




Virtual vs. In Person








COMPACT 101 TOTAL PARTICIPANTS

Statement of Support for Commission Training Program

- Beginning with the Commission's first strategic plan adopted in 2017, the Commission identified the need for an evolving, sustainable training program.
- The constant turnover in personnel in Education and the Uniformed Services underscores the need for continued focus on educating local education authorities and military families about the provisions provided under the Compact statute.
- Research demonstrates that successful, effective non-profit organizations dedicate a significant portion of their budget, between 60% and 70%, to programs and services.
 - In FY2023, 2% of the Commission's total expenditures were directly related to training costs.
 - In FY2024, 2% of the Commission's total expenditures were directly related to training costs.
- The Training Committee developed a flexible training model that maximizes staff time and oversight, has a mechanism to collect data that evaluates the resources, and provides deliverables in various formats, giving access to more stakeholders, all while utilizing minimal funding from the Commission.
- We reiterate our strong support for maintaining the current training model, which is integral to achieving the Commission's vision of "Successful Educational Transitions" for military children.



- 2021 ADSS "For your most recent PCS move, to what extent were the following a problem for your child(ren)?"
 - 55% respondents w/school-age children stated that <u>changing schools</u> was a moderate to very large problem
 - 35% respondents w/school-age children stated that missing school-related deadlines, to include applications/lotteries for OE, was a moderate to very large problem.




Open Enrollment Flexibility

Military families often experience delays in receiving permanent housing upon a permanent change of station to a new location. States can improve military families' access to existing district, interdistrict and intradistrict transfer programs by modifying state education open enrollment policies.

State Support for Military Families with Special Education Needs

Highly mobile children, including military children, are more likely to experience recurring educational disruptions and challenges, particularly those who need access to special education and related services. States can assist military families by ensuring timely establishment of special education services upon relocation and reducing burdens associated with due process proceedings.

Evaluation of state implementation of Supportive Policies to improve Educational experiences and Achievement for K-12 Military Children (SPEAK Military Children)

- Phase I: Literature Review
 - Purpose: conduct a comprehensive review of the current state of research literature related to the education of military-connected students, in partnership with the Defense State Liaison Office (DSLO).
- Phase II: State Data Extraction Report
 - Purpose: investigate data available on state education agency websites in support of four DSLO education-related initiatives.
 - Military Student Identifier, Purple Star Schools Program, Education Compact, Advance Enrollment
- Phase III: Interviews and Deep Dive Visits/<u>Final Report</u>
 - Purpose: better understand local implementation of four initiatives to support military-connected students.
 - o Final report is a consolidation of all phases' findings.



PSU SPEAK Findings – Themes Across All Initiatives and Programs

When implemented as intended, there are <u>many</u> <u>successes and positive impacts:</u>

PSU SPEAK Findings – Education Compact

Positive Impacts

 Credit transfers, course placement, graduation, extra-curricular activities, kindergarten, reduced stress for families, and smoother transition

Barriers

 School awareness, parent awareness, parent misunderstanding of the Compact, differences between states or schools, differences in kindergarten cutoff dates across states, differences across states in gifted qualifications or programming, school-level non-compliance

Opportunities

- Increasing family awareness
- Additional school training
- More consistency across states
- Expanding the covered groups
- Increasing consistency and communication related to the state commissioners
- o Increasing school accountability
- Adding a grace period for physicals
- Increasing access to special education services

PSU SPEAK Considerations – Opportunities for Collaboration

- Advocate for standardization of data collection related to military-connected students, to include operationalization (i.e., how "military-connected student" is defined), data collection, and data reporting.
- Support the development, implementation, and sharing of evidence-informed practices for strategic communication of the initiatives to parents and school personnel.
- Advocate for information transparency and expectation management related to the specific ways the initiatives are implemented in each state and school district.
- Encourage states to leverage technology to directly support military families and to support effective implementation of the initiatives.
- Support initiative standardization, enforcement, and evaluation.
- Consider ways to increase IEP transportability and standardization of gifted qualifications and programming.



PSU SPEAK Considerations – Opportunities for Collaboration

- Consider the ways in which increasing the capacity of the School Liaison Program and standardizing school liaison duties may improve parent and school personnel awareness of the initiatives.
- Consider how the selection and implementation of the MIC3 state commissioner
 position (e.g., whether it is a paid position or additional duty, the location of the
 commissioner within the education system) may impact the execution of MIC3
 commissioner duties.
- Advocate for states to fully fund the initiatives and support the use of existing and
 potential funding mechanisms to improve the implementation of the four initiatives
 and to implement other programming that is evidence informed or evidence based.
- Support research to understand the scope of successes or difficulties during transitions to new schools and evaluations to ensure evidence-informed and evidence-based practices are used to support students during those transitions.



CHOOSE ACT

- Alabama Enacts CHOOSE Act Income Tax Credit Program for Qualifying Educational Expenses
- March 12, 2024
- By Denis Del Bene
- Alabama has enacted legislation establishing the Creating Hope and Opportunity for Our Students' Education (CHOOSE) Tax Credit program which will provide a refundable income tax credit to parents of eligible students to offset the cost of qualifying educational expenses. The legislation directs the Department of Revenue to establish education savings accounts (ESAs) in which the credit funds will be deposited by the Department for the parent of a participating student to pay qualifying expenses to an education service provider. (L. 2024, H129 (Act 21), effective 03/07/2024.)
- CHOOSE Act tax credit.
- For the years beginning on January 1, 2025, and January 1, 2026, the credit will be available to the parent of an eligible student whose family had an adjusted gross income not exceeding 300% of the federal poverty level for the preceding tax year. For the years beginning on or after January 1, 2027, the credit will be available to any parent of an eligible student.
- The Department must reserve the first 500 tax credits for parents of an eligible student who is a specialneeds student.
- HB 129 Choose Act signed into Law on March 7, 2024.



The Compact and its Rules regarding Placement Flexibility are broadly drafted to authorize LEA discretion to waive requirements for course placement. LEA officials have flexibility in making such determinations, which can include but are not limited to waiver of lost seat time requirements to ensure appropriate course placement.

Proposing New Rules or Amending Existing Rules

Compact Rules, Chapter 200, SEC. 2.101 Adoption of Rules; Amendment

Who can submit a proposed Rule or Amendment?

- 1. Any Commissioner may submit a proposed Rule or Amendment to the Interstate Commission Office by February 28 of the current fiscal year for referral to the Rules Committee.
- 2. Standing Committees may propose new Rules or Amendments by a majority vote.
- 3. Any regional group of States as may be subsequently recognized by the Commission may propose Rules or Amendments by a majority vote of members of that region.
- Proposals should be vetted by the Commissioner's state council, and a formal letter should be submitted to the Interstate Commission's Office requesting the new Rule or amendment.

Purple Star School of Distinction Designation and Purple Star School District Program



The Florida Purple Star School of Distinction Designation was established by the Florida legislature in 2021 and further defined in Rule 6A-1.0999, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.). The Florida Purple Star School District Program was established by the Florida legislature in 2024. Once awarded, schools and districts will maintain their designation as a Purple Star School of Distinction or Purple Star School District for three school years.

The purpose of the Purple Star School of Distinction Designation and Purple Star School District Program is to recognize schools that support the unique needs of military families, help military-connected students navigate critical challenges and provide resources for military-connected students when transitioning to a new school environment.
