campaign, information was shared with RSA workforce and residents on Impact Aid.
- \*SLO and RSA Garrison Commander, COL Brian Cozine shared opening remarks for the Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC) 360 Summit on December 4, 2023. The SLO talked with educators about the role of a School Liaison Officer and thanked them for the vital role teachers play in easing the transition of military-connected students.
- \*SLO was able to implement another successful year (23-24) of programming for our homeschool students, where the homeschoolers were able to participate in fun and engaging activities to include, archery, STEM activities, art, and physical fitness.
- \*SLO coordinated with local schools to have over 47 people from RSA organizations participate in Read Across America. Volunteer readers went to 13 different schools across 3 school districts to read to students on Dr. Seuss's birthday. They shared stories and the importance of reading.
- SLO successfully planned and executed JRTOC Day 2024, held at Redstone Arsenal on April 4<sup>th</sup>. This was the first time the event has been held since COVID. The purpose of the event was to showcase the different career path and post-secondary opportunities that exist here at Redstone Arsenal. The Garrison hosted 578 cadets from 15 high schools across the Tennessee Valley area. Cadets participated in panel discussion, rotated through various booths, and displays from tenant organizations on the arsenal as well as community partners, participated in a fitness and spirit competition. It was a great day for all who participated!

\*SLO held the annual Kindergarten Boot Camp for children in the Strong Beginnings program on May 15th. 35 students were able to rotate through stations to help them see what a day of kindergarten will be like once they start school. It was a fun event for all!

- Coordinated efforts to provide Enterprise City Schools with two Military Family Life Counselors to provide support to nine schools in the district. The support has been well received by school personnel and most of all offering awesome support to Military Families in the district. Nothing but positive feedback has been received and support will continue for the 24/25 school year.
- Worked with IMCOM School Support Services Director to provide Military Family Life Counselors support to DoDEA Parker Elementary School on Ft. Novosel.
- New requests for MFLC support have not been suspended since October 2023. We utilized our current imbedded Child and Youth Services MFLC to provide support three days a week at the elementary school and continue providing services to CYS Families two days a week from April 2024-May 2024.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ARKANSAS COUNCIL FOR MILITARY CHILDREN

## TO THE GOVERNOR AND SENATE AND HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEES COVERING ACADEMIC YEAR 2023-2024

#### **Statutory Requirements**

Pursuant to the Arkansas Code Annotated (ACA) Section 6-28-204(f), the Arkansas Council for Military Children (hereinafter the Council) hereby submits this report to the Governor of Arkansas and to the Education Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives of the Arkansas General Assembly.

This report covers the period from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. Because this Council is concerned with the support of children of military families enrolled in Arkansas public schools, that time period is referenced in this report as Academic Year 2023-2024, or AY 2023-2024.

ACA 6-28-204 requires this Council to report on the following areas (excerpted verbatim from ACA 6-28-204(h):

(1) Information regarding the achievements of the State Council and public school districts regarding the support provided to military families under this chapter;

(2) Details of the reports provided to the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3);

(3) The number of children of military families in each public school district transferring to or from another state or federal education agency in the previous year;

(4) Summaries of cases elevated to the chair for counsel and assistance in resolving cases involving the transition of children of military families that were elevated by military families, United States Department of Defense officials; or Public school districts.

(5) Information regarding training that is provided to public school district personnel with respect to this chapter

(6) Details regarding plans for future engagement efforts with uniformed services families under this chapter; and

(7) Any other information deemed relevant by the Council.

The Council has also decided to submit this report to the Secretary of Education and the State Board of Education and will submit this report to the MIC3 national office to satisfy the requirements of MIC3 Rule 2.102.

#### **Executive Summary**

The Council has enjoyed significant successes during the 2023-24 Academic Year. The Council has held two forums for military families, with the highest number of participants yet. This enabled the council to collect useful information about the needs of military families and to disseminate information regarding Education Freedom Accounts (available to all military families during the 2024-25 academic year). The Council has increased the number of Purple Star Schools statewide to 175. While this was short of the Council's goal of 200 Purple Star Schools, it did represent a 53% increase in the number of Purple Star Schools. The survey of the needs of military families which the Council conducted in the fall of 2023 yielded valuable information about the ability of military families to meet basic needs and has resulted in one recommendation by the Council for new legislation. The Council has expanded its outreach efforts by adding a non-voting advisor on school choice and has merged the Military Family Forum Committee with the Outreach Committee to enhance efficiency. The Council has created a Student Advisory Committee to receive direct input from high school students whose parent or guardian is currently serving in the military and to give these students experience serving with a state government council. Finally, the Council has created the Outstanding Military Scholar Award.

#### I. Achievements of the State Council and Public School Districts.

A. Military Family Forum.

The Council conducted an online forum on October 18, 2023. Two families attended.

The Council conducted an online forum on February 28, 2024 from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. The forum included a guest presenter on Education Freedom Accounts. 27 families attended.

B. Recognition Programs.

The award to recognize Outstanding District Military Education Coordinators was approved for two individuals.

The Council created the Outstanding Military Scholar Award. This award will be presented annually to one graduating senior each year who is the child of a current or former member of the uniformed services of the United States, including the National Guard. Four finalists will be chosen through statewide competition, with one finalist selected as the state winner. The Council expects to receive nominations for the award beginning in January 2025 and then present the first award in the spring of 2025.

The Council created a "Military Kid of the Month" program. Children of military service members may be nominated by a school official. Recipients are selected by Council members. Selectees receive a certificate and are highlighted in the Council's monthly e-newsletter.

C. Purple Star Schools.

The number of schools qualifying for Purple Star School status has increased from 114 to 175. A sortable list of Arkansas Purple Star Schools is available at this link <u>at this link</u> on the Council web site. The number of school districts qualifying for recognition as Purple Star School Districts has risen from 13 to 19. Two charter school districts and six private schools have achieved Purple Star status. A sortable list of Arkansas Purple Star School Districts is available <u>at this link</u> on the Council web site.

The Council has revised the requirements to become a Purple Star School. Schools must now designate individuals to serve on their family and community engagement committees who will focus on issues for military families. The school must also address issues for military families in the school's engagement plan.

Last year the Council reported that lack of funding for Purple Star School banners was a hindrance to the program. In January 2024 the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education agreed to purchase banners for the Council.

D. Outreach and Training.

The Council has conducted seventeen online training sessions and one in-person training session for district military education coordinators and school military liaisons. Approximately 75 people received the training.

Council members staffed a discussion panel on engaging and supporting military families at the ADE Summit in Hot Springs on July 11, 2023. Approximately 30 people attended the panel.

Council members visited the Ebbing Air National Guard Station on March 2, 2024 to educate service and family members about Education Freedom Accounts.

Council members visited the Little Rock Air Force Base on two occasions to educate service and family members about Education Freedom Accounts.

Subscriptions to the Council's monthly e-newsletter have continued to increase.

- E. Survey. The survey of military families was open from September 7, 2023 through December 31, 2023. 255 responses were received. This was 31% reduction from the previous survey. The low response compared to the previous survey is attributed to the current survey's not being publicized through a Commissioner's Memo from DESE. Results of the survey are presented in Appendix A. The results indicate that a significant number of military families are experiencing some difficulty in meeting basic survival needs such as food and healthcare, especially in the enlisted ranks.
- F. Student Advisory Committee. The Student Advisory Committee will include up to five high school juniors and seniors chosen from Arkansas' four congressional districts and the Arkansas Military and First Responders Academy. The students must be children of currently serving members of the uniformed services. The Committee is chaired by the Council Vice Chair and mentored by three additional Council members. The Committee members will participate in Council meetings as non-voting advisors and will provide input for the Council's annual report. The purposes of the Committee

are to enable the Council to receive direct, regular input from the children of military families and to provide students with an opportunity to learn about the operations of a state government body. The Committee will begin operations during the 2024-25 academic year.

#### II. Reports to the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission.

The Council submitted the annual report to MIC3 required by the MIC3 Rule 2.102.

#### III. Children of Military Families Transferring Into and Out of Arkansas Public School Districts During AY 2023-2024

- A) Conduct at least one Military Family Forum, pursuant to ACA 6-28-204(f).
- B) Hold its regularly scheduled council meetings in various communities in order to facilitate in-person attendance by members of the public with a web-based option for persons who wish to attend virtually.
- C) Continue to conduct training statewide.
- D) Conduct a series of online sessions to provide information to parents and educators about the Outstanding Military Scholar Award.
- E) Conduct a series of online sessions to educate military family members about resources available to them.
- F) Increase the number of Purple Star Schools from 174 to 250.

- G) Implement the Student Advisory Committee.
- H) Implement a program to recognize cities and counties as Purple Star Communities.
- I) Conduct a needs survey of military families.

C. District Military Education Coordinators.

Currently 62 school districts in Arkansas are required to appoint a district military education coordinator under ACA § 6-28-116. Four school districts required to appoint a district military education coordinator are not in compliance with the statute. A list of school districts required to appoint a district military education coordinator is at **Appendix F**.

D. Recognition of Arkansas "Best Practices".

The Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) held its national Annual Business Meeting in Richmond, Virginia November 8 and 9, 2023. Col. (Ret.) Kaminar and Ms. Williams represented Arkansas at the meeting. Col. Kaminar was asked to present briefly on best practices in Arkansas. The presentation slides are at **Appendix G**.

#### VIII. Recommendations.

The survey of military families referenced in section \_ above indicated that food insecurity is a problem for 19% of families responding to the survey. According to a <u>report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in October 2023</u>, Arkansas indicated a food insecurity prevalence of 16.6%, the highest in the United States. Additionally, <u>research conducted by the Military Family Advisory Network</u> indicated that in 2021 (the most recent data available), approximately 16.6% of military and veteran families were food insecure; 23.3% of enlisted families were food insecure.

#### It is the recommendation of this Council that legislation be passed to:

- a) Require all public school districts, including charter schools, to develop and publish annually a plan for addressing food insecurity among its student body.
- b) Require the Arkansas National Guard Family Readiness Program to develop and implement a plan for addressing food insecurity among Arkansas National Guard families.

# SURVEY OF MILITARY FAMILIES FALL 2023

RESULTS

The Arkansas Council for Military Children (the Council) conducted a survey of military families during the fall of 2023. The purpose was to assess

- a) The familiarity of military families in Arkansas with various resources available to them and
- b) The ability of military families in Arkansas to fulfill basic needs.

The survey opened on September 7, 2023 and closed on December 31, 2023. The survey was announced via e-mail to the network of District Military Education Coordinators, school counselors, and school district family and community engagement coordinators. The survey was also publicized ion the Council's e-newsletter published on October 1, 2023, November 1, 2023, and December 1, 2023.

A total of 255 persons responded to the survey. Six responses included no information. 29 responses were supplied by individuals with no connection to the military. The remaining 240 responses (i.e., responses with a current or former connection to the military) are presented in the following pages.

The survey consisted of 28 questions. Question 9 consisted of 11 subquestions.

Questions 1 through 4 elicited demographic information on the respondents.

Questions 4 through 8 elicited information on the schools which the respondents' children attended.

Questions 9 and 10 sought to establish how familiar the respondents were with various organizations or services that support military families.

Questions 11 through 14 sought to determine the respondents' knowledge of and interaction with the Council. Please note that Question 14 appears out of sequence in this report in order to allow questions pertaining to the Council's military family forum to appear on the same page.

Questions 15 through 19 sought to determine the respondents' knowledge of and interaction with the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission.

Questions 20 through 23 elicited information about the respondents' use of school choice.

Questions 24 through 30 elicited information about the respondents' use of advance enrollment and virtual enrollment opportunities.

Questions 31 through 38 elicited information about the respondents' ability to fulfill basic needs.


The results of this survey indicate the following:

- a) Significant numbers of military families in Arkansas are unaware of many of the resources and organizations that exist to support them.
- b) Significant numbers of military families were unable to fulfill some basic needs (medical care, child care, and food).
- c) Inability to fulfill basic needs was more prevalent among reserve component service members than among active duty service members.
- d) Inability to fulfill basic needs was more prevalent among enlisted members, especially among noncommissioned officers, than among commissioned officers and warrant officers.




#### 1. Military Status of Respondents (240)




#### 2. Rank Group of Respondents (178)



The Connecticut State Council (Council) met in a joint meeting with the Military School Liaison Committee (MSLC) on November 30, 2023. The Council discussed the Military Spouse Licensing Relief Act, which amended the Servicemembers' Civil Relief Act. The group discussed the impact for the school districts. The group discussed the Penn State Study of the Compact, which was commissioned by the Department of Defense in response to the reauthorization of the NDAA. The members expressed their concerns with possible amendments to the Compact that could jeopardize its existence. The DSLO initiatives were also presented and discussed by the group.

The Council's second joint meeting with the MSLC of this fiscal year was held in person on May 2, 2024. The group was advised of the Commission's communication with DSLO regarding

proposed amendments to the Compact. The group also discussed the joint resolution by Representative Courtney and Senator Hirono in support of the Compact. Two successful transition cases were presented and discussed—both involved students receiving reciprocal diplomas from other states. The cases demonstrate that the Compact does make a big difference for students, and the group discussed how to celebrate and get the word out about these successful transitions that would never have been possible without the Compact. The group also discussed raising Compact awareness in the state, the Quality of Life survey, certification for military spouses, Our Community Salutes initiative, and progress on getting data from DOD to allow districts credit for students electing to join the military after high school.

The Commissioner's Designee attended the NCOSEA/NASBE Conference and conducted a training session for state education attorneys on the Compact, and the NAFIS September 2023 Conference as the MIC3 representative, presenting NAFIS with an award recognizing its support of MIC3. She also attended the MIC3 Annual Business Meeting in Richmond and the EXCOM Retreat in April of 2024.

# Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission HAWAII — FY2024 End of Year Report



## Hawaii's Compact Membership and Influence

The State of Hawaii joined the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in 2009, with enactment by the Hawaii State Legislature of the requisite compact law on June 25th of that year. In October, then Hawaii Department of Education Superintendent Patricia Hamamoto, with approval by the Board of Education, appointed Brigadier General Kathleen Berg, USAF, Retired to be the Hawaii State Commissioner, to oversee the Hawaii State Council and facilitate the Compact between Hawaii and other member states. It would take until 2014 for all 50 states and the District of Columbia to join the Compact. Berg and a delegation from Hawaii that included then State Representative K. Mark Takai, one of the sponsors of Hawaii's Compact law, attended the second annual business meeting of the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) held in fall 2009 in California. Berg was elected vice chair of the Commission and represented Hawaii in leadership positions as vice chair (2009-2011), then chair, (2011-2014) and past chair (2014-2016). She received her 15-year pin this year from MIC3 and retired as Hawaii's state commissioner at the end of FY2024. Also part of that 2009 delegation was then Hawaii Department of Education (HIDOE) Military Liaison Cherise Imai, who added administrative support for the State Commissioner and Hawaii State Council to her duties. In 2016, Imai was hired by MIC3 to be their third Executive Director, and she moved from Hawaii to Kentucky, where she still leads the MIC3 National Office. Current HIDOE Military Liaison Cherry Okahara replaced Imai in 2016 and served through FY2024. Hawaii will be represented by a new Commissioner as of July 1, 2024.

The military is an important component of the population and economy of Hawaii. The State is home to all five DOD services (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Space Force) and DHS's Coast Guard, with twelve key military installations and bases across the state. With nearly 42,000 active duty members assigned here, per data from the DOD Defense Manpower Data System in September 2021, Hawaii was ranked eighth among the states and has the highest number of military-dependent children per capita in the nation. According to the DOD DEERS Database in July 2022, the number of school-age military dependents in the state was 17,864. However, not all of those students were enrolled in Hawaii's public and charter schools; schooling options in the state also include private and parochial schools and homeschooling. Although accurate numbers are very difficult to get, it has been estimated that military-dependent students make up at least 8% of the total public and charter school enrollment in Hawaii, which was 167,649 in the official count taken at the start of the 2023–24 school year.

The 295 schools (258 public, 37 charter) of the HIDOE belong to one statewide public school district with 15 regional Complex Areas. Each Complex Area consists of two to four school complexes, a complex being a high school and the elementary and middle schools that feed into it. Each Complex Area has its own Complex Area Superintendent (CAS) and support staff. There are 58 public schools listed on the HIDOE Military Families website [ https://www.hawaiipublicschools.org/ParentsAndStudents/MilitaryFamilies/Pages/Home.aspx ] as having significant populations of military-dependent students. All are located on Oahu, with the largest concentration of military students in the Central administrative district Complexes.

## Hawaii State Council

From its first meeting in April 2010, the Hawaii State Council has met regularly and complements a number of other organizations created in the state to support military students in Hawaii public schools, chief among them the Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF), which shares much of its membership with the State Council.

#### Hawaii State Council Members

Specific guidance for the composition and the operation of the State Council can be found in HRS 311D - 2. The Council is to be composed of the following:

[§311D-2] State council. There is established within the board of education for administrative purposes the state council on educational opportunity for military children. The board of education shall establish the state council, as required by article VIII of the compact. The membership of the state council shall include, at a minimum:

(1) The superintendent of education or the superintendent's designee;

(2) The complex area superintendents of the administrative districts that contain the Leilehua,

Radford/Moanalua, and Kalaheo school complexes;

(3) A complex area superintendent from the Leeward district;

(4) The military liaison from the department of education;

(5) A uniformed military representative from the United States Pacific Command;

(6) One installation-level uniformed military representative from each branch of service of the Air

Force, Army, Marine Corps, Navy, and Coast Guard;

(7) The governor or the governor's designee;

(8) The chairperson of the senate education committee or the chairperson's designee;

(9) The chairperson of the house education committee or the chairperson's designee; and

(10) Other offices and stakeholder groups the state council deems necessary.

Members of the state council may delegate voting authority to another person for a specified meeting or meetings. The state council shall appoint or designate a military family education liaison to assist military families and the state in facilitating the implementation of this compact. The compact commissioner and the military family education liaison designated herein shall be ex-officio members of the state council, unless either is already a full voting member of the state council. The council shall establish policies and procedures governing its operations but subject to the open meeting requirements of chapter 92. [L 2009, c 152, pt of §1; am L 2011, c 82, pt of §1]

## **Points of Contact**

Retired Brigadier General Kathleen Berg, Hawaii State Commissioner and Ms. Cherry Okahara, State of Hawaii Department of Education (HIDOE) Military Liaison served as the Interstate Compact points of contact for Hawaii for FY2024. From July 1, 2024, the points of contact will be new Hawaii State Commissioner Mr. John Erickson, Complex Area Superintendent of the Moanalua-Radford-Aiea Complex of the HIDOE, and, until the military liaison position is filled, Interim Assistant Superintendent Elizabeth Higashi, who also serves as Director of the Community Engagement Branch of the HIDOE.

## Summary of Accomplishments, Activities, and Presentations in FY2024 (July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024)

Hawaii State Commissioner Berg and HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara continued to advise HIDOE personnel on issues involving the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children and assist them in applying Compact rules where appropriate, working closely with the military services' school liaison officers (SLOs) to resolve any Compact issues. They regularly attended meetings of the Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF) and the Hawaii Education Liaison Officers Council (HELOC), interacting with members of the military, education, and business communities, as well as arranged office calls to brief new members and new uniformed military liaisons to the Hawaii State Council .

Berg and Okahara played roles in work done over the previous few years, primarily by the Military Impacted Principals Council (MIPC), to revise and update the NORBERT Award, which was instituted by JVEF in 2006 as a "stamp of excellence" for schools that met the required criteria for creating a welcoming environment for incoming military-dependent students enrolling at their campuses. The name "NORBERT" was a combination of the names of the first two recognized schools' principals—Norman Minehira of Leilehua High and Robert Stevens of Radford High. The Purple Star NORBERT Hawaii Award now combines the NORBERT Award with the Purple Star School Program, a national program designed to recognize schools that respond to the educational and social-emotional challenges faced by military-connected children during their transition to a new school and their work to keep these students on track to be college, workforce, and community-ready. In spring 2023, the co-chairs of MIPC—Principals Paloma Amanda and Jason Nakamoto—briefed JVEF about the updated award program, and in September 2023 schools were invited to apply for the Purple Star NORBERT Hawaii Award. HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara was the point of contact for questions and helped administer the program for JVEF and the HIDOE. The work all came to fruition in December when 12 Oahu public schools were awarded with the Purple Star NORBERT Hawaii Award at the Annual Meeting of JVEF on December 15, 2023.

Berg and Okahara play active roles in the Joint Venture Education Forum: the MIC3 State Commissioner is a Liaison Member of JVEF and the HIDOE Military Liaison is one of the two coordinators of JVEF who work together to help plan the meetings and support its co-chairs, one chair from the HIDOE and the other chair from the United States Indo-Pacific Command (USINDOPACOM). Before her retirement in 2009 from the Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG), Berg was the HIANG military representative on the Board of JVEF, before its reorganization under a revised Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The newly reorganized JVEF then included among its Liaison Members, the MIC3 Hawaii State Commissioner.

April is Month of the Military Child, and April 15, 2024 was designated Purple Up! Day in the HIDOE. A flyer announcing the day was provided by HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara; it included a request for photos

of school celebrations of the day for presentation at JVEF. Two examples of noteworthy celebrations of the Month of the Military Child and Purple Up! Day are described below.

HHBN Static Display Field Trip. Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion (HHBN) hosted a static display field trip for the Daniel K. Inouye Elementary School in honor of the month of the military child at Hamilton Field, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, on April 25, 2024. **Presentation of Buddy Benches.** On April 1st, Kainalu Elementary kicked off the Month of the Military Child with the Marines of MWSS-174 of Marine Corps Base Hawaii Kaneohe Bay. MWSS-174, a MAG-24 squadron, constructed and primed six Buddy Benches to be painted by the school's Aloha Ambassadors & Crew and placed on the school campus. The Kainalu PTSA donated the supplies, and the project and collaborative partnerships were organized through The Transition Center at Kainalu. The benches, as envisioned by the Aloha Ambassadors & Crew members, are where students who are having trouble during recess, experiencing loneliness, are new to the school, or want to play something different may sit. By sitting on the Buddy Bench, a student signals to other kids on the playground that they are looking for a friend to play or talk to. The benches also create awareness among the school community, presenting opportunities for students to reach out and be kind, invite students to play, make new friends, or ask others how they are doing. ## **Cooperation and Coordination with Other Organizations**

Retired Brigadier General Berg, as Hawaii State Commissioner, was a Liaison Member of the Joint Venture Education Forum (JVEF), a formal partnership between the HIDOE and USINDOPACOM with membership and involvement of other community stakeholders, including the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii Military Affairs Council and the Hawaii Business Roundtable. JVEF was established June 9, 1999 as a venue to address mutual concerns through meaningful discussion and relationships to promote educational opportunities for Hawaii's children. JVEF provides continuous coordination through partnerships and open dialogue in order to 1) promote an understanding of and implement initiatives to address the needs of military children and families, 2) enhance open dialogue on education concerns of the military community, and 3) facilitate educational support of all children in Hawaii public schools, in alignment with the HIDOE mission. It was modeled after the Military Youth Advisory Council (MYAC), established a few years earlier at Admiral Arthur W. Radford High School, whose student population has always been approximately 65% military dependents. JVEF was part of the working group convened in July 2008 by State Senate Committee on Education Chair, former Senator Norman Sakamoto, to discuss Compact issues that arose during the 2008 State Legislature as they debated a number of bills that were introduced related to Hawaii joining the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children. After extensive debate, S.B. No. 2877 SD2 was amended to remove the provision that would have approved the Compact, and instead created a task force to analyze the Compact, to explore the concerns raised during debate. As a JVEF Board member representing the Hawaii Air National Guard and a full-time educator with the University of Hawaii College of Education, Commissioner Berg was party to the working group discussions. Task Force members of the working group presented their report to the JVEF General Membership meeting on October 14 and November 13, 2008. The HIDOE worked with former Senator Norman Sakamoto and then State Representative K. Mark Takai, the JVEF, and other stakeholders on revising the Compact language for Hawaii. Most of the revisions involved the membership of the State Council: Hawaii's council is very inclusive and one of the largest, including uniformed representatives from all DOD active duty services as well as the Coast Guard and the US Pacific Command (now USINDOPACOM), also education leadership from all heavily impacted school Complexes, and the department's Military Liaison. Upon his review, the attorney overseeing the states' adoptions of the military interstate compact for the Council of State Governments (CSG) determined that "the Hawaii modifications did not deviate substantially from the material provisions in the compact statutes enacted by current signatory member states." So, led by Sakamoto and Takai, S.B. No. 1164 was introduced and signed into law on June 25, 2009 as ACT 152 (2009), relating to Interstate Compact for Educational Opportunity for Military Children. JVEF paid Hawaii's Compact dues for the first two years of membership, using some of the funding secured from Congress by Hawaii's Senator Daniel K. Inouye to support JVEF activities. On June 3, 2011, HB4 SD2 CD1 was reauthorized and signed by Governor Neil Abercrombie.

A key element of JVEF over the years has been the military-school partnerships, which matched most of the public schools on Oahu with a military unit whose members volunteered their time to help with various school projects throughout the school year. Most of the uniformed military members of the Hawaii State Council for the Interstate Compact are also Liaison Members of JVEF. JVEF meets regularly throughout the year, alternating monthly between meetings of the Liaison Members and of the various Focus Groups, and— up until the pandemic interruption—including one annual event. After years of only virtual meetings, then both virtual and in-person, FY2024 saw the return to all in-person meetings. Over those years, the meeting agendas for JVEF included an update from the MIC3 State Commissioner. HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara, along with a member of the J1 Directorate at USINDOPACOM, serve as the administrative support team for JVEF, called its Coordinators. The JVEF co-chairs are the USINDOPACOM J1 and the HIDOE Superintendent. Every year in April, JVEF works closely with the HIDOE in celebrating the Month of the Military Child

among the military and civilian communities and the HIDOE schools, providing information from MIC3 and DoDEA to the JVEF membership.

The Military Youth Advisory Council (MYAC), was established in 1995 and brought together Radford Complex principals and the base commanders of nearby Army, Air Force, and Navy installations. One of MYAC's main focus areas was transitioning new students. It now serves the Radford Complex as a primary community group, meeting once a month at the Radford campus. Radford High School had one of the first Transition Centers in Hawaii schools. Its Student-to-Student Transition Center program has served as a model for many of the other Hawaii public schools' transition programs, many of which have received funding from HIDOE and community partners as part of the K. Mark Takai Transition Center Network. MIC3 has regularly been part of the now annual Transition Centers Best Practices Conference, put on by HIDOE, Hawaii Business Roundtable, and the K. Mark Takai Foundation. For last year's 2023 conference, MIC3 Executive Director Imai attended and presented along with Commissioner Berg a Compact 101 Training session. The training fulfilled a requirement for schools that seek to earn the Purple Star NORBERT Hawaii Award that distinguishes them as a military-friendly school. Training of school faculty on provisions of the Interstate Compact is now part of the list of requirements developed by the Military Impacted Principals Council (MIPC) to qualify for the award. MIPC was an outgrowth of JVEF and provides for sharing of experiences and ideas and helps new principals come up to speed on the Compact and other military student issues.

There are many groups operating in Hawaii that serve military-dependent students in the public schools. People and organizations overlap, cooperate, and coordinate activities in support of military students and families. The Interstate Compact is just part of that effort and benefits from those organizations and events. Since the early 2000s, the HIDOE has funded, as a full-time position, the HIDOE Military Liaison as part of its administration, now under the Community Engagement Branch of the HIDOE. The position responsibilities include support for JVEF and Compact activities and requirements, as well as staffing for the Hawaii State Commissioner and State Council functions. The organization of Hawaii's school system as a single school district facilitates communication and compliance. And the several military services' school liaison officers (SLOs) in Hawaii have always been very competent with many years of experience. Several years ago, the Hawaii Education Liaison Officers Council (HELOC) was formed. It meets monthly and includes all the SLOs, representatives from USINDOPACOM Quality of Life and Education section, military branches' youth services representatives, and the HIDOE Military Liaison.

Four cases in FY24 rose to the attention of the Hawaii State Commissioner and/or HIDOE Military Liaison. One involved an inquiry about a school that the questioner said had no gifted program. HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara reached out to the school and subsequently provided information to the family that the school did differentiation to meet the needs of accelerated learners. She noted that the school has accelerated math courses that their student might be placed into. She recommended that the parents reach out to the Student Support Advisor or the 6th Grade Administrator to assist with their inquiry. The other three cases all involved reciprocal diplomas. One was a problem due to the other school's "seat hours" policy for the award of grades and course credits that, fortunately, could be solved because of the Hawaii school's standards-based grading. Another reciprocal diploma issue was due to a mainland school district not knowing that because their state is a Compact member, their district, even though not heavily military impacted, is subject to the Compact Rules, which include specific guidance for the case of a student who transfers during her senior year. Those two cases had been brought to the attention of Commissioner Berg and were quickly resolved, one with assistance from the MIC3 National Office. The third reciprocal diploma problem was brought to the HIDOE Military Liaison's attention via an inquiry from Texas about a student who previously attended a high school in Hawaii. She was

able to connect the counselor/staff member with a counselor at a military-impacted high school in Hawaii, who could advise the caller how to proceed.

The case involving a school with a "seat hours" policy was similar to a case that the MIC3 National Office presented for discussion to recent online meetings of the four MIC3 Tier Groups. Hawaii is part of Tier Group 1, the 10 states with the highest numbers of military dependent students in their public schools. The discussions were part of a problem solving process to determine if a legal opinion or even a rule revision or creation was needed to address a problem that appears to have no immediate solution.

The relatively low number of problems and complaints that came up through school channels or via direct calls to HIDOE Military Liaison Okahara or to State Commissioner Berg indicate that school level administrators, Complex Area superintendents, and the military's school liaison officers in Hawaii are doing a very effective job of helping military families and implementing Compact rules for transitioning military students. The large forums that JVEF and MYAC provide are also sources of feedback from military members and parents, so that any issues that do exist gain visibility and can be resolved quickly. The HIDOE Military Liaison has maintained a database of cases over the years so they can be shared with the State Council and the MIC3 National Office when appropriate.

## The Key to Hawaii's Success?

During the 2023 ABM in Richmond, Virginia, the MIC3 leadership initiated State Spotlight sessions as short presentations done just before attendees were released for a comfort break during the two days of meeting proceedings. They wanted to highlight for all the assembled state commissioners some of the best practices for implementing the Interstate Compact that are being used in other member states. Several commissioners who would be in attendance were contacted prior to the meeting and asked to share for no more than 5 minutes a couple of best practices they used as a commissioner, or their state used, to implement the Interstate Compact—in other words, to share "the key to their success." The six states whose commissioners presented at the November 2023 meeting were South Carolina, Arkansas, West Virginia, New York, Hawaii, and New Hampshire.

When Hawaii State Commissioner Berg's turn came to spotlight the State's key to its successful implementation of the Interstate Compact in Hawaii, her oral presentation included descriptions of the long-time and enduring Joint Venture Education Forum partnership and of the HIDOE Military Liaison position, created to provide full-time support to JVEF and now to the Hawaii State Commissioner and State Council functions as well. In other words, Hawaii provides state funding for a person whose job it is to support military families whose school-age children become part of the Hawaii Ohana (family) when the military assigns their parents to duty in the State of Aloha—Hawaii.

The following information is provided in accordance with MIC3 Policy 01-2017, state coordination, for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024. The Kansas Military Child Education Council (KMCEC) held a virtual Teams meeting on February 29, 2024. The agenda and minutes for that meeting are being submitted with this letter and are posted on the Kansas Military Families <u>website</u>.

The Council reviewed basic and historical information concerning MIC3 efforts in Kansas. Members were briefed on the 2023 Annual Business Meeting. The Council thanked Dr. Keith Mispagel from the Fort Leavenworth district for his presentation on Innovative Supports for Military Children at the ABM in November. The dues for FY24 were reviewed and discussed. Several State student challenges were discussed. All were resolved and none of them rose to the national level.

Discussion moved to the Month of the Military Child and Purple Up activities. Many districts had activities planned to recognize and celebrate military students and their families. KSDE requested a formal signing ceremony for the Governor's Proclamation for Month of the Military Child. On March 27, Governor Kelly welcomed military families and Superintendents from Leavenworth and Derby to the official signing ceremony in her office. Pictures are attached from that event. The meeting was adjourned, but many members who sit on the Purple Star Review Committee stayed to consider a Purple Star District application from the Leavenworth District. The application was approved and forwarded to the Kansas State Board of Education (KSBE) for Final Action.

The KSBE recognized Leavenworth's Purple Star award at the April meeting. The Superintendent and School Liaison Officer presented information on their district's efforts to help military students and smooth the school transitions of military families. Pictures from the KSBE meeting of Leavenworth's presentation are attached as well.

Another focus of the KMCEC team this year was to increase the number of Purple Star Schools in Kansas. To meet this goal the Council discussed how to inform districts across Kansas of the Purple Star movement. To that end, current Purple Star Superintendents presented information to the statewide Council of Superintendents at their March meeting in Topeka.

This short presentation was to raise awareness about the challenges facing military children and introduce the concepts of Purple Star Schools. Additional plans have been made for a more thorough presentation in the fall that is several months prior to the application deadline. Due to these efforts and those in the future, the team hopes to see more applications and additional help for military-connected students in the future.



#### Activities of the State Council

#### MIC3 Annual Conference (November 7-9, 2023)

Commissioner Bullard attended the 2023 MIC3 Annual Business Meeting (ABM) held in November in Richmond, Virginia. He was joined there by Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer Laquivia Garrett. Keynote speakers included Dr. Lisa Coons, State Superintendent of Education, and retired Army Major General Craig Crenshaw, Secretary of Veterans and Defense Affairs who underscored the importance of taking care of our military servicemen, women, and their families. Business items included business reports, briefs from the U.S. Departments of Defense and Education, and Blue Star Families was approved as an advisory member. Military school district superintendents from Kansas and New Jersey spoke to the challenges students encounter in a post-pandemic environment, and how their schools provide innovative mental health and academic support. A panel highlighted Project SEARCH, which connects high school students with intellectual and developmental disabilities to internships and on-the-job training at Naval Air Station (NAS) Oceana in Virginia Beach. Newly elected officers include Louisiana Commissioner Ernise Singleton as chair after serving two terms as vice chair; Minnesota Commissioner, Daron Korte, as vice chair; and Washington Commissioner, Greg Lynch, as treasurer. The Executive Committee also includes Connecticut Commissioner, Laura Anastasio, as past chair and one nonvoting member, Dianna Ganote, from the Office of the Secretary of Defense, Military Community and Family Policy Office of Children, Youth and Families.

#### State Council Annual Meeting (January 30, 2024; virtual)

The State Council conducted its annual meeting on January 30, 2024 through Zoom video teleconference. In Kentucky, per direction of the governor, the executive director of the Kentucky Commission on Military Affairs serves as the state commissioner for this national program, with a Kentucky Department of Education representative. Commissioner Bullard was appointed by the Governor on August 20, 2019 to serve as the state commissioner. The Kentucky MIC3 State Council was created by the Kentucky General Assembly during their 2008 session, through Senate Bill 68, sponsored by the late Senator Tom Buford.

There was 100 percent attendance by state commission members, including State Sen. Mike Wilson and State Rep. Myron Dossett and representatives from national MIC3, KDE, Fort Campbell and Fort Knox. Commissioner Bullard said Kentucky submitted our 2023 MIC3 Annual Report on June 30, 2023 and paid our annual dues on May 11, 2023. The MIC3 year runs July through June annually and dues payments are due by September 30. They are paid through the Department of Military Affairs, as KCMA has no budget function. This year's amount was \$10,355.00, based on K-12 dependents of military personnel assigned. Bullard submitted his mandatory annual Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest forms for 2024 at the ABM in November 2023. Commissioner Bullard said that MIC3, which ensures smooth transfer to new school districts, is very effective here in Kentucky. We have a great partnership with Kentucky Department of Education and our DODEA school liaisons at Fort Knox and Fort Campbell. All elements continue to go well, he briefed. Our MIC3 State Council membership is full, and cases are at a minimum, with one case thus far this current fiscal year. That case involved a Fort Campbell High School Senior who did not receive credit for French language course taken in New York State. It was successfully (and rapidly) resolved through Ms. Garrett, the Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer. No further issues are anticipated.

Commissioner Bullard said we have omnibus military legislation filed by State Rep. Steve Bratcher, House Bill 200, which includes the MIC3 Compact Statute Correction for KRS 156.730 and the addition of the National Guard and Reserve to the protections of KRS 156.735. He expects it to pass easily. Last year this same legislation passed the Kentucky House unanimously and Senate committee unanimously; however, it got caught up in a logjam of bills at the end of the session and time ran out before it could receive a floor vote in the Senate. He said he has been assured by leadership that will not happen again this year. HB 200 was approved by the House Veterans, Military Affairs and Public Protection Committee this morning (and later in the week passed the House by a 91-0 vote).

National MIC3 Training and Operations Associate Lindsey Dablow presented an overview of current national MIC3 programs and reviewed the 2023 Annual Business Meeting (ABM) held in November in Richmond, Virginia.

Commissioner Bullard noted they are working with the Christian County Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Committee to publicize in the counties around Fort Campbell the availability in Kentucky of the new Military Child Care in Your Neighborhood-PLUS (MCCYN-PLUS) program, adopted last January. Child care providers must be certified through the Cabinet for Health and Family Services in order to qualify for the monthly stipend of up to \$1,500 for the children of military service members.

Commissioner Bullard briefed the just released Penn State University's Department of Defense funded study on State Support for Military Connected Children. Kentucky fared quite well, Bullard said, with minor shortfalls in Advance Enrollment (as were the majority of states). The Kentucky General Assembly passed Advance Enrollment legislation for military children in 2019, sponsored by Rep. Chris Freeland, passing unanimously through the legislature. Where the Penn State study rated Kentucky "Red" is that the enrollment requirements established in Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 159.075 did not include two elements:

- A specification that orders may be used to establish residency for enrollment, and
- A specification that families do not need to appear in person to enroll.

The statute does specify the following requirements:

- Residence in a temporary on-post billeting facility,
- Residence in a purchased or leased home or apartment,
- Residence in any federal government housing or off-post military housing, including off-post military housing that may be provided through a public-private venture.

Commissioner Bullard said Rep. Freeland is interested in sponsoring legislation to fix these two areas, and said he had reached to inform the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) of the need. In the discussion that followed, state council member Brian Perry of the Department of Education said they have assessed this potential legislation and stressed that KDE already voluntarily complies with both of the unspecified areas. Perry said they are not opposed to legislation; however, it's technically not necessary. Bullard said it's still a good idea to amend the law so that DOD has visibility on Kentucky's action. They are able to easily assess law, he noted; however, it's far more challenging to track internal processes. The council agreed with that assessment and supported the legislation, with both Sen. Wilson and Rep. Dossett noting this is a good way ahead. Commissioner Bullard said we are working through Rep. Chris Fugate to file Kentucky Purple Star Schools enabling legislation (later filed as HB 469). The official Kentucky Purple Star Schools website is at https://www.facebook.com/KYPurpleStarAward. Bullard also noted that Kentucky First Lady Britainy Beshear plans to visit Fort Knox schools on April 19 for Purple Up! Day.

(NOTE: Shortly after the meeting, Commissioner Bullard met with Rep. Freeland, who then introduced House Bill 471 to meet this goal.)

#### **State Training Activities**

On November 17, 2023, Commissioner Bullard traveled to Fort Campbell to meet with new Fort Campbell Garrison Commander, Colonel Christopher Midberry and brief him on KCMA and MIC3 activities and working relationships. Commissioner Bullard invited Deanna McLaughlin, the MIC3 Commissioner for Tennessee, to join him for the briefing to share our roles in supporting military families and children.

Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer Laquvia Garrett hosted U.S. Army staff training on the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) at Fort Campbell on February 8. Kentucky MIC3 and national MIC3 provided the training materials and vision while the training itself was internally conducted by our close partners, the Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer team.

In January 2024, Kentucky MIC3 shared "Kentucky Education Trends and Practices for Military Youth" information with the Department of Defense Education Authority (DODEA) through Fort Knox.

Commissioner Bullard participated in the annual Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) leadership retreat (at MIC3 expense) in his roles as Executive Committee member and National Compliance Chair on April 16-18 in Lexington, Kentucky. Discussions included strategic planning and support to Department of Defense, federal agencies and state governors/education agencies.

On September 19, 2023, Commissioner Bullard, in his role as national MIC3 Compliance Chair and Kentucky State MIC3 Commissioner, presented virtually to The Council of State Governments' (CSG) Commission on Military and Veterans Affairs Education Matters Panel on the following areas:

- Compact overview
- Compact statute legal parameters
- Best practices
- Compact Commissioner and School Liaison roles in supporting military children

As side note, CSG noted that Kentucky is one of the nation's leaders in military spouse-priority interstate occupational licensing compact adoption.

#### **Additional Duties**

Commissioner Bullard continues to serve as national Compliance Committee chair, which also places him on the national MIC3 Executive Committee. He was appointed to this role in January 2022. The Compliance Committee meets bi-monthly and the Executive Committee meets quarterly. His activities include ensuring compliance by all member states and their appointed commissioners; working with state commissioners, as required, to assist them in resolving MIC3 cases; and submitting a yearly Compliance Committee Annual Report. This year his committee created and published a new state compliance tracking wheel graphic for use by state commissioners and the public.

#### Supporting Legislation

Kentucky's military community had an outstanding state legislative session in 2024, featuring House Bill (HB) 200, which fixed a technical error (common to all states due to citation error in initial implementation) in the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) statute (KRS 156.730) and added the National Guard and Reserve to state MIC3 protection (KRS 176.735). In addition, HB 200 recognized the new U.S. Space Force and created a Space Force license plate, created a Legion of Merit medal license plate, and corrected the name of the Army Reserve Aviation Command at Fort Knox in our KCMA statute.

Additionally, the following military/veterans related bills passed this session:

- HB 56 KCMA and DOD priority Social Work Occupational Licensing Compact membership
- HB 397 Support for military personnel and spouses in occupational licensing
- HB 453 DOD priority Child Abuse case reporting to military installations
- HB 471 Support for Advance Enrollment of military connected students
- HB 469 Kentucky Purple Star Schools enabling legislation
- HB 715 Military Family Assistance Trust Fund benefits expansion

#### Month of the Military Child

At our invitation, First Lady Britainy Beshear visited Fort Knox DODEA schools on April 19, 2024 to promote the Month of the Military Child, meet installation leaders, and promote military family readiness. We joined with Kentucky Purple Star Schools to induct 22 new schools into the program in April, bringing the total number statewide to 93. We continue to utilize the outstanding videos filmed by the Governor and First Lady in 2021 and 2022 highlighting the Month of the Military Child, and issued a Governor's proclamation honoring April's Month of the Military Child on April 15, 2024.

#### Annual State Dues Assessment

Kentucky received its Fiscal Year 2025 dues assessment for membership in the MIC3 on May 1, 2024, in the amount of \$10,355.00, invoice number FY24-001KY, and submitted it for payment, per Governor-directed memo, to the Kentucky Department of Military Affairs. The current dues formula for FY25 is outlined in the Compact Rules, Chapter 200, Sec. 2.103 (http://www.mic3.net/assets/rules-book-edits-20190905.pdf). Payments are due by September 30, 2024. Payment in full was immediately processed by the Department of Military Affairs and was received by MIC3 on May 14, 2024.

#### Administrative Requirements

Commissioner Bullard completed and submitted to MIC3 his mandatory Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest statements at the MIC3 Annual Business Meeting in November 2023. All Kentucky administrative

requirements for the fiscal year are complete with the filing of this year's Annual Report effective June 30, 2024.

#### FY23 Kentucky MIC3 Cases (three)

- Successfully worked with the Fort Knox School Liaison Officer to resolve a MIC3 case of a military student (high school junior) transferring with her family to Fort Knox from Hawaii and asking for a waiver for a locally required Human Geography freshman-level course
  - Meade County Schools, after an initial "no," granted the requested credit to the student in April 2024
- Successfully worked with the Fort Knox School Liaison Officer to handle the MIC3 case of a military student (high school junior) transferring with her family to Fort Knox from Hawaii and asking for a waiver for a locally required Human Geography freshman-level course
  - Waiver granted in April 2024
- Successfully worked with the Fort Campbell School Liaison Officer to resolve a Fort Campbell-related MIC3 issue in January 2024
  - Local school initially denied credit for French language class to student whose Army family transferred to Fort Campbell from New York State
    - Would have prevented his ability to graduate on time this Spring

#### Military Student Identifier Update

As part of Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requirements, the U.S. Department of Education requires school districts to identify students who are armed forces family members. This information is a voluntary submission by parents and guardians. Kentucky's Student Information System (KSIS) includes a "Military Connections" tab to track guardian data for those who are active duty military personnel. A student is considered military connected if a parent or guardian is a member of the armed forces on active duty or serves on full-time National Guard duty. KDE continues to promote the importance of this data collection to public schools and districts.

Dear Governor Moore, President Ferguson, and Speaker Jones:

Pursuant to §7-1303 of the Education Article (MSAR #7598) and Executive Order 01.01.2010.09 (MSAR #8880), the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) shall report annually to the Governor, the Maryland General Assembly, Judiciary, and State Council of the member states concerning the activities of the Interstate Commission on Educational Opportunity for Military Children during the preceding year. Such reports shall also include any recommendations that may have been adopted by the Interstate Commission. Maryland adopted the Compact in 2009 when the Maryland General Assembly added the Compact provisions to the Maryland Code.

The Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3) is the national organization leading the work on educational opportunities for military children. MIC3 is proud that all 50 states and the District of Columbia are members of the Interstate Compact. The Interstate Compact ensures the uniform treatment of military children transferring between states. It was developed by the Council of State Governments' National Center for Interstate Compacts, the U.S. Department of Defense, national associations, federal and state officials, the Department of Education of each State, school administrators, and military families.

Military children face many challenges as the military family transfers from one assignment to the next. The average military student faces transition more than twice during high school and most military children will attend six to nine different schools from kindergarten to 12th grade. The Compact seeks to make the transition easier for children of military families to ensure that they are afforded the same opportunities for educational success as other children and are not penalized or delayed in achieving their educational goals.

Maryland was represented at the Annual Business Meeting and the Executive Committee Meetings by Mary L. Gable, Assistant State Superintendent, Division of Student Support, Academic Enrichment, and Educational Policy, Maryland State Department of Education. Ms. Gable is the Maryland State Commissioner and the Chairperson of the MIC3 Rules Committee. As Commissioner, Ms. Gable annually shares information on the Interstate Compact with the Directors of Student Services, Coordinators of School Counselors across the 24 local education agencies (LEAs), and other groups. Ms. Gable assists families and the LEAs when there are challenges in a student's transition.

Dr. Cheryl Dyson, Superintendent, Frederick County Public Schools, represented the Public School Superintendents Association of Maryland (PSSAM) at the State Council on June 8, 2023, and plans to share the information on the Compact with all local Superintendents.

Also attached are copies of the agenda and minutes of the June 8, 2023, meeting of Maryland's State Council for the Interstate Compact. Each state must have a State Council that meets annually.

The Interstate Compact operates under rules that were adopted by the Compact and each state. In order to make these rules available, a Compact Rules Desk Reference is available for each Commissioner. The Compact Rules document was thoroughly reviewed and updated as needed by the MIC3 Rules Committee and presented at the Annual Business Meeting in October, 2022.

The Chairperson of the Commission continues to communicate through a monthly newsletter with each State Commissioner and Ex-Officio member of MIC3. A question considered by every State Council this year was the addition to the Compact of National Guard and reserve dependents beyond those under Title 10 active-duty status. Also discussed was a technical correction needed for every state's Compact language. The need for the technical correction is being discussed by every State Council.

As a member of the Compact, Maryland's dues for FY 2023 were \$22,609 based on 19,660 military students.

This year was another challenging year for the State Council and the NM Public Education Department to interact. I had 2 different contacts that were acting as the Military Family Education Liaison which made communication and planning difficult.

One of the greatest challenges this year has been procuring the payment of our MIC3 annual dues. The national office staff sent 3 notices to the Public Education Department for payment. #### **Meeting Schedule:**

- a. The New York State Council met for the school year 2023/2024 on October 18, 2023, and on April 3, 2024. The meetings were held at the New York State Museum, Cultural Education Center, 222 Madison Avenue, Albany, NY. Meetings are open to the public in compliance with open meeting law. Agendas and Minutes are posted on the MIC-3 website <a href="https://mic3.net">https://mic3.net</a>.
- b. A calendar for the 2024-2025 New York State Interstate Compact Meetings has been established.

#### **Notable Activities:**

- a. April as the Month of the Military Child was highlighted on the NYSED website. School district personnel received access to information and resources thanks to the work of the NYSED Office of Curriculum and Instruction. The New York State Education Department highlighted local *Month of the Military Child* and *Purple Up! Day* celebrations by including stories and *Purple Up!* celebrations on the <u>Month of</u> <u>the Military Child webpage</u>. Melissa Montague, who is an active member, led this work. A thank you is in order to Dr. Betty A. Rosa, Commissioner of Education who supported this effort in our state. Her support, on behalf of military children, is exceptional.
- b. The NYS Veterans' Division has offered events for families throughout the state. These opportunities are shared through the NYS MIC-3 website and their partners. Governor Hochul was instrumental in supporting Military Child Events.
- c. The NYS Compact website remains a working document. New updates were posted in the content and the Q/A section. Military student "stories" continue to be posted on the NYS Compact website.
- d. Dr. Debra Jackson, in her role as NYS Compact Commissioner, serves on the MIC-3 Finance committee, the MIC-3 Leadership committee as vice chair, and as facilitator of the MIC-3 Tier 2 meetings. She also serves as a mentor to new commissioners, presented the work of NYS at the 2023 ABM and worked with the MIC3 leadership to create a training video for commissioners in 2024. Additionally, she presented to the Ohio Council to share the activities of the NYS Council.
- e. Dr. Jackson received, a Department of Defense Certificate of Appreciation, issued by the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, received September 2023.

- f. The Governor's Office of Appointments new appointee, Sonia Draught, Chief Specialist Plans, Analysis & Integration, US Army Garrison Fort Drum attended her first meeting. The Draught appointment was signed in October 2023 by Governor Hochul. The Governor's appointment office has a candidate under consideration "a representative appointed by the governor". The council is awaiting finalization of this appointment.
- g. Senator Andrea Stewart-Cousins' office acknowledged the resignation of appointee, Melissa Pandolf and indicated a new appointee will be forthcoming.
- h. The West Point Garrison Commander is designated as the DoD Mil Rep for New York. This is a "by position" appointment and as such it will continue to be filled by the current Garrison Commander. COL Anthony Bianchi, Commander, Former US Army Garrison, West Point, United States Army stepped down from his position. The new Army Garrison Commander, Col. Travis E. Robison, was noted as his replacement at the April meeting and will be contacted for follow-up.
- i. The Council welcomed two newly appointed SLOs, Carin Mogavero from West Point who replaced Michi Carl and Robin Banks from Fort Drum who is working with Wendy O'Sullivan.
- j. Kyle Fairbairn, Executive Director of MISA, initiated a request to partner with NYS. Troy will lead this effort and arrange for a statewide meeting in the fall of 2024.
- k. Student placement/graduation requirements/enrollment matters continue to be resolved on a case-by-case examination. Resolutions are reviewed at the meetings as an after-action conversation. Between meetings, emails and phone conversations assist with student transitions as families enter and exit New York State public schools. This year three students who moved senior year were granted NYS diplomas to facilitate an on-time graduation. Two of these students transferred overseas to a DODeA school in Germany and Italy respectfully.
- I. Of continuing note, (as some districts cite local control) the State Council is exploring options to create new regulations regarding end-of-course completion when a student exits prior to the Regents exam yet the student completes the course work. Practices currently vary statewide. This topic is under study as it affects military students who transfer in late May or early June and need course credit in their receiving high school.
- m. Also of note are the difficulties in receiving end-of-course sign offs from out of state high schools for transfer students. The current "Attestation Letter Template" is more rigid than the Compact language, therefore the Council members are working to amend the current template, opening it up to reflect alternative measures of proficiency/mastery.

- n. Graduation Requirements: The Office of Bilingual Education and World Languages approved additional Pathway Assessments in World Languages which more than doubled the number of languages students can use to fulfill the +1 pathway requirement. This will support our military transfer students.
- The Council members discussed the June 2023 report created in collaboration with the United States Department of Defense (DoD) Defense-State Liaison Office (DSLO) and the Clearinghouse for Military Family Readiness at Penn State (Clearinghouse). We reviewed the NYS components noted in the report. We also recognized the ease to find our website information which the report indicated was not easily found.
- p. NYS Dues to the national organization have been paid in full and payments have been timely.
- q. Voting members appointed to the council are updated in JCOPE as New York State policymakers. NYS is changing the ethics training reporting. Mandatory ethics training was expanded to include live and online ethics training for all State officers and employees. The Agency Contact is required to submit monthly ethics training statistics by person, for State Council of the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children.

## <u> 2024 Annual Report – State of Ohio MIC3</u>

The 2023-2024 academic year for the MIC3 Team Ohio EDU-MIL was dedicated to the mission of direct continuous support of Ohio's 30,000 military-connected students. The team is all-volunteer and is united in promoting the Purple Star School initiative, started in Ohio, to ease the transition of Ohio's PreK-12 military-connected students. To further the mission, the <u>Thomas D. Rutan Military Interstate Children's Compact State Council</u> conducted its three state-constituted meetings of business and training on-site at three Purple Star Schools.

The Rutan MIC3 State Council convened in-person and virtually for all meetings, beginning with the back-to-school session on 4 August 2023 at Hilliard Davidson High School in Franklin County (\*Ohio Army and Air National Guard Command Headquarters, Navy Operational Support Center, Defense Supply Center Columbus, and 4th Marine Corps District). The Rutan MIC3 State Council next met for its fall, session on 12 December 2023 at Bellville Elementary School in Richland County (\*179th Cyberspace Wing). At this meeting, the Pledge of Allegiance was led by the Purple Star Students. The spring Rutan MIC3 State Council met for its Month of the Military Child session on 20 March 2024 at Anthony Wayne Junior High School in Lucas County (\*180th Fighter Wing). At this meeting, Tammy Puff (Office of the Governor & US Army Veteran) presented the "Purple Star Generals" with the Proclamation that Ohio will recognize April as the Month of the Military Child.







A multi-tiered system of support begins with Team Ohio's exceptional counseling and guidance mission. Leading Purple Star School liaisons and educators are adding colleagues across various professions to their school building's team for Ohio's "MIL Kids" and their families. Ohio <u>Governor Mike DeWine's initiative, OhioCares</u>, is designed to connect military personnel, Veterans, and their families to behavioral health services. Led by the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (ODMHAS), this program aims to improve access to timely and appropriate community services to military-connected families and to promote awareness about behavioral health issues related to the military.

OhioCares brings together the service-member and veteran, their family, and the education, health, and workforce professionals needed to care for these hero citizens. A working subcommittee of OhioCares gathered over the winter months to formally define military-connected youth and it was adopted on Ohio's Statehood Day on March 1 of 2024:

"Ohio was the first home of the Purple Star (Military) child, family, educator, school, and community. We recognize the ranks of the Armed Forces in Active Duty, Reserve Duty, and National Guard Uniform. We include the status of the veteran's family, and siblings attached to service in the Armed Forces. We honor the affiliated civilians, contractors, educators to the bases and installations of the Armed Forces."



The Definition continues, "Each and every Ohio community has committed educators, resources, stakeholders, veterans, and support for those who serve the United States of America – and those within the dedicated mission. The Military (Purple Star) child is connected to all which comprises a community, culture & environment. This child is challenged, equal, resilient, and like no other...Ohio will support each and every one."

This collaborative effort is the direct result of Governor DeWine and many Ohio militaryconnected students from Purple Star Schools in collaboration with the Task Force. Much appreciation to the Rutan MIC3 State Council Members and friends who comprised this Task Force; Adreana Tartt (ODMHAS & US Marine Veteran), Tammy Puff (Office of the Governor & US Army Veteran), Jenn Davis (Educator for the nation's first Purple Star Preschool & <u>National</u> <u>Convening of Purple Star Communities</u> Coordinator), Cristi Fields (Principal for the largest enrolled PreK-12 School in State of Ohio & the Beverly Gardens School was a Member of the Inaugural Class of Purple Star Schools), Trina Pauley (US Air Force School Liaison Officer), Courtney Tyree (US Army Battalion Education Services Specialist), Wanda Ortiz Thayne (Community Services Member), Chris Mackey (Non-profit Services Member), Melissa Walters (County Services Member), Chip Merkle (Ohio Army and Air National Guard & Retired Educator), Jason Scragg (Ohio Department of Education & US Marine Veteran), and Pete LuPiba (State of Ohio MIC3 & US Navy Veteran).





In the early spring of 2020, Team Ohio had been hard at work to plan its first ever Purple Star Schools Summit to take place that summer; however, the global pandemic put an end to that plan. Finally, four years in the making and the Purple Star Schools Summit was held at Big Walnut High School in central Ohio on June 20, 2024. The Summit was attended by 129 Purple Star School Liaisons and educators from Lake Erie to the Ohio River. This PreK-12 day to support military-connected students and their families was planned and presided over by Koby Donohue of Big Walnut, Amanda Sears of Amherst, Gene Stanford of Connections Academy, Trina Pauley of Wright-Patterson, Tammy Puff of the Office of the Governor, Jenn Davis of Studebaker Preschool, <u>Chris Picha of Veterans Services</u>, Ashley Twedt of Bellville Elementary, Dr. Michelle Lewis of Olentangy Hyatts Middle School, Dr. Monica Myers of Jackson Local Schools, and students Ethan Kasler and Sydney Buckler from Jackson High School (Program Design and Layout) and led by Co-Coordinators Chair Chip Merkle of Ohio MIC3 and Principal Kim Castiglione of Big Walnut's Prairie Run Elementary School.





Team Ohio offered both regional and virtual professional development through Roundtables, Town Halls, and Webinars held throughout the academic year. A virtual Roundtable was held on 2 August 2023. The northeastern Ohio Roundtable was held on 8 August 2023 at Massillon Washington High School. The southern Ohio Roundtable was held on 10 August 2023 at Mad River Local Schools, which included a tour of the United States Air Force Museum. These Roundtables provided opportunities for educators and liaisons to meet, network, and learn about best practices in servicing military-connected youth. Three webinar sessions focusing on military-connected students took place in March 2024. The first on March 6<sup>th</sup> dealt with student identification, the second on March 13<sup>th</sup> centered on student support through the SLO, and the third on March 19<sup>th</sup> aimed at <u>becoming a Purple Star School</u>.





The 2nd National Convening of Purple Star was hosted virtually on National Day of the Deployed (26 October 2023) thanks to the direct support of Collegiate Purple Star's Ashland University in northeast Ohio. The nation's all volunteer planning committee consisted of six Ohioans – Courtney Kessler (Ashland), Jenn Davis (Huber Heights), Ashley Twedt (Clear Fork Valley), <u>Trina Pauley (Wright-Patterson)</u>, Chad Wyen (Mad River), and Pete LuPiba (Council Chair). 16 of the 22 Breakout Sessions were led by Ohio educators and veterans. Thanks to the wonderful partnership of the Purple Star USA: National Convening of Schools and Communities planning committee, Ohio was able to assist in the <u>application process for the</u> <u>Pete Taylor Partnership</u> of Excellence Award. The team has shared with the submission committee the sacred and shared mission of Purple Star Schools, and how the collaboration of 14 States is supported by the National Convening.

The Annual Business Meeting of the National MIC3 convened in Richmond, Virginia on 8-9 November. The 2023 Ohio Delegation was comprised of Trina Pauley, Ashley Twedt, Michelle Lewis, Jenn Davis, Jason Scragg, and Pete LuPiba. The <u>Tier 2 Session (\*Ohio is a Member)</u> was led by New York MIC3 State Commissioner Debra Jackson, who appointed Ohio's Studebaker Purple Star School Liaison Jenn Davis as scribe. Discussion topics included credits, placements, and transcripts.






#### The 2024 State of Ohio MIC3 Annual Report Ohio MIC3 Commissioner Pete LuPiba



The annual MIC3 Janet Wynn Memorial Award (JWMA) honors an Ohio military family or school-aged youth that has demonstrated exceptional perseverance, grit and determination. In its fourth year, this award honors the memory of WPAFB School Liaison Janet Wynn of Oklahoma, Texas and Ohio. The JWMA MIC3 committee members are friends and colleagues of Mrs. Wynn: Captain Jason Durell (U.S. Army Reserve), Michelle Lewis (Olentangy Hyatts Middle School), Ashley Twedt (Bellville Elementary School), and Chad Wyen (Mad River Local Schools). The honoree for the 2023 Janet Wynn Memorial Award was graduating senior Reagan Jones from Southeastern High School.











April is Month of the Military Child and Ohio celebrated with Military Family Spirit Week celebrating National Purple Up for Military Kids on April 15. In the spirit of the month, the <u>Department of Education and Workforce</u> proudly announced the Purple Star Class of 2024 which included 171 schools that earned the Purple Star designation, an award that is valid for three years. The Purple Star movement has moved beyond Ohio's borders to include 44 other states! Purple Star Schools shows a significant commitment to serving students and families connected to America's Armed Forces. <u>97 schools earned their inaugural Purple Star Award and 74 schools renewed</u> their designation.

New MIC3 Council Members Shatila Smith of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base and Brooke Woods of the <u>Military Veterans Education Program</u> were on boarded by colleagues and Ohio MIC3 Council Officers during late autumn of the school year.







Several state-wide professional educators' associations hosted briefings and training on Ohio's MIC3. These organizations included the Ohio School Counselor Association, the Buckeye Association of School Administrators and the Ohio School Boards Association.





The conclusion of Ohio's first MIC3 Strategic Plan resulted in the logical next step, a new task force charged with moving the Council forward. This new group formulated a plan during the fall and winter months, which the Council discussed and approved. Much appreciation to the authors of this three-year plan including <u>Hayley Young (179th Cyberspace Wing)</u>, Matt Cox (Big Walnut Middle School), Julie Gray (Kent City District) and the group's chair, Chad Marzec (West Point's Class of 2006, Liberty-Benton High School).

The Rutan MIC3 State Council members' leadership extends beyond the classroom to include community events that support military-connected youth and families. In honor of back-toschool in September, Blue Star Families of Dayton and Southwestern Ohio celebrated Welcome Week with MIC 3 council members, Pete LuPiba (Council Chair), Trina Pauley (School Liaison WPAFB), and Jenn Davis (Huber Heights) in attendance on behalf of the Honorable Mike DeWine. In January the Council welcomed the 4th U.S. Marine Corps District Command to Columbus. This move involved the leadership of more than ten states that relocated from Harrisburg, Pennsylvania to central Ohio. MIC3 members traveled to the suburbs of Dayton to attend Vandalia Butler High School's Memorial Day Program. The Governor's Wreath-laying Ceremony at the Statehouse in Columbus included Purple Star students from Olentangy Liberty Middle School, Bob Dadey from Vandalia Butler High School and MIC3 council members.



The Ohio MIC3 in partnership with the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce is proud to have initiated <u>Ohio's Military Signing Day</u>. This year the 8<sup>th</sup> annual event was held at the



National Veterans Memorial and Museum in Columbus on 12 March 2024. Ohio's Military Signing Day honors students in grades 11 and 12 who have committed to military service upon graduation. Their service includes the service academies, ROTC scholarship, or enlisted in active duty, Reserve, or National Guard. Local districts are encouraged to host signing events in their districts as well.



Rutan MIC3 Council members collaborated with the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce and the <u>Purple Star Advisory Board</u> to create a new professional development course entitled Military Children in Ohio's Schools. It is available to all Ohio educators interested in



becoming a part of the Purple Star program. This course aims to prepare educators about the challenges faced by military-connected youth and introduces educators to the MIC3 Compact.

## Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission PENNSYLVANIA



#### **OVERVIEW**

The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children was developed jointly by The Council of State Government's National Center for Interstate Compacts and the Department of Defense, with input from policy experts, and stakeholders from 18 different organizations and national associations, including representatives of parents, teachers, school administrators, military families, and federal, state, and local officials. The Interstate Compact eases education transition issues faced by the children of active duty service members transferring between school districts and states. Most military children will attend six to nine different school systems during their education from kindergarten to 12<sup>th</sup> grade. The Compact allows for uniform treatment of military children when dealing with issues of enrollment, eligibility, placement, and graduation when transferring schools.

Initial discussions about the Compact began in 2006 and drafting of the Compact began early in 2007. The Compact was first available for legislative consideration in 2008. The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children was adopted by all 50 states and the District of Columbia in just six legislative sessions.

#### HISTORY

Pennsylvania adopted the Interstate Compact, placing it in statute in February 2012. The language of the Interstate Compact adopted was almost verbatim. The dues are paid by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

#### STATE COUNCIL MEETINGS

The last meeting was held on April 4, 2024. The Purple Star School designees were invited to attend and report out on the school district's accomplishments centered around military connected students. Pennsylvania welcomed new members to the Council this year. The new members represent the Governor's Branch Appointee, Military Impacted School District Appointee, and the transition of the Minority Leader of the House Appointee to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate Appointee.

**ACCOMPLISHMENTS**: Pennsylvania honored our 2024 inaugural class of Purple Star School designees at a state conference in Hershey. There were six designees representing school districts, private/non-public schools, and charter schools. The Commissioner responded to several requests from military families and students with the assistance of Pennsylvania's School Liaisons, who worked directly with school districts and families. Pennsylvania also worked in collaboration with other states for transferring students. Requests for assistance were resolved by the Department of Education contacting key stakeholders to explain the Compact Rules. Pennsylvania's Commissioner continues to reach out to military contacts across the state, support School Liaisons, military families and students transitioning to, and from, Pennsylvania.

#### MONTH OF THE MILITARY CHILD

#### Purpose

The purpose of the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (S.C. Code Ann. § 59-46-40) is to remove barriers to educational success imposed on children of military families because of frequent moves and deployment of their parents by:

- A. Facilitating the timely enrollment of children of military families and ensuring that they are not placed at a disadvantage due to difficulty in the transfer of education records from the previous school districts or variations in entrance/age requirements.
- B. Facilitating the student placement process through which children of military families are not disadvantaged by variations in attendance requirements, scheduling, sequencing, grading, course content, or assessment.
- C. Facilitating the qualification and eligibility for enrollment, educational programs, and participation in extracurricular academic, athletic, and social activities. D. Facilitating the on-time graduation of children of military families.
- E. Providing for the promulgation and enforcement of administrative rules implementing the provisions of this compact.
- F. Providing for the uniform collection and sharing of information between and among member states, schools, and military families under this compact.
- G. Promoting coordination between this compact and other compacts affecting military children.
- H. Promoting flexibility and cooperation between the educational system, parents, and the student in order to achieve educational success for the student.

#### **SC MIC3 Council Summary**

- South Carolina State Council Meetings was held June 20, 2024. This meeting was held virtually due to the transition of the SC Dept. of Education to a new location.
- The purpose was to inform council members of possible courses of actions for input/vote by the commissioner, and bring awareness to members on the business of the commission, as well as discuss the council's plan to develop a training and awareness campaign for SC. The goal is to increase the awareness of the compact throughout the state of SC. The goal also includes providing compact trainings near/on military installations for the military connected community and schools/districts.
- During the June 2, 2024 meeting, Dr. Priester provided updates to the council members from the MIC3 Annual Business meeting held in November 2023 in Alexandria VA. Dr. Priester also provided an update on the social and academic supports being provided to military families in collaboration with district military liaisons. Dr. Priester announced that currently SC has 13 Purple Star designated districts, and 2 public charter schools. It is understood that Purple Star is not an entity of MIC3 on the national level, SC utilizes the training of the compact as a requirement for becoming a Purple Star designated district in SC.
- The South Carolina Department of Education sponsored the 2024 Military Honor Cord Ceremony for high school seniors who had enlisted into the uniformed services. The ceremony was held in-person on May 14, 2024 at the Koger Center for the Arts. Students were provided red, white, and blue military cords to wear during their respective high school graduation ceremonies.
- On March 26, 2024 Governor Henry McMaster proclaimed April as South Carolina's Month of the Military, Child. After the proclamation, Dr. Kim Priester identified a total of 13 Purple Star districts in South Carolina: Charleston County School District, Berkeley County School District, Beaufort County School District, Richland County School District One, Edgefield County School District, Richland County School District 2, Anderson 1 School District, Sumter County School District, Aiken County Public School District, and Kershaw County School District, and Dorchester County School District 2, Horry County, and Lexington School District 1.
- Dr. Priester then provided an overview and 2023-24 updates of Veterans Affairs Education Benefits for veteran survivors and informed the Council that the SC Commission on Higher Education was notified about requests for assistance from students from military families who were planning to attend college. To assist families further, the Council agreed that a presentation related to educational benefits and resources available for students from military families should be developed in collaboration with the Veterans Affairs Education Department.
- Various council members, district military liaisons, military school officers, military families and students, and other individuals participated in Month of the Military Child and Purple UP Day celebrations. Each district designated a day for Purple UP Day, during which several appreciation activities were held for students and families.

- Dr. Priester is the state contact for districts seeking information and training on how to achieve the Purple Star designation.
- Dr. Priester, in collaboration with the base installation student liaison officers and district military liaisons, and MIC3 national team will be planning fall and spring trainings for 101 and 201 sessions on installations for soldiers and military families.
- SC council will be working to create a state MIC3 brochure for use along with the information the national MIC3 office provides.

#### Areas of Focus for the State Council

- Continue to increase awareness of SC's newly passed and signed bill H3797 Military Temporary Enrollment <u>https://scdva.sc.gov/news/2023-06/military-families-now-benefitting-remoteschool-enrollment-law-signed-governor</u>
- Increase the awareness of the military compact through providing on-going trainings on the compact rules for the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in collaboration with district military liaisons/school officers. The purpose of the continuous training is to ensure that policies related to transitioning military students in the state's public school system are clearly understood and implemented effectively in all school districts statewide. The goal is to host training sessions near/on military installations in collaboration with student liaison officers and military liaisons.
- Raise awareness of the Month of the Military Child proclamation and *Purple Up Day* in districts and schools statewide.
- Continue to increase the designation of Purple Star programs in district statewide for the purpose of increasing and highlighting military connectedness and support for military student and families in South Carolina.

### Arnold Air Force Base in Tullahoma, TN

In the events leading up to the United States entering World War II, Arnold Air Force Base was born. During this time and after the war, troops and citizens began coming in and sparking the growth of Tullahoma, Tennessee, where it is located. The Arnold Engineering Development Center (AEDC) calls the Air Force bases in Tennessee home and is involved in most aerospace programs in America. Two additional tenants include centers for both the Advanced Missile Signature and Naval Surface Warfare.

### **Buchanan Station U.S. Coast Guard Station**

The US Coast Guard's Buchanan Station adjacent to the Paris Landing State Park marina in Henry County, Tennessee is the home-port for both the Chippewa and the Cimarron. This is an Aids to Navigation Team station, their primary duties being to maintain buoys, navigational lights/markers, etc. along both the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers.

### Fort Campbell on the Border of Kentucky & Tennessee

Fort Campbell is a "World Class Community" and is home of the Screaming Eagles, of the 101st Airborne, 5th Group Special Forces, 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment, and Air Force Unit 19th Air Support Operations Squadron – the Army's only Air Assault Division. Fort Campbell lies on the Kentucky - Tennessee border between the towns of Hopkinsville Kentucky and Clarksville Tennessee. Clarksville, Tennessee, and Hopkinsville, Kentucky are patriotic communities. American flags flying from many poles, and yellow ribbons serve as reminders of those away defending our freedoms. As Fort Campbell Soldiers deploy and return from missions around the world, families, loved ones, and the community greet them warmly.

# Milan Army Ammunition Plant in Milan, TN

The Milan Ordnance Depot and Wolf Creek Ordnance Plant combine to create ammunition for both small and large arms, to store ammo, and to create boosters and fuses used in heavy armor weapons.



Many branches of the military use the base, as it is located in a strategic area to distribute ammunition to a wide variety of sources. Still, its primary roles are for the U.S. Army and the U.S. Department of Defense. It is somewhat of an Army base in Tennessee but with the specific mission of facilitating ammunition through government contractors.

# NSA Mid South

NSA Mid South is a Navy base in Tennessee. Its origins take us back to WWI when it was known as Park Field and was used to provide training for pilots. You'll find around 7,500 people on the base, making it one of the largest military bases in the country. It's also one of the largest single employers in the state of Tennessee. Found in Millington, Tennessee, the Naval base is north of Memphis.

Accomplishments:	In October 2023, the Council and the VDOE announced that one 110 schools across Virginia were
	honored with Purple Star Designations. To qualify for a Purple Star in Virginia, schools must have a staff point of contact (POC) for military students and families. The POC serves as the primary link between the military family and the school. In addition, schools must meet four measures that help to build awareness within the school community and foster peer transition support.
	There were 29 schools honored this year as second-time recipients of the distinction. This is the fifth year the VDOE has designated Purple Star schools. Since 2018, the VDOE and the Council have selected 569 schools across Virginia for the award of which 360 have maintained the award and 185 have been twice honored.
	The Ambassador Training held on June 21, 2023, at GMU was a tremendous success. It was attended by over 100 Fairfax County high school student ambassadors and their sponsors who took time away from their summer for the purpose of strengthening their school's peer-led support programming. The training focused on equipping the students to be better equipped to run a program aimed at welcoming new students to their school and assisting others who may be self-isolating in connecting with their peers.
	These students and their sponsors will be followed throughout the coming year to check on their progress and implementation of what was learned during the training, in addition to continued analysis of the following:
	<ul> <li>Social Emotional Learning Screener;</li> <li>Fairfax County Youth Survey;</li> <li>Youth Surveys and Focus Groups; and</li> <li>Safe and Supportive Schools Survey.</li> </ul>

Activities:

The Virginia Council held its first meeting since December 12, 2021 on October 26, 2023. This Council's diversity of experiences and expertise is well positioned to continue the good work of improving transitional support for our military families. VDOE, on behalf of the Virginia Council, has provided training on the Compact and the Virginia Council to thousands of educators, military families, and other interested stakeholders since its creation in 2009. The SLOs throughout Virginia frequently provide training on the Interstate Compact to educators in their region as well. In February 2023, The Virginia Military Student and Families Specialist and the VDOE's Department of Special Populations Office of Family Engagement held a SLO and EFMP training to review the process of dispute resolution and how to improve communication and collaboration with families of students with disabilities.

In May, the VDOE's Military Student and Families Specialist presented at the Military Families Symposium for military families with students in special education. This training was funded with grants from the VDOE and conducted by the Parent Educational Advocacy Training Center (PEATC). The in-person symposium provided attendees with an opportunity to learn more about state-level support, self-advocacy, due process, the I'm Determined program, PEATC, and Virginia Commonwealth University's (VCU) Center for Parent Involvement.

The annual Connect for Success Conference was held in September 2023 and included a presentation by the Navy Regional Mid-Atlantic's Special Education Specialist Ms. Erica Swenson, who discussed the unique challenges that military-connected students, and others who are highly mobile, often face and strategies to support them. The VDOE's Office of Special Education Family Support and Special Facilities provides this professional development opportunity to those who work in Parent Resource Centers. This opportunity helps to foster collaboration between the school divisions and military partners.

The Military Student and Families Specialist was requested to present on Purple Star programming and the Compact at three State and National level trainings. These included the following;

# Summary of accomplishments, activities and presentations from this year:

An in-person meeting was held on 1/12/2024 with a few virtual attendees via Microsoft Teams. State Commissioner Mr. Phillip Cantrell participated, providing information about the Compact at the meeting. State Superintendent of Schools, Mrs. Michele Blatt, participated voicing support for efforts to assist military-connected students. The number of Purple Star Districts rose last year from 9 to 14 and districts may also apply until the April 26<sup>th</sup> deadline. While the WVDE has annually sent either e-mail messages or held informative presentations with information about MIC3 for County Superintendents during fiscal years 2015 – 2024, this year's County Superintendents were engaged directly on the supports of MIC3 and the West Virginia Common Ground Partnership at an in-person meeting of the West Virginia Association of School Administrators in Charleston, WV on February 10, 2024.

Information about MIC3 is included on the <u>Common Ground Partnership's website</u> and has become an integral part of the group's activities. This year, the Common Ground Partnership promoted the Speaker Series, Spirit Week (including Purple Up Day), the Purple Star Award, Military Signing Week, Care Packages for Educators at Elementary Schools focused on assisting military-connected children experiencing deployments (which include a brochure for MIC3), military-based STEM programs and the ASVAB mentor request system. New Hampshire

Dear Executive Director Cherise Imai,

On behalf of New Hampshire's MIC3 State Council, I am pleased to submit the 2024 annual report documenting the activities to support students whose parents are on active duty or serving the National Guard and Reserves in the State of New Hampshire.

The NH state council remains active in their support of the Compact under Title VIII as defined in New Hampshire's Revised Statutes Annotated (RSA's).

Given the small size of the state, many folks inquire about who the council truly represents. We are honored to represent the men and women on active duty at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and residing in nearby New Hampshire towns. We are also honored to serve the United States Air Force, 64<sup>th</sup> Air Refueling Squadron which recently returned to Active Duty at Pease Air National Guard Base as well as the NH Air National Guard 157<sup>th</sup> Air Refueling Wing. Along our shore you will find the United States Coast Guard with families in many surrounding communities. Other small units, recruiting offices and individual service members of all branches are scattered about the 10 counties that make up our great state. Surprising to many, are the men and women who serve NOAA and are working at the observatory atop Mount Washington the highest peak in the Northeast at 6,288.2 feet.

The small Tier IV state of New Hampshire serves roughly 700 children of active-duty service members while also supporting thousands of students whose families serve in the NH National Guard. In the past year the NH National Guard has deployed troops from local, national and global support.

The NH MIC3 Council meets annually to address the needs of our students and families. The council includes the DOD Military Representative from the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, representatives from the Pease Air National Guard, Superintendents of Schools, NHIAA Executive Director, Special Education Administrators Executive Director, NH Department of Education, military parent and students and invited guests are often at the table to ensure a well-rounded conversation. We acknowledge that the Council has several vacancies that need to be filled in the next few months. Our Council is also supported by the School Liaison who serves as the MIC3/Education subject expert who provides boots of the ground insight and training across the state.

The Council is very aware of the "New Hampshire Advantage". Including

- ✓ The size of the state
- ✓ Quick and immediate access to resources



- ✓ Flexibility of Public-School Officials
- ✓ The state's commitment to the military families residing in NH.
- ✓ The value of strong relationships in seeking solutions

The Council is also very cognizant of the challenges that face military families.

- ✓ The availability of affordable housing
- ✓ Reliability of the student identifier data
- ✓ The ability to reach out to the private sector to support children.
- ✓ The need for available childcare services across the state

The Council recognizes that families and school districts may be unfamiliar with the basic tenets of the Interstate Compact and is working on an ongoing plan to increase that communication and education. Some items include providing the School Liaison a platform to speak to organizational leaders about MIC3. This includes, school Superintendents, Principals, School Counselors, Athletic Directors and more. Also included in this plan is increased information and awareness on the DOE Website for Military Families. The School Liaison is routinely working to educate military families and commands about MIC3 through various means.

The impact of the NH MIC3 Council reaches beyond the support provided in state. As Commissioner, I have been an active member of the National Commission's Training Committee. The committee is essential to providing updated information for educators as well as families in transition. The development of resources in various languages, and to easily share on internet and social media platforms is critical in getting the word out to families, educators and administrators. The training videos, webinars and printable materials are also a valuable resource to new Commissioners, council members and the community at large. New Hampshire continues to be a proud voice at the national level supporting not only active-duty military but those in the Guard and Reserves.

This year there were two proposed pieces of legislation that impact the compact language and ultimately students in transition. House Bill 1019 sought a language correction in the Compact found in the Title VIII legislation. The correction proposed and subsequently approved edited the wording of "section" to "chapter". The council is grateful to Representative Hope Damon for sponsoring the bill on behalf of the council. The second bill introduced HB 1382 was a bill focusing on special education hearings and the responsibility of the department of education to support witness fees incurred by families when faced with a special education hearing. This bill also passed and signed by the Governor.

On May 30, the Council held a state meeting focusing on the status of Education in NH, updates to the DSLO Priorities and legislation, improving the military identifier data, and training needs for parents and schools through MIC3 toolkits and resources provided by the School Liaison. The council also received exciting updates about the partnership between the Department of Defense and AmeriCorps VISTA, placing the Military Youth and Family Support VISTA with our School Liaison to develop resources for local and global military families. The first of these is a comprehensive Joint Services Military Dependent

#### Past Year Highlights
